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Explanations

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1. What was the strategic aim of the island hopping campaign in the Pacific?

- A. To bypass heavily fortified islands and focus on weaker ones**
- B. To capture every island to secure supply lines**
- C. To invade the Japanese homeland directly**
- D. To blockade all ports**

The key idea is to advance toward Japan by choosing targets that would give the United States forward air and naval bases, while skipping over the strongest enemy fortifications. By leaping from island to island that were less well defended, American forces could build airfields and bases closer to Japan, project power deeper into the Pacific, and cut off Japanese garrisons from supplies and reinforcements. This made further advances faster and less costly in lives and resources because they avoided costly assaults on every island and weakened the overall Japanese defensive network through isolation. So, rather than trying to capture every island, the strategy focused on selectively taking certain islands to support continued advances toward Japan. It wasn't about invading the Japanese homeland right away, and it wasn't simply about blockading all ports.

2. What was the name of the congressional committee created to investigate disloyal Americans and suspected communists?

The question is about the government body specifically tasked with probing alleged disloyalty and suspected communists in the United States. The name that fits this description is the House Un-American Activities Committee. Created by the U.S. House of Representatives in 1938, it was set up to investigate individuals and organizations believed to be disloyal or subversive, with a focus on communism and fascist ties. Its hearings, especially in the late 1940s and early 1950s, brought public attention to alleged communist influence in various sectors, including Hollywood and labor unions, and helped fuel the era of heightened anti-communist sentiment. Other options don't match the question's emphasis on a congressional body focused on disloyal Americans and suspected communists. The Senate Internal Security Committee was a separate Senate entity that pursued similar concerns but is not the one associated with the phrase in question. The Loyalty Review Board was an executive-branch body created to review federal employees' loyalty, not a congressional committee. The Committee on Public Safety is not the recognized national congressional body connected with these investigations.

3. Which foreign policy is associated with Teddy Roosevelt and the 'big stick' symbol?

The main idea is using a strong military backing to enforce diplomacy. The “big stick” symbol stands for negotiating peacefully while showing that the United States is prepared to use force if needed. This approach is known as Big Stick Diplomacy, a hallmark of how Theodore Roosevelt conducted foreign policy—assertive, often intervening in Caribbean affairs and backing actions with the threat—or use—of military power. Roosevelt also formalized this stance in the Roosevelt Corollary to the Monroe Doctrine, arguing the U.S. would intervene in Latin America to maintain stability and protect American interests, reinforcing how force could shape international negotiations. The other options reflect different presidents’ methods—Moral Diplomacy emphasizes democratic ideals (Wilson), the Open Door Policy centers on equal trade access in China, and Dollar Diplomacy relies on economic leverage (Taft).

4. Cesar Chavez helped form which labor organization?

Cesar Chavez helped organize farm workers by starting their own union to win better wages and conditions, using nonviolent tactics. He and Dolores Huerta founded the National Farm Workers Association in 1962 to unite migrant workers and give them a collective voice. That group later joined with another organizing committee to become the United Farm Workers of America, but the initial entity he helped form was the National Farm Workers Association. This history explains why that choice is the best answer: it reflects the original organization Chavez launched to organize farm workers.

5. The Battle of Argonne Forest occurred during which war?

Recognizing which war features the Battle of Argonne Forest helps you place this event in history. It happened in 1918 in northeastern France as part of the Meuse-Argonne Offensive, the major Allied push to defeat Germany in World War I. American Expeditionary Forces, alongside French and other Allied troops, pressed through German lines, and the victory helped bring about the armistice that ended the war. The other conflicts listed occurred later (World War II, the Korean War, and the Vietnam War) and did not involve battles in the Argonne Forest, so this battle is firmly part of World War I.

6. Who was the American civil rights lawyer and the first Black justice on the U.S. Supreme Court?

- A. Clarence Thomas

Thurgood Marshall is the one who fits both parts of the description. He built his career as a leading American civil rights lawyer, arguing many landmark cases before the Supreme Court—most famously *Brown v. Board of Education*, which helped end legal segregation in public schools. He later became the first Black justice on the U.S. Supreme Court, serving from 1967 to 1991 and shaping civil rights and equal-protection jurisprudence from the bench. The other names are notable justices, but they do not combine both roles: Clarence Thomas is Black and a justice, but not the civil rights lawyer who argued the major cases; Ruth Bader Ginsburg and Sonia Sotomayor are not Black.

7. Blitzkrieg refers to a fast, combined-arms warfare style associated with which country in World War II?

Blitzkrieg is the German approach to fast, combined-arms warfare that uses rapid movement of tanks, mechanized infantry, and close air support to break through defenses and disrupt the enemy's ability to respond. This method, developed by German planners in the 1930s, aimed to achieve quick, decisive victories by overwhelming opponents before they could mount a coordinated defense. Its most famous early successes came in Poland in 1939 and France in 1940, where the speed and coordination of land and air forces outpaced traditional defenses. While Britain, the United States, and Japan employed their own strategies, the term and tactic are closely tied to Germany's wartime doctrine.

8. The 1900 uprising in China aimed at ending foreign influence in the country is known as what?

The main idea is recognizing an anti-foreign nationalist uprising in China at the turn of the century. The event is the Boxer Rebellion, when the Boxers, officially the Society of Righteous and Harmonious Fists, attacked foreigners and Chinese Christians to end foreign influence and missionary activity. Their efforts prompted intervention by eight foreign powers and led to the Boxer Protocol, reflecting how foreign powers and unequal treaties pressured China even as reform movements grew in response. This movement is distinct from the Taiping Rebellion, a mid-1800s civil war with a religious-publicized rebellion against the Qing; from the Opium War, the 19th-century conflicts over opium trade and imperial privileges; and from the Open Door Policy, which was a late 19th-early 20th-century U.S. stance favoring equal trading rights rather than a domestic uprising.

9. What operation supplied food and fuel to West Berlin in 1948-49 after the Soviet blockade?

- A. Berlin Airlift**

When the Soviet Union blocked land access to West Berlin in 1948, the Allies answered with a massive airlift to keep the city supplied. This operation, known as the Berlin Airlift, flew food, coal, and other essentials into West Berlin around the clock, using agreed-upon air corridors. It lasted about a year, from 1948 into 1949, and demonstrated how air power could stand up to a blockade without escalating into war. The effort delivered millions of tons of supplies and kept civilians fed and the city powered, ultimately leading to the lifting of the blockade. The other options relate to different historical events: one is a WWII invasion in 1944, another is a North Africa campaign in 1942, and the remaining is unrelated to the Berlin crisis.

10. Which amendment prohibits poll taxes in federal elections?

Poll taxes were fees used in some states to keep people, especially African Americans and poorer citizens, from voting. The 24th Amendment, ratified in 1964, makes it unconstitutional to require payment of a poll tax in federal elections, so no one can be barred from voting for that reason when voting for President, Vice President, or members of Congress. This directly protects the right to participate in federal elections by removing a financial barrier. For context, later decisions extended similar protections to state elections, but the amendment itself specifically targets federal elections. The other amendments address different issues: one expands presidential voting rights for Washington, D.C. residents; another sets presidential succession rules; another lowers the voting age to 18.
