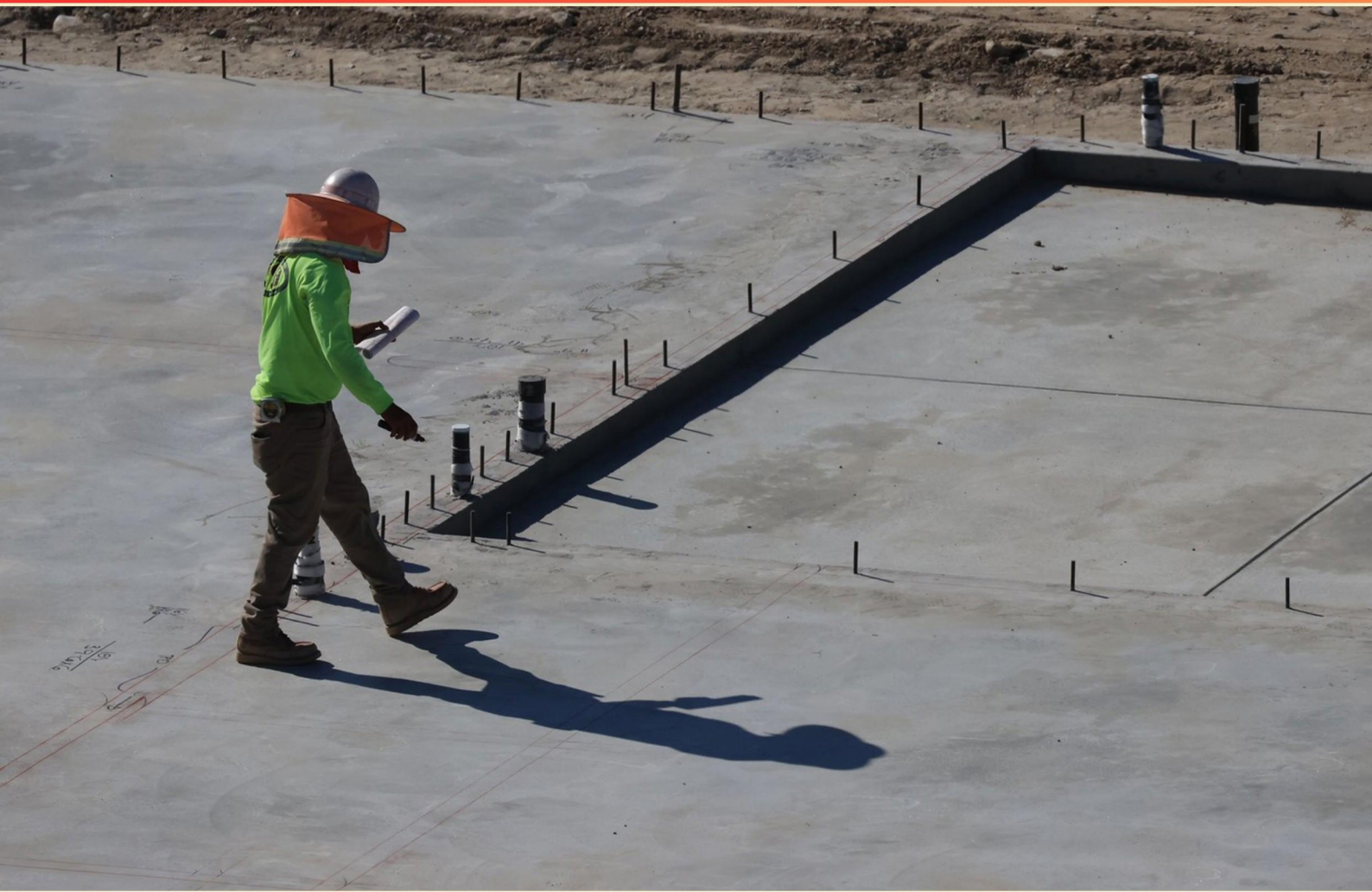

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Explanations

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1. In the statement about workers' right to refuse, what word completes the phrase describing the belief that they are exposed to imminent danger?

The main idea here is that a worker's right to refuse unsafe work rests on the belief being sincere and reasonable—that continuing to work would expose them to imminent danger. The phrase is completed with "good," forming "in good faith." This standard means the worker genuinely believes there is danger and that belief is based on what they know or perceive, not on spite or dishonesty. If you used "bad faith," it would imply an insincere or dishonest claim, which isn't the standard for a legitimate right to refuse. "Faith" alone isn't the conventional pairing in this context, and "reality" doesn't fit the common expression used to describe a genuine belief about danger.

PPE stands for Personal Protective Equipment and refers to the protective gear workers wear to create a barrier between themselves and hazards. It's a safeguard used when hazards cannot be fully eliminated or reduced enough by other means, and it acts as the last line of defense in the hazard control hierarchy. PPE includes items like gloves, safety glasses or face shields, respirators, hearing protection, hard hats, and protective footwear. The key idea is that PPE protects the worker, but it doesn't remove the hazard itself or reduce exposure at the source; the hazard remains, just mitigated at the wearer. Other approaches aim to change the work environment or processes—administrative controls change how people work (training, procedures, rotation), substitution replaces the hazard with something less dangerous, and engineering controls modify the workplace to remove or reduce the hazard (guards, ventilation).

Indirect costs are the losses that follow an incident but aren't directly paid by an insurance policy. Insurance typically covers direct expenses like medical bills and repair or replacement of damaged property. Indirect costs include things such as lost productivity, downtime, overtime to catch up, scheduling disruptions, and additional administrative or training expenses. These are not usually paid by the insurer, but they can be recoverable through a claim against the party at fault or via other recovery mechanisms, which is why they're described as not paid by the insurance company and recoverable.

Developing and implementing a formal energy-control program is the employer's responsibility. Under lockout/tagout rules, the employer must establish, document, and enforce procedures to safely isolate and control potentially hazardous energy during servicing and maintenance. This includes creating specific energy-control procedures for each machine or process, providing the necessary lockout/tagout devices, training authorized and affected employees, and conducting periodic inspections to ensure the procedures are followed. Authorized employees are the ones who perform the actual lockout and perform the work, but they don't create the program. Supervisors help ensure compliance, and maintenance staff carry out the work, but the responsibility to develop and implement the procedures rests with the employer.

Evacuation wardens focus on directing people to exits and keeping the evacuation moving in an orderly way so everyone leaves safely. They guide occupants along designated routes, prevent crowding at doors, assist those who need help, and communicate any hazards to the incident command so the evacuation can proceed smoothly. This role is about safe egress and crowd management, not providing medical care, maintaining attendance logs, or fighting fires unless specifically trained and assigned to those tasks. So directing orderly egress and ensuring everyone exits safely best describes the warden's responsibility.

Identifying every potential source of electrical energy before doing any work is the essential starting point for having an electrically safe working condition. By reviewing one-line drawings, schematics, control diagrams, and any ID tags, you create a complete picture of all power paths that could energize the equipment—including main supplies, backup feeds, control power, and anything that could backfeed or re-energize the circuit. Knowing all sources is what makes proper isolation, lockout/tagout, and verification possible and effective. Simply stopping equipment and opening disconnects without confirming all energy sources could leave some sources alive. Grounding phase conductors is a later step after you've de-energized and verified zero energy, and visually confirming a disconnect is open does not guarantee that no other sources remain energized. Identifying all sources sets the stage for safe de-energization and subsequent zero-energy verification.

7. Which classification includes liquids with flashpoint above 73°F and boil below 100°F?

This tests how flammable liquids are classified by flash point and boiling point according to NFPA 30. Liquids with a flash point at least 73°F and a boiling point below 100°F are classified as Class IC. The higher flash point means the liquid doesn't ignite as easily at room temperature as those with lower flash points, while the boiling point being under 100°F means it can generate vapors that form ignitable mixtures at relatively low temperatures. Other classifications don't match this exact combination: liquids with a flash point below 73°F fall into the IA or IB groups depending on the boiling point, and liquids with a flash point of 100°F or higher are Class II (and typically have higher boiling points).

8. In atmospheres where combustible dust is present, power-operated industrial trucks must bear which designation?

In areas with combustible dust, equipment must be designed to prevent ignition of the surrounding dust. The EX designation signals explosion protection—showing the power-operated industrial truck is built to withstand or contain ignition sources, like sparks or hot surfaces, so it won't ignite the dust in the environment. The other markings don't indicate this level of explosion protection, so they don't meet the safety requirement for dusty atmospheres.

Stability of fixed equipment is the key idea here. When a machine is designed to stay in one spot, the forces it generates during operation—vibration, starting and stopping, and any manual actions by the operator—can cause it to move, walk, or tip if it isn't secured. Anchoring the machine to the floor or its base keeps it in the intended position, so guards stay in place, controls stay accessible, and tooling remains correctly aligned. This reduces the risk of injury from unexpected movement and helps ensure safe operation and maintenance. Leaving a machine unsecured creates a clear hazard because movement can occur at any time, especially during vigorous or unexpected actions, making it easier for someone to be struck or for guards or safety devices to fail. The idea that anchoring is only needed on concrete floors isn't accurate—the goal is to secure the machine with appropriate anchors for the given floor and installation so it cannot move under normal use.

10. Which right allows employees to examine exposure and medical records, including monitoring or measuring toxic substances?

Access to exposure and medical records lets you review the data from any monitoring of toxic substances and your own medical information. This right ensures you can see how much of a hazard you're exposed to, understand potential health risks, and discuss the results with your healthcare provider. Employers must keep these records and provide copies to you or your designated representative upon request, while protecting confidentiality where required. This visibility is essential for actively protecting your health in the workplace. The other options don't involve accessing records or monitoring data, so they don't address this specific worker right.
