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Explanations

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1. What major body of water borders Virginia to the east?

- A. Pacific Ocean
- B. Gulf of Mexico
- C. Arctic Ocean
- D. Atlantic Ocean**

Virginia's eastern border is the Atlantic Ocean. The Atlantic is the large body of saltwater that lines the East Coast of the United States, touching many states from Maine to Florida and brushing up against Virginia's coastline. The Pacific Ocean is on the West Coast, the Arctic Ocean lies far to the north, and the Gulf of Mexico is way to the south, so none of those border Virginia to the east.

2. What term refers to using natural, human or capital resources to make a product or provide a service in order to make money?

- A. Industry**
- B. Agriculture
- C. Tourism
- D. Government

Industry explains using natural, human, and capital resources to turn them into goods or provide services in order to make money. This broad idea covers how resources are turned into products and services people pay for, like farms producing crops or factories making goods. Tourism is a service within the economy, but it's just one part of industry, not the overall term. Government focuses on running public services, not on producing goods to earn profit. So the description matches industry best, since it describes the overall business activity of turning resources into things people buy to earn money.

3. Which Virginia region contains the Appalachian Plateau?

Understanding Virginia's physical regions helps you connect landforms to where they're found. The Appalachian Plateau is in the far western part of Virginia and features flat, high plateaus formed by layered rocks. Because you're looking for where the landform called the Appalachian Plateau is located, the region that contains it is the Appalachian Plateau region itself. The Tidewater area is the coastal plain with wetlands, the Piedmont is rolling hills, and the Blue Ridge Mountains are the tall, rugged mountains. So, the Appalachian Plateau region best fits the plateau landscape you're describing.

4. The Shenandoah Valley is located between which two geographic features in Virginia?

The Shenandoah Valley is a long, narrow stretch of land that runs between two major mountain ranges in Virginia. Its eastern boundary is the Blue Ridge Mountains, and its western boundary is the Appalachian Mountains. Those two ranges frame the valley, making it the land between them. The other options point to water features or other regions and don't describe the mountain boundaries that define the Shenandoah Valley.

5. Which company sponsored the Jamestown settlement?

Colonies often began when investors pooled money through joint stock companies that received a royal charter to establish settlements. Jamestown was sponsored by the Virginia Company of London, a group of investors who were granted a charter by King James I to found a colony in Virginia. They financed the 1607 voyage and set up the settlement, aiming to gain profits from resources and trade for England. The other companies were tied to different regions or purposes: the East India Company focused on trade with Asia, the Massachusetts Bay Company established a Puritan colony in New England, and the Dutch West India Company backed settlements in areas like New Amsterdam (later New York).

6. Which Virginia region includes the Blue Ridge Mountains?

Think about how Virginia's regions are named by their landscape. The Blue Ridge Mountains are the defining feature of the Blue Ridge region, so that region includes the mountains themselves. The mountains give the area its name and identity, and you can find famous routes like the Blue Ridge Parkway there, with the Shenandoah Valley nearby. The other regions describe different landscapes—Piedmont is the area between the coast and the mountains, Tidewater is along the coast, and the Appalachian Plateau is farther west—so they don't include the Blue Ridge Mountains.

Virginia's state tree is the dogwood, specifically the flowering dogwood. States pick a tree to symbolize their natural heritage, and Virginia chose the dogwood because it grows well there and the bright white blossoms in spring are a familiar, beloved sight across the state. You'll often see dogwoods in Virginia parks and yards, making it a recognizable symbol of the state. Oak, maple, and pine are common trees too, but they aren't the official state tree.

8. What crops are known as the three sisters?

The three sisters is a farming idea from Native American communities where corn, beans, and squash are grown together because they help each other grow. The corn provides a tall stalk for the beans to climb. The beans fix nitrogen in the soil, which feeds all the plants. The squash spreads along the ground, shading the soil to keep weeds down and hold in moisture. This teamwork makes a dependable, productive crop trio and is a notable part of Virginia's history. Other choices don't fit the idea of a cooperative crop trio: tomatoes, tobacco, and peanuts are three crops but not the traditional three-sister grouping; a palisade is a fence; a cotton gin is a machine used to process cotton.

9. What is Virginia's state tree?

State symbols are official signs a state uses to represent its identity. For trees, the state designates one species as the state tree. In Virginia, the official state tree is the dogwood—the flowering dogwood—because it grows naturally in the region and is closely tied to Virginia's springtime beauty. That special designation is a formal choice by the state, which is why dogwood is the best answer. The other trees listed—oak, maple, and pine—are common in Virginia, but they aren't the ones officially named as the state tree.

10. Which labor system eventually supplied enslaved labor on Virginia plantations after indentured servitude?

- A. Slavery**
- B. Tenant farming

The main idea here is how labor on Virginia plantations changed over time. Early settlers used indentured servants—people who came to work for a set number of years in exchange for passage and housing. When those years were up, many earned their freedom. But over time, planters found a different system more stable for their needs: enslaved labor. Enslaved people were forced to work for life, and their children could inherit that enslaved status, creating a permanent, hereditary labor force. This shift toward slavery as the primary labor system built the plantation economy in Virginia. Tenant farming and sharecropping involve renting land or farming for a portion of the crops and are different kinds of labor arrangements that came about in other periods, not as the main system replacing indentured servitude in the colonial era. Feudal labor isn't a system used in colonial Virginia.
