### 1. Which city sits on the James River and serves as the capital of Virginia?

- A. Williamsburg
- B. Charlottesville
- C. Roanoke
- D. Richmond**

*Think about where Virginia's government sits today and which city lies along the James River. Richmond is that city: it is the state capital and is located on the James River, a historic waterway that helped with trade and movement in the past. Virginia's capital was moved to Richmond in the late 1700s from Williamsburg, so Richmond is the current capital. Williamsburg was once the capital and is on the James River too, but it's no longer the capital. Charlottesville and Roanoke are not on the James River and aren't the state capital.*

### 2. The home of a famous Virginian President and founding father is Monticello. Whose home is it?

- A. Thomas Jefferson**
- B. George Washington
- C. James Madison
- D. John Adams

*Monticello is the home of Thomas Jefferson, a famous Virginian President and founding father. Jefferson designed Monticello, lived there in Virginia, and he was the principal author of the Declaration of Independence and the third U.S. president. The house sits near Charlottesville and shows his interest in architecture and ideas. The other options refer to different leaders: George Washington's home is Mount Vernon, James Madison's home is Montpelier, and John Adams lived in Massachusetts.*

### 3. Which statement is true about the Emancipation Proclamation?

- A. It freed slaves in the Union states that remained loyal
- B. It freed all slaves everywhere immediately
- C. It was issued before the Civil War began
- D. It declared enslaved people in Confederate-held territory to be free**

*The main idea here is that the Emancipation Proclamation was a wartime order that declared enslaved people in Confederate-held areas to be free. It was issued during the Civil War and targeted regions in rebellion against the United States, not the slaveholding states that remained loyal to the Union or areas already under Union control. Because it only applied to those Confederate territories, it didn't free slaves in border states or in parts of the country that were not in rebellion, and it wasn't a universal, immediate freeing of all enslaved people. The proclamation also helped shift the war's purpose toward ending slavery and opened the door for Black men to join the Union Army. So the statement that is true is that enslaved people in Confederate-held territory were declared to be free.*

**4. Which landform is a small mound of earth smaller than a mountain?**

- A. Hill**
- B. Valley
- C. Plateau
- D. Canyon

*Think about how landforms are described by size and shape. A hill is a small mound of earth that rises above the surrounding land, but it isn't as tall or large as a mountain. That makes it a good fit for something described as a small mound smaller than a mountain. In contrast, a valley is a low area between hills or mountains, often with a river. A plateau is a flat-topped, high area that's broad and wide, and a canyon is a deep, narrow gorge carved by a river with steep sides. So the best match for a small mound of earth smaller than a mountain is a hill.*

**5. What Virginia region lies along the coast and has many wetlands used for farming and fishing?**

- A. Piedmont
- B. Coastal Plain**
- C. Appalachian Mountains
- D. Valley and Ridge

*The Coastal Plain is the part of Virginia that runs along the coast and has many wetlands such as marshes and estuaries. These wetlands create rich soils and abundant water, making the region well suited to farming and providing abundant fish and seafood for fishing industries. The other regions are inland or mountainous—not along the coast—so they don't match the description as closely.*

**6. Which of the following is one of Virginia's five geographic regions?**

- A. Mountains
- B. Piedmont**
- C. Plains
- D. Ocean

*Virginia is divided into five named geographic regions, and Piedmont is one of them. The Piedmont sits between the Coastal Plain (to the east) and the Blue Ridge Mountains (to the west), making it the standard regional name used in Virginia Studies. The other options don't match the official regions: Mountains isn't a standalone regional name in this system, Plains isn't the term used (that would be Coastal Plain), and Ocean isn't a regional name at all.*

## 7. Which document declared that slaves in Confederate-held areas were free?

- A. Emancipation Proclamation
- B. Gettysburg Address
- C. Treaty of Paris
- D. Three-Fifths Compromise

*The Emancipation Proclamation is the document that declared enslaved people in Confederate-held areas free. President Lincoln issued it on January 1, 1863, and it stated that those enslaved in states still in rebellion against the Union were free. This turned the Civil War into a fight not just to save the Union but also to end slavery, and it opened the door for Black soldiers to join the Union Army. It didn't free enslaved people in border states or areas already under Union control at that time, and true nationwide abolition came later with the Thirteenth Amendment. The other options focus on different topics: the Gettysburg Address is about national purpose and democracy, the Treaty of Paris ends the Revolutionary War, and the Three-Fifths Compromise was about counting enslaved people for representation, not freeing them.*

## 8. What system granted land to settlers who paid for others to come to Virginia?

- A. Encomienda System
- B. Mercantilism
- C. Headright System
- D. Patents for Land

*The main idea here is how settlers were encouraged to move to Virginia by getting land in return for bringing others to the colony. The headright system did exactly that: for every person whose voyage to Virginia was paid, the sponsor received a grant of land—usually about 50 acres. So if someone paid to bring five people, they could claim roughly 250 acres. This motivated wealthy leaders to sponsor more indentured servants and workers, helping Virginia grow and people farm the land. The other ideas don't fit this specific land-bringing mechanism. The encomienda system was a Spanish setup that forced Indigenous labor in the Americas, not a Virginia land grant. Mercantilism is about how countries trade and build wealth, not about giving land for bringing people. Patents for land are official documents granting land, but the phrase "paid for others to come" describes the headright approach, where land is awarded specifically for transportation of settlers.*

## 9. What industries are important to the Tidewater region?

- A. Fishing and Tourism
- B. Manufacturing and Mining
- C. Tech and Finance
- D. Agriculture and Forestry

*Coastal resources and jobs shape the Tidewater region. Because this area sits along the Chesapeake Bay and the Atlantic Ocean, fishing provides seafood and supports many families, and tourism draws people to beaches, ships, and coastal towns. These activities fit the geography and resources of Tidewater, making them especially important there. The other groups describe industries that are more typical of inland or urban areas, not the coast: manufacturing and mining, tech and finance, or agriculture and forestry don't align as closely with Tidewater's watery landscape and economy.*

**10. Which term is most closely linked to voting rights historically?**

- A. Franchise
- B. Eligibility
- C. Civic duty
- D. Suffrage**

*Suffrage is the right to vote in elections. It's the term most closely tied to voting rights because it names the entitlement people seek and fight to gain for groups of citizens. In American history, suffrage describes the movements and laws that expanded who could vote—from early expansions to include more men, to the movements that won women the vote, and to later protections that ensured broader participation. So suffrage directly connects to who is allowed to vote and how that access has changed over time. The other ideas describe things like meeting rules to vote (eligibility), duties a citizen might feel (civic duty), or a less common synonym for the right to vote (franchise), but suffrage best captures the concept of voting rights and their expansion.*
