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## **Explanations**

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### 1. What does the phrase 'Under the Sun' mean?

- A. Under literal sun
- B. Without God**
- C. During daytime
- D. In the temple

*The phrase points to life on earth as experienced from a human, earthly perspective, often without taking God's point of view into account. It signals evaluating things under the sun—things visible, immediate, and limited to this world. That framing is why the option about life "Without God" fits best: it captures the sense of viewing life from a human-centered, earthly frame of reference rather than from a divine vantage. It isn't about the literal sun, daytime, or being inside a temple—those notions don't capture the idea of perspective and scope that "under the sun" conveys.*

### 2. Genesis chapter 12 reports God's call to which figure?

- A. The Flood
- B. The Birth of Isaac

*Genesis 12 shows the moment God invites Abram to leave his homeland and go to the land He will show him, starting a special relationship and a promise that Abram will become a great nation and that through him all families of the earth will be blessed. This call marks the beginning of God's explicit plan with Abram, who will be named Abraham later. The other events—Noah's Flood, the Tower of Babel, and Isaac's birth—occur at different points in Genesis and deal with different moments in humanity and the family line, not the initial call to Abram.*

### 3. The Passover meal was intended to be for what?

*Passover is given as a memory of God's saving act for His people. In Exodus, God tells Israel to observe this meal so that each generation will remember how He delivered them from slavery in Egypt—how He spared the firstborn and brought them out with a mighty hand. The focus is on recalling and retelling God's faithfulness and mighty act of redemption. That's why the option about remembrance is the best fit. The others describe related ideas—harvest, sealing a covenant, or obtaining forgiveness—but they aren't the primary purpose of Passover. It's a memorial of God's saving work, not a harvest festival, not primarily a covenant-sealing rite, and not a ritual meant to obtain forgiveness.*

#### 4. Who bought Joseph in Egypt?

*The main idea here is tracing who becomes Joseph's master when he first arrives in Egypt. After being carried to Egypt by traders, Joseph is purchased by Potiphar, an Egyptian official who serves as captain of the guard. This is why Potiphar is the correct answer—the text explicitly says Joseph was bought by him from the traders. The Baker and the Cupbearer appear later in the story as fellow prisoners who interact with Joseph, not as buyers, and Pharaoh is the ruler whom Potiphar serves, not the person who buys Joseph.*

#### 5. Who encouraged Jacob to steal Esau's blessing?

*The idea being tested is who prompted Jacob to obtain Esau's blessing by deception. Rebekah, Jacob's mother, is the one who pushes him to take the blessing that Isaac intended for Esau. She overhears Isaac telling Esau to hunt and prepare a meal so he can bless him, and she devises a plan to secure the blessing for Jacob instead. She coordinates the deception—telling Jacob to impersonate Esau, dressing him in Esau's clothes, and using goat skins to mimic Esau's hairy skin—then supports him through the moment Isaac blesses him. This shows how a parent's influence and a plan can steer a pivotal moment in the family narrative. The other names mentioned are Jacob's wives, who are not involved in this event.*

#### 6. Which statement about proverbs is true?

*Proverbs are compact, memorable lines that convey practical wisdom about daily life. They express general truths or moral guidance in a short, easy-to-remember form, often using vivid imagery or parallel ideas to make the lesson stick. They're not long historical narratives, which tell stories about people and events; nor prayers, which are requests or acts of worship directed to God; nor universal legal codes, which prescribe formal rules. In this light, the description that they are short wise sayings fits best, capturing how Proverbs' bite-sized statements aim to guide behavior and wisdom in everyday situations.*

## 7. Is the New Testament sufficient for equipping us in our faith?

*The main idea here is that Scripture is the guide for faith and life, and the whole biblical witness—not just a part of it—equips believers for every good work. The New Testament is central because it reveals Jesus, explains the gospel, and gives instruction for how Christians should live in the church age. But it sits on top of the Old Testament, which provides the creation story, covenants, prophecies, laws, and wisdom that set the fuller context for understanding who God is and how He works with His people. A key point is that, when Scripture speaks of being “thoroughly equipped,” many students see that as referring to the entire canon recognized by the church. The New Testament alone can't always supply the background, the fulfillment motifs, and the comprehensive moral and doctrinal framework that the Old Testament contributes. The apostolic teaching in the New Testament often interprets and fulfills what the Old Testament prepared readers to expect, so grasping that full arc helps believers apply truth rightly in all situations. So, while the New Testament is vital for faith and practice, it isn't sufficient by itself to equip us completely; the full Bible, guided by the Holy Spirit and sound teaching, is what truly equips a follower for every good work.*

## 8. Which term describes the first prophecy about Jesus?

*The main idea here is identifying the earliest prophetic message about a coming Savior. That is described by the term protoevangelium, which comes from Greek for “first gospel” (proto- meaning first, euangelion meaning good news). It points to Genesis 3:15, the moment after the Fall when God speaks of enmity between the serpent and the woman and, crucially, declares that the offspring will crush the serpent's head. This is understood as the initial prediction of the Messiah and His victory, the first glimpse of the good news about Jesus. This term is more precise for this idea than a covenant, which is a formal promise or agreement God makes with His people; an oracle, while it can mean a prophetic message, is a broad category and not the specific label for the first gospel prophecy; and a parable, being a teaching story with a moral, does not predict a future Messiah. So protoevangelium uniquely captures the first hint of salvation announced about Jesus.*

## 9. What does the goat dedicated to the Lord symbolize about Jesus?

- A. He was the sacrifice for our sins**

*The symbol here is substitutionary atonement—the idea that Jesus dies to take away sin. In the Day of Atonement imagery, the goat dedicated to the Lord represents sin being carried away by a sacrificial act. Christians see this as pointing to Jesus, who willingly bears humanity's sins and gives His life to make forgiveness possible. So, the goat's role as a sacrifice for sin directly communicates that Jesus is the one who pays the penalty for our wrongs. The other ideas—performing miracles, being a prophet, or ruling politically—don't capture what this particular symbol conveys about Jesus.*

## 10. What did Esau promise after?

- A. He would forgive Jacob

*Esau's response shows how powerful the blessing and birthright were in the family dynamics. After Jacob, with help from Rebekah, obtained Isaac's blessing meant for Esau, Esau becomes furious and vows vengeance. He says that once their father dies, he will kill Jacob. That promise after Isaac's death explains why the correct interpretation is that Esau would kill Jacob after their father died. It's not about forgiveness, moving away, or sharing the blessing—the plan is to murder his brother once the mourning period ends. This moment highlights the serious consequences of deceit around the blessing and sets up Jacob's later flight to avoid Esau's anger.*
