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Explanations

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1. Mama listens to which family member most often?

- A. Walter

Mama's role as the family's listening center is shown by how often others bring personal concerns to her and seek guidance. Ruth, Walter's wife, comes to Mama with many day-to-day worries—about the pregnancy, their finances, and the strain in the marriage. Their kitchen conversations reveal Ruth trusting Mama for calm, practical advice and moral support, more than anyone else does. Walter often pushes his own plans and ideas, and while Mama listens, the pattern isn't the same steady, intimate exchange Ruth has with her. Beneatha debates and challenges Mama, which is more about ideas than shared personal concerns, so the strongest, most consistent listening relationship is with Ruth.

2. Why were Bobo and Willy supposed to go to Springfield?

The idea being tested is why Bobo and Willy plan to go to Springfield: to speed up the liquor license for the liquor store they're planning to invest in. In the scene, Walter and Willy are discussing starting a liquor-store business, and they believe going to the state capital will move the licensing process along more quickly than staying in Chicago. By heading to Springfield, they hope to bypass delays and get the license fast enough to start their venture. This choice highlights Walter's push for rapid, money-driven success and the plan to take decisive steps, even if it means taking risks. The trip isn't about obtaining a loan, escaping the city, or signing documents at that moment; it's specifically about shortening the time needed to secure the license.

3. The imagery in the title most closely conveys which idea?

The imagery in the title is about a dream that could wither if it isn't cared for. A raisin left in the sun dries up and shrivels, so the image suggests a dream deferred that loses vitality without nourishment, support, or effort. This metaphor comes from Langston Hughes's poem about a dream put off too long, which the play uses to show how the characters' hopes can fade if they're not nurtured. It isn't meant to be a literal river and garden, nor a simple symbol of wealth, nor a statement that someone stops dreaming entirely; it specifically points to the peril of a dream drying up without care. So the best fit is the idea of a dream that may dry up without care.

This moment reinforces the family's value that a partner isn't just about status or comfort, but about someone who truly understands and stands with you as you pursue a life you believe in. It also foreshadows ongoing tension over whether suitors can align with the Younger family's aspirations and the larger dream they're pursuing.

For Walter, the decision to move is tied to his need to prove he can provide and lead—the test of manhood that comes with taking charge and shaping the family's financial fate, even as that impulse becomes wrapped up in pride and ambition. For Beneatha, the space represents a platform for growth, education, and independence—an environment where she can pursue her dreams and define herself beyond traditional limits. For Ruth, the move promises security and stability for the upcoming baby and the family, offering a steadier, safer life than what they've endured. Other readings miss this layered meaning by treating the move as about a single issue (health, wealth, rebellion, or independence) rather than a bundle of intertwined dreams. The chosen interpretation best reflects how the house acts as a tangible goal that each character negotiates through their hopes, fears, and identity.

6. What is Walter's reaction when Beneatha says that Asagai asked her to marry him and go to Africa with him?

This shows his insecurity and belief that money equates to power and respect, not Beneatha's autonomy or her dreams. He uses humor to undermine her and steer her toward a financial solution, revealing his self-centeredness and frustration with his own stalled ambitions. That behavior fits best with the option in which he mocks her and suggests she marry a rich man, rather than offering support, remaining indifferent, or encouraging later.

7. Who is Bobo, and why is his information crucial to the turning point?

That moment exposes the fragility of Walter's plan and forces the entire family to confront the consequences of trust and pride. It also pushes them to rethink their future—Mama still uses part of the money for a home, while the others must grapple with what they'll do next in the face of disappointment and a changed path. Bobo's disclosure is the turning point because it shifts the story from hopeful scheming to the harsh reality that the money is gone.

Her role is less about managing outside obligations or delegating everything to others, and more about guiding with ethics and keeping the dream alive, even in the face of risk and hardship.

Mama's dream of a place with a garden, Walter's longing to provide for his family, and Beneatha's pursuit of education all mirror a belief that personal worth isn't earned only through wealth, but through opportunities that affirm their humanity. These efforts are powerful precisely because they persist in the face of racism, poverty, and rigid social barriers. Choosing a statement that says homeownership is irrelevant, or that it guarantees immediate success, or that dignity is lost with homeownership, misses how the play portrays dignity as something that can be built and defended through purposeful actions. Ownership and education together affirm dignity by signaling belonging, responsibility, and potential, even when outcomes aren't guaranteed.*

10. How does the plant motif reappear as the family prepares to move?

The plant endures because they nurture it, just as they strive to hold onto their hope for a better future. So this choice best captures the idea that the dream persists through move and uncertainty. The other options don't fit the plant's role: it isn't portrayed as fading away, becoming a wealth symbol, or being ignored during the move.
