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Explanations

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1. Which statement about U.S. social mobility is supported by the material?

- A. The United States has more social mobility than most other wealthy countries.

Understanding cross-country mobility means looking at how easily people move up or down the income ladder compared with their parents, using measures like how much a child's income percentile changes or how strongly parents' income predicts children's outcomes. The material presents findings that the United States' mobility level is roughly on par with other wealthy nations. In practical terms, this means that, when you compare the U.S. to its peers, the overall ability to move up or down income strata is not clearly higher or lower on average. There are nuances and disparities within the country (such as racial or educational differences), but the broad cross-national pattern shown in the material is one of similarity rather than exceptional advantage or disadvantage. So the statement that the United States has about the same mobility as most other wealthy countries is the best-supported conclusion.

The main idea being tested is how the consensus (functionalist) view explains social inequality. Functionalists see society as a system of interrelated parts that work together to maintain stability. In this view, unequal distribution of rewards and resources serves a function: it motivates people to fill different, sometimes more demanding roles, helps organize tasks, and supports social order. So the statement that inequality serves an important societal function best captures this perspective, because it directly expresses the functionalist claim that stratification has a purpose for society. The other statements reflect views more associated with conflict theory: that inequality is inherently unjust, that abolishing private property is necessary for change, or that class conflict drives social change. These ideas emphasize domination, struggle, and radical change rather than the stabilizing function that functionalists highlight.

The trend being tested is how nonfamily households have grown relative to traditional family households over time. In recent decades, data show a steady increase in these kinds of arrangements, while married-couple households have declined as a share of all households. This shift reflects factors like people marrying later, more divorces, people choosing to live alone, and economic or lifestyle reasons that favor nonfamily living situations. The other options don't fit because they either state the opposite (a decline in nonfamily households), claim no change, or describe a pattern—extended-family households—that isn't the same as nonfamily households.

This item tests how wage conditions and family structure influence economic advancement for people in poverty. When the minimum wage falls, earnings for low-wage workers decline in real terms, making it harder to meet basic needs, save, and invest in skills or training that could lead to higher wages. These income limits compress opportunities for upward mobility and can trap families in low-paying jobs. At the same time, more single-parent households mean a single income supports the family, which raises financial strain, increases reliance on affordable childcare, and reduces the ability to work flexible hours or pursue education or job training. This dynamic can limit labor market advancement and long-term economic progress for the household. Together, these factors compound one another, creating greater barriers to movement out of poverty than either factor would alone. That's why recognizing both is essential to understanding economic advancement today. The other options miss one of these dimensions or overlook the combined effect, and thus don't fit as well.

In family sociology, many social and economic processes unfold within the household because this is the place where resources are pooled and decisions are made jointly. Studying at this level reveals how household bargaining, savings, debt, and transfers to children shape outcomes for family members as a group, not just for individuals in isolation. While workplaces, cities, or nations are important for understanding broader structures and contexts, they miss the everyday interactions and resource-sharing dynamics that drive these family-level processes. So, the household is the most informative unit for many social and economic processes in this field.

Older siblings are often socialized to take on a protective and supervisory role within the family. That protective, guiding function is a common way families rely on the elder child, reinforcing responsibilities that support the younger siblings and the household as a whole. So, watching out for the younger sibling best illustrates the typical expectation placed on an older sibling. While other duties like helping with finances or planning outings can occur, they are not the primary, defining role tied to being the elder child, and making legal decisions isn't appropriate for a sibling. This concept shows how family norms shape who does what, with older siblings often serving as guardians and mentors within the family system.

The primary function of adoption and foster care is to place children with families, either temporarily or permanently, to ensure they have a safe and nurturing home. Foster care acts as a temporary arrangement while a child's situation at home is addressed, with goals like reunification with birth families when possible or transition to a permanent arrangement if reunification isn't feasible. Adoption provides a permanent legal bond and home for a child when returning to the birth family isn't possible, giving them long-term stability and care. This isn't about providing financial support to single parents, which is handled by separate welfare programs. It isn't about regulating marriage norms, which concerns broader social rules rather than child placement. And while courts may be involved in guardianship decisions, the core aim is not court authority alone but ensuring that children are placed with caring families, either temporarily or permanently.

Achievement scores measure what a student knows, but whether a student stays in college and completes it depends a lot on resources and opportunities outside the classroom. Socioeconomic status captures the family and community resources—money for tuition and fees, stable housing, access to tutoring and test-prep, college counseling, reliable internet, time for study, and social networks that provide information and support. When a student has more of these resources, they're better positioned to enroll in college, persist through challenges, and finish, even if their test scores are similar to someone with fewer resources. The blog highlights this parity between SES and achievement scores in predicting college completion, underscoring how financial and social capital can enable or impede persistence. The other options don't fit as consistently. School size can influence the learning environment but doesn't reliably predict college completion to the same degree as SES. Neighborhood safety affects daily life and school engagement, but it's not the broad resource factor that explains access and persistence in the same way SES does. Parental education level is related to SES, but it's part of that broader socioeconomic picture rather than a separate predictor highlighted independently in the post.

Among wealthy families, marriages function to create and strengthen alliances between powerful kin—connecting networks, consolidating influence, and maintaining status. In contrast, among poorer families, marriage tends to center on securing essential resources, particularly labor, to survive in a precarious economic situation. The option that best captures this is the pairing of wealthy with connecting and poor with labor because it aligns with how marriage serves as alliance-building for the affluent and as a means of obtaining labor and support for survival for the less well-off. The other choices mix up these functions or misidentify the social groups, which doesn't fit the observed patterns of family strategy across classes.

Origins of elements in Black family structure are shaped by the United States' historical and social context rather than being handed down intact from African traditions. The material shows how enslaved people faced disruption, surveillance, and economic hardship, which fostered adaptive patterns such as flexible household roles, strong extended kin networks, and support systems that developed in response to those conditions. These features reflect transformation and adaptation to new environments and institutions, not a direct inheritance of African cultural forms. So, the statement that they are not inherited from African traditions best fits because it emphasizes how historical experience in the U.S. reshaped family life, even while African heritage remains influential in other ways.
