In contrast, without adequate critical challenge, artists might settle for mediocrity, leading to a potential decline in the richness and depth of artistic endeavors. Thus, the idea that less harsh critics could diminish artistic integrity resonates with the notion of accountability in creative fields, reinforcing the importance of rigorous critique in fostering genuine artistic evolution.
