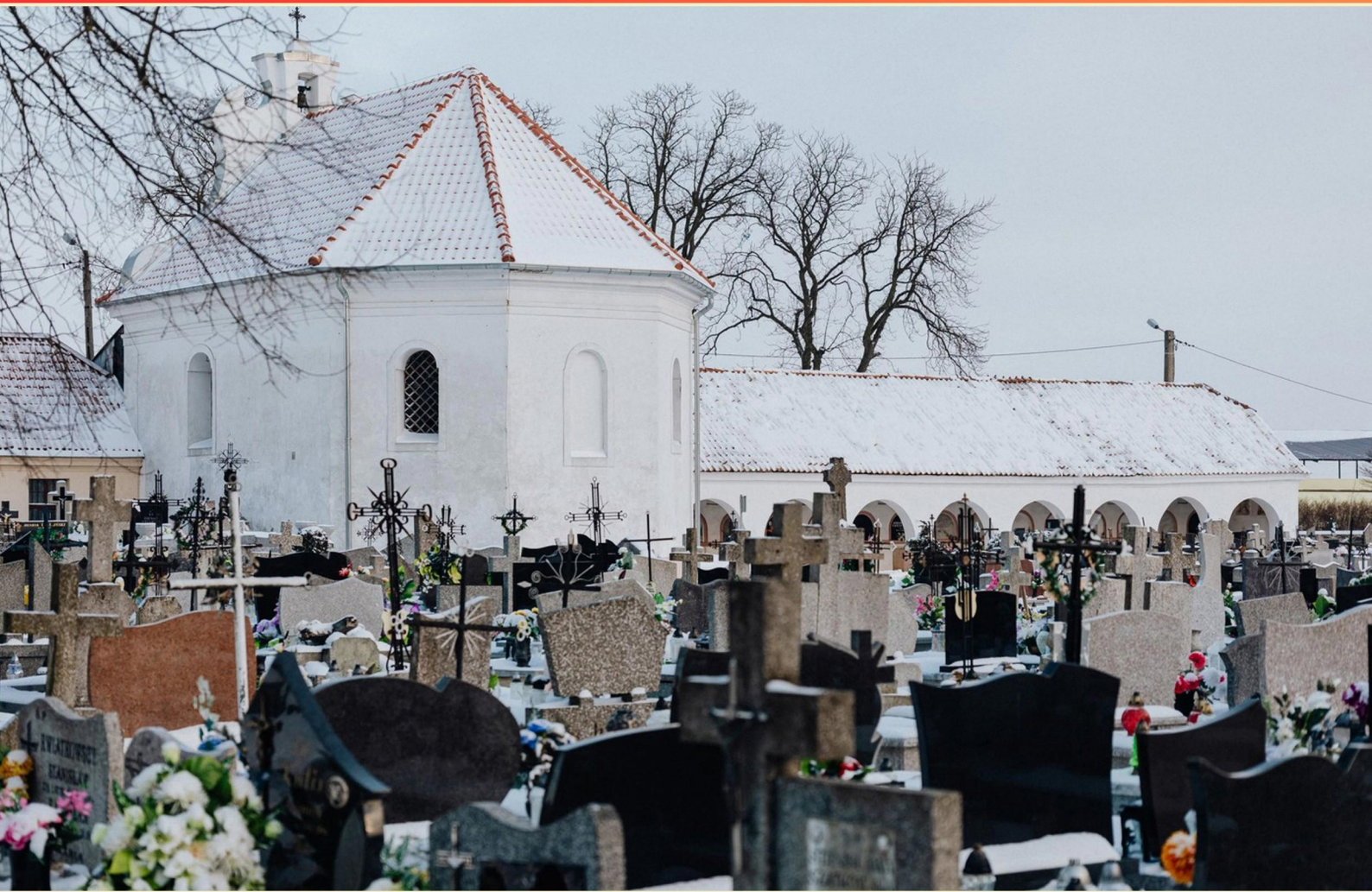

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Explanations

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1. Which term denotes the sacred image used in worship?

- A. INRI
- B. IHS
- C. Divine Liturgy
- D. Icon**

The term denotes a sacred image used in worship. An icon is a religious image—often of Christ, the Virgin Mary, or a saint—created to aid prayer, contemplation, and devotion. In many Christian traditions, icons are treated as windows to the divine, objects of reverence that help the faithful focus prayer and meditate on holy truths. This distinguishes icons from other terms in the options: INRI is the Latin inscription placed above Jesus on the cross, not a worship image; IHS is a Christogram, a monogram representing Jesus rather than a devotional image; and Divine Liturgy is the name of the worship service itself, not an image. Thus, the sacred image used in worship is an icon. If relevant to funeral planning, icons may be included as part of rites to reflect the family's faith and provide a focal point for prayer during services.

In Jewish burial terminology, a coffin made entirely of wood with no metal parts is called an aron. The word aron means ark or chest and is used to describe a simple wooden casket used for burial, aligning with values of humility and equality in death by avoiding metal hardware. The other options refer to unrelated items: a Menorah is a ceremonial lamp, a Mogen David is the Star of David symbol, and a Rabbi is a religious teacher or leader.

3. Which term best describes the People's response in worship?

The key idea here is the way the assembly responds with a brief, affirmative expression in worship. An acclamation is a quick, enthusiastic outburst of praise or agreement by the people—things like "Amen," "Praise the Lord," or "Hallelujah"—that follows a statement, blessing, or moment led by the officiant. It's about the congregation's immediate, communal response rather than a structured hymn or prayer. This best fits because it specifically names the act of responding with a short, vocal declaration of praise or assent. Doxology refers to a formal hymn of praise to God, often a set sung praise rather than a general response. A canticle is a specific scripted hymn or song, usually drawn from Scripture, used in liturgy. A litany is a longer, call-and-response prayer with repeated petitions. None of these capture the everyday, succinct response described by acclamation as clearly as the term acclamation does.

The focus here is on the feature used for kneeling and prayer during a viewing or funeral rite. The term that fits this description is prayer rail. A prayer rail is a railing placed near the casket or in the service space that provides support for mourners as they kneel to pray, making it the specific architectural element referenced. The other terms describe different things: a wake service is the visitation or vigil, a scapular is a devotional garment, and a sanctuary is the sacred area of worship. So the railing used for kneeling and prayer is the prayer rail.

In this context, gender-specific terms drawn from Hebrew-derived funeral etiquette are used to refer to the deceased. The prefix indicates the person's gender: "Bat" denotes a female, while "Bar" denotes a male. Therefore, a deceased female is referred to as a Bat Minen, signaling femininity in the reference. The other terms don't serve this purpose: Bimah is the platform in a synagogue, not a designation for a person, and Makura-gyo is a Japanese Buddhist memorial practice, not applicable here. So Bat Minen is the appropriate term for a deceased woman.

6. What is the symbolic cloth placed over the casket in the narthex signifying that all people are created equal?

The concept being tested is the pall—the cloth placed over the casket. It symbolizes that in God's sight, all people are equal in death, regardless of wealth, status, or background. Prayer cards, the rosary, and the sanctuary are not related to this covering or its symbolic meaning: prayer cards are keepsakes, the rosary is a devotional object, and the sanctuary is the church area, not a covering for the coffin.

7. The Burial Society of synagogue members who care for the deceased is called?

Chevra Kadisha is the group of synagogue members who take care of the dead with reverence, handling the body for burial. This burial society performs the taharah (ritual purification), dresses the deceased in simple shrouds, and arranges or supports the burial in accordance with Jewish practice. The term itself means "holy society," reflecting their dedicated, communal service to the deceased and their families. Kever refers to the grave or burial site itself, not the people who prepare the body. Yizkor is the memorial service held to remember the deceased, and Kaddish is the mourner's prayer recited in memory of the dead.

8. The Great Panachida refers to which of the following?

The Great Panachida is a memorial service for the departed in Orthodox practice, a longer form of the Panikhida. The exact prayers and order of this service are published in the liturgical book used for worship, known as the Book of Worship. So, the Great Panachida is tied to that written source—the text and structure you would follow during the service. The other terms refer to different things: Parastas is another name for a memorial service itself, Royal Doors are part of the iconostasis, and Solea is a liturgical space or related term, not the service text.

9. Who proclaims the Sacred Scriptures during the service?

The role that proclaims the Sacred Scriptures during the service is the lector (also called the reader). This minister publicly reads the assigned Scripture passages from the Lectionary, delivering them clearly for the congregation as part of the Liturgy of the Word. The Gospel is typically proclaimed by the priest or deacon, but the other readings come from the lector. The other items listed aren't readers: INRI is the inscription on the cross, Holy Water is used for blessing, and an Icon is a sacred image used in worship.

10. What is the hand-sewn white linen shroud in which the deceased are dressed called?

A. Tachrichim

B. Tallith

C. Shomer

D. Menorah

In Jewish funeral practice, the deceased are dressed in tachrichim—the white linen shroud used for burial. These garments are simple and hand-sewn, symbolizing equality before God and humility in death; they're often composed of a basic linen robe (and sometimes a belt) and are used after the body is washed. A tallith is a prayer shawl worn by the living, a shomer is the guardian who watches the body, and a menorah is a lampstand.
