This distinction makes factorial a fundamental concept in combinatorics, particularly in permutations and combinations, where arrangements of items need to be calculated. The other options do not accurately represent this definition. The sum refers to the addition of numbers rather than their product. Integral usually pertains to calculus and areas under curves or summing infinitely many infinitesimal quantities, while product generally refers to multiplication but does not specify the sequence of whole numbers leading up to a certain integer. Therefore, factorial encompasses the specific process of multiplying a sequence of numbers down to one, making it the correct answer.

The establishment of citizenship for those born in the U.S. is addressed by the 14th Amendment, the right for women to vote was accomplished through the 19th Amendment, and the prohibition of racial discrimination in voting pertains to the Voting Rights Act of 1965. Therefore, the focus of the 13th Amendment remains solely on the abolition of slavery.
