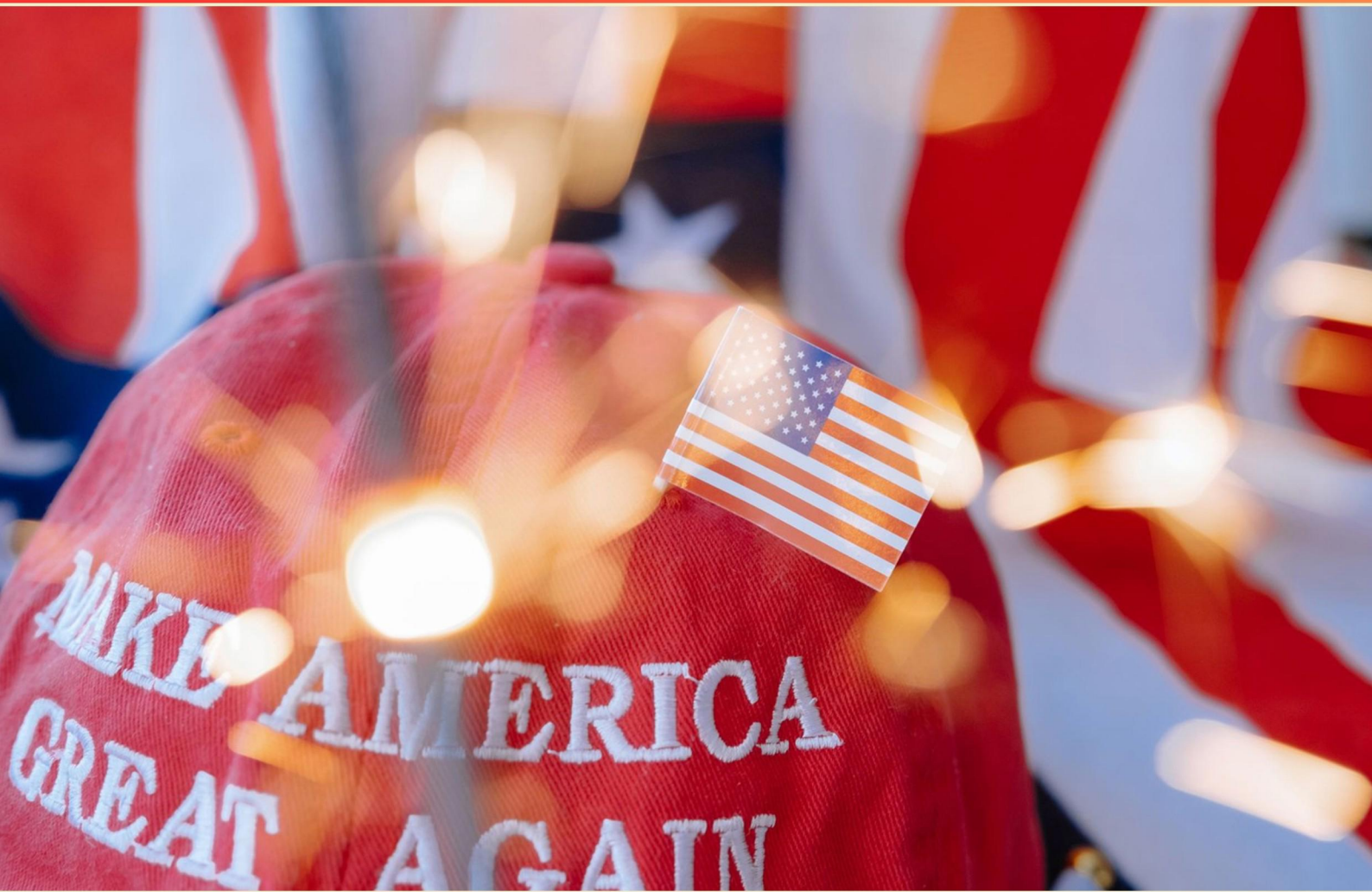

The 13th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, ratified in December 1865, abolished slavery and involuntary servitude, except as punishment for a crime.
