1. The Thread That Runs So True features which character?

- A. Simon Wheeler**

This question tests your ability to identify the central figure in the story *The Thread That Runs So True*. The tale centers on Guy Hawkins, whose actions illustrate the idea of a “thread that runs true”—a steadfast, loyal, and honest character under pressure. The title’s metaphor points to his reliability and moral consistency as the narrative unfolds, showing how true character holds together under challenges. The other names come from different stories, so they don’t align with the focus of this particular piece.

2. The line 'Her sandwiches were cubic blocks...her pies vast plateaus' is an example of which device?

- A. Metaphor**

This line uses a metaphor. It describes the sandwiches as cubic blocks and the pies as vast plateaus, making a direct comparison by naming one thing as another without using like or as. That direct assignment of shape to food creates vivid imagery and emphasizes size and form. It isn’t a simile, since there’s no like or as, and it isn’t personification, since no human qualities are given to the foods. You could think of the language as hyperbolic in its exaggeration, but the key device here is the metaphor—the foods are being described as the shapes themselves to create a strong image.

3. Which title is a ballad among the listed works?

A ballad is a narrative poem that tells a story in a straightforward, often song-like form, using simple language and dramatic action to move the tale along. The title *A Ballad of Trees and the Master* clearly identifies a poem that presents a tale through verse, focusing on events and characters rather than prose exposition. That narrative, poem-based nature is what makes it a ballad. The other options point to prose forms rather than verse: a Short Story and a Novel are written in prose, not as a poem. A Ballad as a title could be a ballad, but the given work that clearly fits the ballad form is the one titled *A Ballad of Trees and the Master*.

4. The line 'There is something about him that looks American' appears in which short story?

This line centers on how outward appearance can shape assumptions about someone's nationality, and it uses that perception to test a character's humanity in wartime. In this story, a Japanese doctor tends to a wounded American airman, and the moment someone notes that the stranger "looks American" signals the clash between who the person is by appearance and what the situation demands morally. The line sets up the tension between seeing someone as the enemy and choosing to treat him with compassion, teaching that human connection can cross national and wartime barriers. The other stories don't hinge on this kind of moment about appearance revealing nationality or the moral choice that follows, so they don't align with this line's focus.

5. Who wrote Sinners in the Hands of an Angry God?

Jonathan Edwards wrote Sinners in the Hands of an Angry God. He was a key minister and theologian during the Great Awakening in colonial America, delivering this famous sermon in 1741 in Enfield, Connecticut. The piece exemplifies his intense, fire-and-brimstone style that urged listeners to recognize their sin and seek repentance. The other names belong to different roles—Billy Sunday was a later evangelist, Washington Irving was a fiction writer, and Daniel Webster was a statesman—so Edwards is the one connected with this sermon.

6. Emily Sparks is a character in which collection?

Emily Sparks appears in Spoon River Anthology, a collection of poems spoken by the dead residents of a small town. This format features individual epitaphs that reveal each character's story, including Emily Sparks, making this collection the correct source. The other titles are different kinds of works and do not feature that character: The Thread That Runs So True is a prose rural-life book, Hiawatha's Wooing is a Longfellow poem, and The Hoosier School Master is a novel about Indiana schooling.

7. Which work is connected to a line about a father coping with aging by imagining his lineage continuing?

The main idea being tested is how a character responds to aging by envisioning continuation through his family line. In *The Baby Party*, the father confronts growing old and finds a sense of permanence by imagining his life carried on through his child. That longing for a living link to him after he's gone shows how he uses the idea of lineage to cope with aging, turning the baby at the party into a symbol of legacy and continuity. The other works explore different themes—one centers on leadership and loss, another on a plot involving a mule, and another around hospital and family dynamics—so they don't hinge on a father's need to preserve his name or legacy through offspring.

8. Selina Peake is a character in which work?

The idea here is recognizing when a story or work is named after its central character. When a character's name is also the title, it points to that work as the source featuring that character. Selina Peake is the namesake of the work, so the piece in which she appears is the one titled *Selina Peake*. The other names refer to different figures or works: *Nokomis* comes from a different tale about Hiawatha, *Jim Elliot* is the name of a real missionary associated with biographical writings, and *Simonides* is an ancient Greek poet. So the work that centers on Selina Peake is the one that bears her name.

9. Which term refers to a compact statement expressing a truth?

A compact statement expressing a truth is an aphorism. An aphorism is a brief, memorable observation about life or human nature that conveys a general truth in a single, sharp line. It aims to reveal insight rather than teach a rule or tell a story. By contrast, an epigram is also brief but leans toward wit or satire; a maxim states a rule of conduct or principle; and a parable uses a short story to teach a moral. For these reasons, the best fit for a concise truth expressed in a single thought is an aphorism. For example: "Life is really simple, but we insist on making it complicated."

10. Who wrote Nuts for Skeptics to Crack?

Identifying the author relies on recognizing the type of writing and the author's usual voice. A line or title like "Nuts for Skeptics to Crack" sounds like a bold, persuasive piece aimed at addressing doubt and steering readers toward faith—traits common in the work of a famous evangelist. Billy Sunday was known for delivering punchy, sermon-like writings and public talks designed to challenge skepticism and urge conversion. His style is memorable and direct, often using vivid, practical imagery to make a point quickly. Elizabeth Scott Stam wrote devotional and missionary writings, which tend to be more reflective or biographical rather than exhortational sermons. Robert Frost and Marianne Moore are renowned poets with distinctive literary styles—Frost for his narrative lyricism rooted in nature and place, Moore for precise, sometimes ironic diction and form. Their works don't typically resemble the sort of provocative, audience-facing tract suggested by that title. So the best fit is Billy Sunday, because the tone and purpose align with his evangelistic, persuasive style aimed at skeptics.
