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Explanations

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1. Find the slope of the line passing through the points (2, 3) and (5, 11).

A. 8/3

B. 3

C. 5/3

D. -8/3

Slope is found using rise over run: $m = (\text{change in } y) / (\text{change in } x)$. For the points (2, 3) and (5, 11), the change in y is $11 - 3 = 8$ and the change in x is $5 - 2 = 3$, so the slope is $8/3$. The line rises as x increases, so the slope is positive, which matches how the line moves from left to right. The other options would require different changes in y for the same change in x (for example, a slope of 3 would need a rise of 9 over a run of 3, and a negative slope would imply a decrease in y as x increases), which isn't the case here.

2. Which medieval European system is defined by relationships between lords and vassals?

A. Feudalism

B. Chivalry

C. Serfdom

D. Monasticism

Feudalism is the system defined by the exchange of land for service and loyalty between a lord and his vassal. In this arrangement, a lord grants a piece of land, or a fief, to a vassal, who in return pledges military support, advice, and various other duties. The vassal may even grant portions of land to lesser vassals, creating a hierarchical network of obligations that structuring power, protection, and governance across territories. This relationship between lords and vassals—centered on land tenure and reciprocal duties—gives the medieval social and political order its distinctive framework. Chivalry, by contrast, is a code of conduct for knights; serfdom concerns peasants bound to the land; and monasticism refers to religious life in monasteries.

3. Find the area of a rectangle with length 9 and width 4.

A. 36

B. 32

C. 45

D. 54

The area of a rectangle comes from multiplying its length by its width. With a length of 9 and a width of 4, you multiply 9 by 4 to get 36. So the area is 36 square units. The other numbers come from multiplying different dimensions (for example, 9 by 5 gives 45, or 9 by 6 gives 54, or 8 by 4 gives 32), which don't match the given length and width.

4. If a train travels 120 miles at 60 mph, how many hours does the trip take?

- A. 1
- B. 2**
- C. 3
- D. 4

Time equals distance divided by speed. If the train covers 60 miles in one hour, it travels 60 miles per hour. To go 120 miles at the same speed, you need twice as long. Do the math: $120 \div 60 = 2$. So the trip takes 2 hours. The units line up because miles divided by miles per hour leaves hours.

5. What is log base 10 of 10000?

- A. 3
- B. 4**
- C. 2
- D. 5

The main idea is that a logarithm answers the question: to what power must the base be raised to obtain the given number? For a base of 10, you're looking for the exponent x such that $10^x = 10000$. Since 10^4 equals 10000, the exponent is 4. So $\log_{10}(10000) = 4$. You can see why by comparing nearby powers: 10^3 is 1000 and 10^5 is 100000, placing 10000 exactly at the fourth power of 10.

6. A circle has radius 7. What is its circumference?

- A. 7π
- B. 14π**
- C. 2π
- D. 28π

The distance around a circle (the circumference) is tied to its size by the formula $C = 2\pi r$, where r is the radius. If the radius is 7, plug that in: $C = 2\pi(7) = 14\pi$. So the circumference is 14π . You can also see this using diameter, since diameter is $2r = 14$, and $C = \pi d = \pi(14) = 14\pi$. The other numbers would come from different radii or diameters (for example, 7π would come from a radius of 3.5, or a diameter of 7; 2π would come from a radius of 1; 28π would come from a radius of 14).

7. The Orinoco River flows through which continent?

- A. Africa
- B. Asia
- C. South America**
- D. Europe

The main idea here is geography and map literacy: knowing where major rivers flow on the globe. The Orinoco runs across northern South America, primarily through Venezuela with a portion in Colombia, and it drains into the Atlantic Ocean. Because of its location, it belongs to the continent of South America. The other continents—Africa, Asia, and Europe—have their own major rivers and do not include the Orinoco.

8. Katrina primarily affected which two states along the Gulf Coast?

- A. Louisiana and Mississippi**
- B. Texas and Louisiana
- C. Mississippi and Alabama
- D. Florida and Alabama

Katrina's impact was defined by where the flooding and destruction were most severe along the Gulf Coast. The storm made landfall in southeastern Louisiana, and the catastrophic flooding of New Orleans came from levee failures in Louisiana. It then tracked across the region, delivering a powerful storm surge and damage along the Mississippi coast, especially in coastal towns like Biloxi and Gulfport. Because the heaviest damage and most significant consequences occurred in Louisiana and Mississippi, those are the two states most affected. While other Gulf states felt effects, they did not experience the same level of devastation as Louisiana and Mississippi.

9. Which sentence demonstrates correct parallel structure?

- A. Neither the manager nor the employees were ready.**
- B. Neither the manager nor the employees was ready.
- C. Neither the manager or the employees were ready.
- D. Neither manager nor employees were ready.

Parallel structure with correlative pairs means the joined parts must mirror each other in form, and the verb should agree with the subject closer to it. In this sentence, the two subjects are the manager and the employees, both in noun form, and the verb should reflect the number of the nearer subject. The nearer subject is employees, which is plural, so the correct form is were. The phrase uses neither... nor, which is the standard pairing for this kind of construction, and keeps the parallel noun phrases intact. That balance makes the sentence sound natural and grammatically consistent. The other options break this pattern in a couple of ways: using was would mismatch the plural nearer subject, altering agreement; using or instead of nor disrupts the proper correlative pairing; and omitting the article in the second part tends to weaken the parallel rhythm and clarity.

10. Who became president of the United States after the death of Franklin Roosevelt?

- A. Dwight D. Eisenhower
- B. Harry S. Truman**
- C. John F. Kennedy
- D. Richard Nixon

When a president dies in office, the vice president steps in to become the president. Franklin D. Roosevelt died in 1945, and his vice president, Harry S. Truman, immediately assumed the presidency. He led the country through the final months of World War II and began shaping postwar policy. The other individuals listed later became president in different years, but the immediate successor after Roosevelt's death was Truman.
