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Explanations

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1. Precisionism is best described as?

- A. One of the first modernist art movements in the United States, celebrating the new American landscape in essential geometric forms.

Precisionism is an early American modernist movement that portrays the modern industrial landscape in precise geometric forms. It emerged in the United States in the 1910s–1920s and focuses on subjects like factories, bridges, skyscrapers, and other machine-age scenes, rendered with sharp edges, smooth surfaces, and a restrained, often cool palette. The aim is to convey the clarity, order, and power of modern American industry, giving these subjects a sense of permanence and monumental quality through simplified, essential shapes. This description—one of the first U.S. modernist movements expressed through exact geometric form and industrial subjects—best captures the essence of Precisionism. It differs from Baroque drama, late Renaissance techniques, or ancient Egyptian methods, which emphasize different aesthetics and subjects.

Cubism is defined by breaking down the picture plane into geometric facets that reveal multiple viewpoints at once. Artists like Picasso and Braque shattered objects into interlocking planes and reassembled them on a flat surface, so the viewer sees the subject from several angles in a single image. This approach moves away from a single, lifelike perspective and creates a sense of depth through fractured, overlapping facets on the canvas. Representational realism aims for accurate, life-like depiction, which is the opposite of what Cubism emphasizes. Decorative patterns can appear in some works but aren't what Cubism is fundamentally about. Motion through blur evokes other eras and styles, not the core Cubist aim of reconstructing form from multiple perspectives on a flat plane.

The main idea here is that the Interstate Highway Act created a national system of highways. It authorized the construction of thousands of miles of safe, high-speed, limited-access roads designed to connect major cities across the United States and to improve both civilian travel and military mobility. The system eventually totaled about 41,000 miles, funded and standardized by the federal government to ensure consistency and nationwide reach. This is distinct from a transcontinental railroad network, which is a different historical transportation project, or a nationwide electric grid or a network of deep-water ports, which are separate kinds of infrastructure.

4. The collapsible metal tube for carrying paint was invented by which person?

A key idea here is how packaging innovations transformed art practice. The collapsible metal paint tube made it possible to carry and dispense paint easily, keep it from drying out, and squeeze out just what you need. The inventor of this practical, portable solution is John Goffe Rand. In the early 1840s he patented a collapsible metal tube with a cap that could be squeezed to release paint, enabling artists to work outdoors and travel with supplies more conveniently. This simple idea had a huge impact on painting, especially for traveling artists and later movements, because it replaced bulky, difficult-to-use packaging with a convenient and reusable container. George Eastman is known for developing roll film and modern photography, Winslow Homer was a renowned painter but not the inventor of the paint tube, and Thomas Edison is famous for innovations in electricity and related technologies.

Cubism reshapes space by flattening the image and showing multiple angles at once. It treats the picture plane as the plane itself, breaking subjects into geometric facets and rejecting a single illusion of depth. That combination—breaking down what you see into interlocking forms and presenting several viewpoints on a flat surface—is what defines the movement and distinguishes it from purely realistic rendering or from color-focused styles. While later Cubism did experiment with brighter tones and collage, the essential idea is the transfer of form onto a plane and the rejection of traditional illusionistic depth. Hyperrealistic detail aims for precise lifelike rendering, which Cubism moves away from. Similarly, ultra-vibrant color is not the defining feature of Cubism, and non-traditional materials in sculpture point to other movements or approaches.

An oculus is the architectural term for a circular opening at the top of a dome. It directly evokes an eye—Latin for eye is oculus—and its function is to let light (and sometimes a glimpse of the sky) into the space, much like how eyes let light into vision. A classic example is the Pantheon's oculus in Rome, which creates dramatic illumination inside the dome. The other terms don't describe this feature: a rotunda refers to the round building or hall itself, cristallo means crystal, and Benin Bronzes are a group of West African metal artworks. So the circular dome opening named for the eye is the oculus.

7. The Benin plaque with oba is associated with which ethnic group and what is its approximate date?

The plaques come from the Benin Kingdom tradition created by the Edo people in what is now southern Nigeria. They typically depict the oba, the king, with attendants and scenes from court life, and were produced during the height of the Benin Empire in the 16th to 17th centuries. That combination—Edo (Benin) makers and a dating around the 16th–17th centuries—best fits the well-known Benin plaque with the oba. The Yoruba and Igbo are different groups with their own distinct art histories, and the other date ranges don't align with the era most closely associated with these Benin bronzes.

Relief sculpture is defined by forms that are attached to and project from a flat background. The figure or scenes are not freestanding; they rely on a background plane and can be created by carving into that background or by molding pieces that are then affixed to it. The depth of projection can vary, giving us high relief with strong, deep figures that stand out, or low relief with shallow, barely-there forms. This distinction from a completely free-standing sculpture helps explain why the description of bonding molded pieces to a solid, planar background, with options for high or low relief, matches relief sculpture.

9. The Horse in Motion was created by which photographer?

*Sequential photography that captures movement frame by frame is what this question tests. Eadweard Muybridge created *The Horse in Motion* by lining up a row of cameras along a track and triggering them as a horse ran by, producing a rapid sequence of poses. When these images are played in order, they reveal the horse's gait and helped settle debates about whether all four hooves leave the ground during movement. Muybridge's multi-camera, sequential approach was foundational for later motion pictures. In contrast, Marey worked with chronophotography using single devices, the Lumière brothers are known for pioneers of projected cinema, and Ansel Adams is famed for landscape photography rather than motion studies. So the photographer behind *The Horse in Motion* is Eadweard Muybridge.*

10. Which paint medium allows layering and crisp lines?

Oil paint stays workable for a long time, so you can blend and refine edges and build up multiple thin layers (glazes) to achieve depth while preserving crisp, controlled lines. The slow drying gives you time to sharpen edges and revisit details without lifting earlier work. By contrast, watercolor tends to bleed and soften edges, acrylic dries quickly (making precise lines harder without special techniques), and tempera dries almost instantly and doesn't glaze well. So the combination of extended work time and easy edge control makes oil the best fit for layering and crisp lines.
