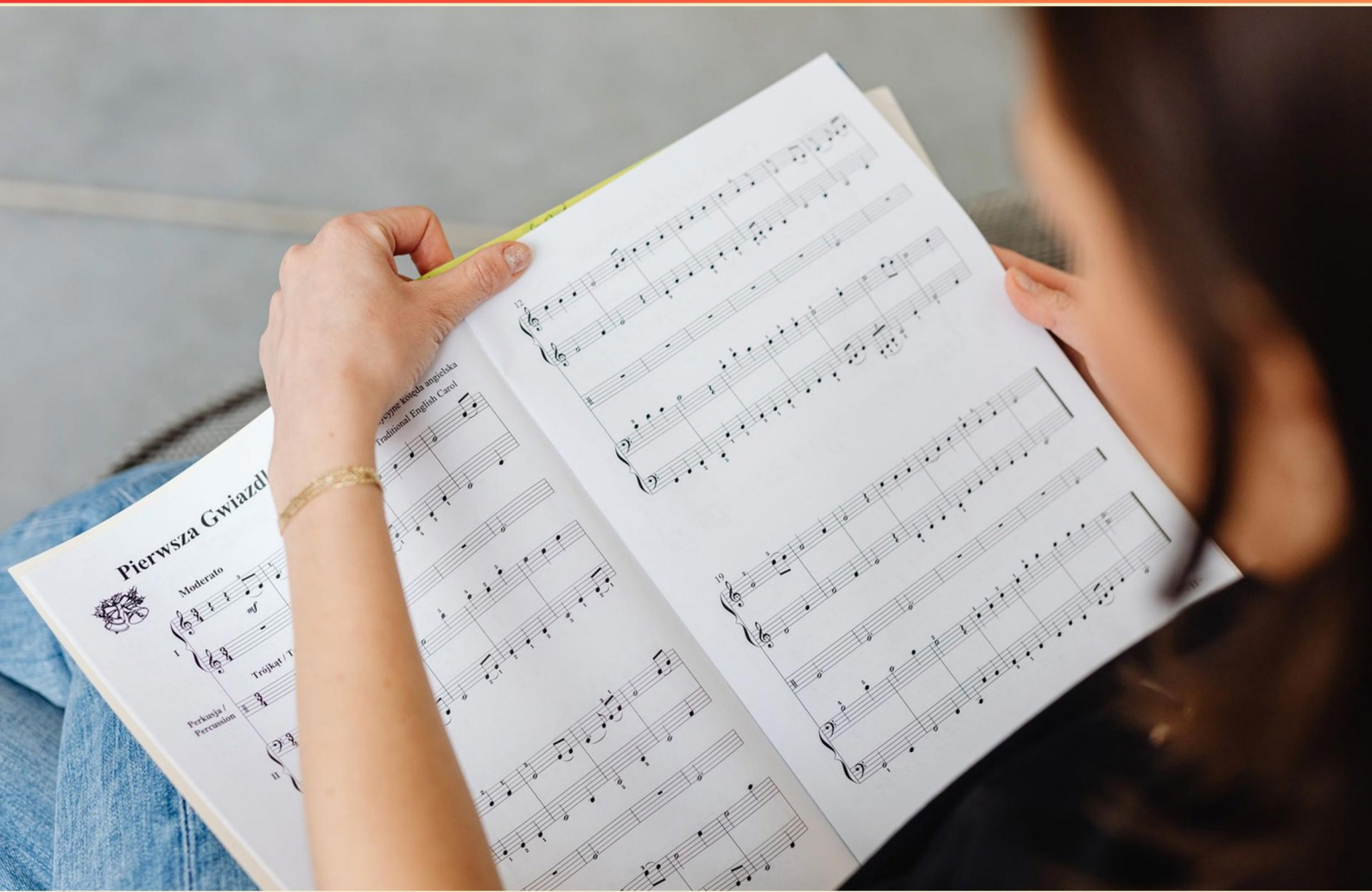

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## **Explanations**

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### 1. Which statement about the minor scale's half-step locations is accurate?

- A. Between  $\hat{1}$  and  $\hat{2}$ ,  $\hat{3}$  and  $\hat{4}$ , and  $\hat{6}$  and  $\hat{7}$
- B. Between  $\hat{2}$  and  $\hat{3}$ ,  $\hat{5}$  and  $\hat{6}$ , and  $\hat{7}$  and  $\hat{8}$

*In a minor scale, where half steps occur depends on which form you're using. The natural minor pattern is Whole–Half–Whole–Whole–Half–Whole–Whole, so the half steps are between the second and third degrees and between the fifth and sixth degrees. If you raise the seventh degree to create the harmonic minor, you also get a half step between the seventh and eighth degrees. So the accurate statement is that half steps occur between 2–3, 5–6, and 7–8, with 7–8 not being a half step in natural minor. This captures both the natural and the harmonic minor adjustments.*

### 2. Which scale degree is often referred to as the root or tonic?

*In tonal music, the first degree of the scale is the tonic, the note that acts as the tonal center and home base for the key. It's called the root because the tonic triad is built on this degree, and melodies and harmonies gravitate toward it, giving a sense of rest and resolution. The other degrees have distinct roles—second degree is the supertonic, seventh degree is the leading tone, and fifth degree is the dominant—yet none function as the central resting point like the first degree. So the scale degree referred to as the root or tonic is the first scale degree.*

*Chordophones are instruments whose sound comes from vibrating strings. The string itself vibrates and is set into motion by plucking, bowing, or striking, producing the musical tone. Examples include guitars (plucked), violins (bowed), and harps, as well as pianos where the strings are struck by hammers inside. The other families produce sound in different ways: aerophones by vibrating air, membranophones by vibrating membranes, and electrophones by electronic means. So the description that best fits chordophones is instruments with strings that are plucked, bowed, or struck.*

*Brass instruments produce sound by buzzing the lips into a mouthpiece, and pitch is changed by lengthening the air column with valves or slides. The trumpet fits this idea: it's made of brass, you buzz into its mouthpiece, and you alter notes with three valves that route air through more tubing and into a bell. The other items aren't brass: timpani are percussion drums struck with mallets, marimba is a wooden percussion keyboard instrument, and the piano is a keyboard instrument whose sound comes from hammers striking strings inside. So among common instruments listed, the trumpet is the brass one.*

**5. Polymeter is defined as which of the following?**

*Polymeter is when two or more meters operate simultaneously. Each part or instrument keeps its own metric structure, so you might hear a 3/4 pattern layered with a 4/4 pattern at the same time. They align only at points dictated by the least common multiple of their beat counts—for example, 3/4 over 4/4 line up every 12 quarter notes (four measures of 3/4 equal three measures of 4/4). This simultaneous use of different meters creates a layered, cross-rhythmic feel. The other ideas describe different concepts: alternating meters would mean switching between meters rather than running them together; syncopation is about shifting accents within a single meter; tempo changes within a measure involve changing speed, not changing the underlying meter.*

**6. What does adagio mean?**

*Adagio means a slow, relaxed tempo in music, played with ease and lyrical expression. The term comes from Italian, literally suggesting a leisurely pace. In practice it is slower than Andante but not as slow as Largo, giving a gentle, expansive feel that suits long, singing phrases. While exact BPM can vary, the idea is to approach the music with a calm, expressive delivery rather than speed. You'll often see adagio used with additional character markings like cantabile (singing) to emphasize the musical line at this slow tempo.*

*Key defines the tonal center and the web of pitch relationships that give a piece its sense of home. It establishes the scale used (major or minor), the pitches that feel connected in that musical space, and the set of chords built from those pitches that guide melodies and harmonies. This description—"the world of pitch relationships within which a piece or substantial section of music takes place"—captures what a key is, because it centers on pitch and harmony rather than rhythm, dynamics, or form. The other elements describe timing (rhythm and tempo), loudness patterns (dynamics), or structural organization (form), none of which specify the tonal framework that determines how melodies resolve and how chords relate to a central pitch.*

## 8. How are the black keys arranged on a standard piano keyboard?

*The black keys on a standard piano appear in a repeating pattern of two, then three, across every octave. You'll find two black keys grouped together above the white keys C and D (these are C# and D#), followed by a group of three above F, G, and A (F#, G#, A#); this two-key followed by three-key sequence repeats as you move up or down the keyboard. This arrangement happens because between certain white-key notes there is a semitone gap that gets filled by a black key, while between E–F and B–C there isn't a black key at all. This pattern gives you handy landmarks to orient yourself—helping you locate notes like middle C quickly.*

## 9. What does presto mean?

*Presto means very fast. It's a tempo marking from Italian used to tell you how quickly to play, and it sits at the faster end of the common tempo range—faster than allegro and sometimes even faster than presto is called prestissimo. Remember, this is about speed, not volume; the term for playing loudly is a dynamic marking like fortissimo, not tempo. Slow and solemn point to adagio or largo, while moderate tempo is moderato, so presto accurately indicates a quick tempo.*

## 10. What is an augmented triad?

- A. A chord with two minor thirds

*An augmented triad is formed by stacking two major thirds. Start from the root, move up a major third to the middle note, then up another major third to the top note. This places the top note as an augmented fifth above the root, giving a structure of root–major third–augmented fifth (for example, C–E–G<sup>#</sup>). That's why describing it as a chord with two major thirds is the best fit. If you stacked two minor thirds you'd get a diminished triad (like C–E<sup>b</sup>–G<sup>b</sup>), and if you stacked a minor third then a major third you'd get a minor triad (C–E<sup>b</sup>–G). The lowest note is just the root, not what defines the chord type.*
