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Explanations

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1. Which statement accurately describes desert locusts?

- A. They are typically solitary and have little impact on crops.
- B. They migrate only at night and pose minimal agricultural risk.
- C. They can form swarms that cause significant agricultural damage.**
- D. They primarily feed on non-plant material.

Desert locusts can switch from solitary individuals to large, swarming groups when conditions favor rapid population growth. In the swarming phase they form dense, traveling bands that can cover huge distances and strip crops bare in a short time. That combination of coordinated movement and enormous feeding pressure is what makes their swarms so damaging to agriculture, so the statement describing them as capable of forming swarms that cause significant agricultural damage is the best fit. They are not typically solitary, they don't migrate only at night, and they feed on plant material, not non-plant matter.

2. Which statement best defines camouflage?

Camouflage is an adaptation that helps an animal go unseen by blending into its surroundings. By matching color, pattern, texture, or even behavior to the background, the organism becomes harder to detect by predators or to alert prey. This blending-in ability is what lets camouflage do its job—concealment through resemblance to the environment. The other ideas describe migration, producing light to lure prey, or growing armor, none of which capture the concealment and blending aspect that camouflage specifically refers to.

3. What is notable about the Chinese giant salamander?

The main idea here is that this salamander stands out as the largest amphibian on Earth, capable of reaching lengths close to a meter and a half to nearly two meters. That enormous size is paired with a troubling conservation status: it is critically endangered because its freshwater habitats in China are being lost or degraded, and the animals are heavily collected for food and for the pet trade. Pollution, dam construction, and habitat fragmentation further threaten populations. This combination of extreme size and severe threat makes it particularly notable. It's not venomous, so that option isn't correct.

4. Which migratory pattern describes species that spawn in freshwater after maturing in saltwater?

Anadromous describes a life cycle in which species grow up in saltwater and then migrate into freshwater to spawn. This matches the idea of maturing in the ocean and returning to freshwater to reproduce, as seen in salmon. The other terms don't describe this migratory pattern: catadromous is the reverse—mature in freshwater and spawn in saltwater; oviparous and viviparous refer to egg-laying and live birth, not migration.

5. Which statement best describes a feature of the Golden Eagle?

Large wingspan enabling soaring flight is a defining feature of the Golden Eagle. Those broad, elongated wings let the bird ride thermals and glide for long periods with minimal flapping, which helps it cover vast territories while scanning for prey from above. The plumage is not bright; the tail isn't extremely short, and while it can rise and circle in the sky, its hunting style is powered and versatile, not just a slow glide. So the best description is its impressive wingspan and soaring flight.

6. What are the characteristics that differentiate birds from other vertebrates?

Feathers, beaks, and the absence of teeth clearly set birds apart from other vertebrates. Feathers are unique among living animals and serve for insulation and, in many species, flight. Beaks—keratin-based mouthparts—and the typical loss of teeth in adults give birds a distinct oral structure compared with other vertebrate groups that retain teeth. While having a backbone is true for all vertebrates, it doesn't distinguish birds, and features like scales on the feet or living only in water aren't exclusive to birds. So this combination of feathers, beaks, and toothless mouths best captures what separates birds from their vertebrate relatives.

7. In frogs, which stage is characterized by gills?

- A. Egg stage

Gills appear during the frog's aquatic larval stage, when the animal is a tadpole. Tadpoles hatch from eggs in water and rely on gills to exchange gases as they swim with a tail. As they undergo metamorphosis, they develop legs and lungs and lose their gills, becoming adults. So the stage characterized by gills is the tadpole stage.

8. How many eggs does the American alligator female typically lay in a nest?

- A. 100-150 eggs.
- B. 1-2 eggs.
- C. 5-10 eggs.
- D. 25-60 eggs.**

Clutch size in American alligators depends on the female's size and resources, but a typical reproductive output is a relatively large clutch laid in a nest. The eggs are incubated in warm, moist vegetation, and observed clutches commonly fall in the range of about 25 to 60 eggs, which covers most natural scenarios. Therefore, 25-60 eggs is the best answer. Smaller numbers like a couple or a handful are far below what a healthy adult female can produce, while 100–150 eggs would be unusually large for this species in the wild.

9. What does 'forage' mean?

Forage means searching for and gathering food. In animal behavior, foraging describes how an organism looks for edibles and consumes them or brings them back to eat. Different species use different strategies—grazing on plants, hunting or scavenging, or picking fruits—but the common idea is obtaining nourishment. The other options describe movement or reproductive behaviors (flying in formation, nesting, migrating); they aren't about finding and collecting food, so they aren't what forage refers to.

10. Which bird is known for its distinctive red back and melodious song?

A. Red-backed fairy wren

B. Great tit

C. Woodpecker

D. Shoebill

Color and song are powerful clues for identifying birds. The Red-backed Fairy-wren stands out because the males wear a bright red back during breeding and, like many small songbirds, produces a clear, melodious song. The other options don't combine those two identifying cues: a great tit has distinctive black-and-white facial markings and yellow underparts, not a red back; a woodpecker is more known for drumming and a stout body with different color patterns; a shoebill is a large, gray, bill-heavy bird with little melodic singing. So the red-backed fairy-wren is the best match for a bird famous for its red back and its singing.
