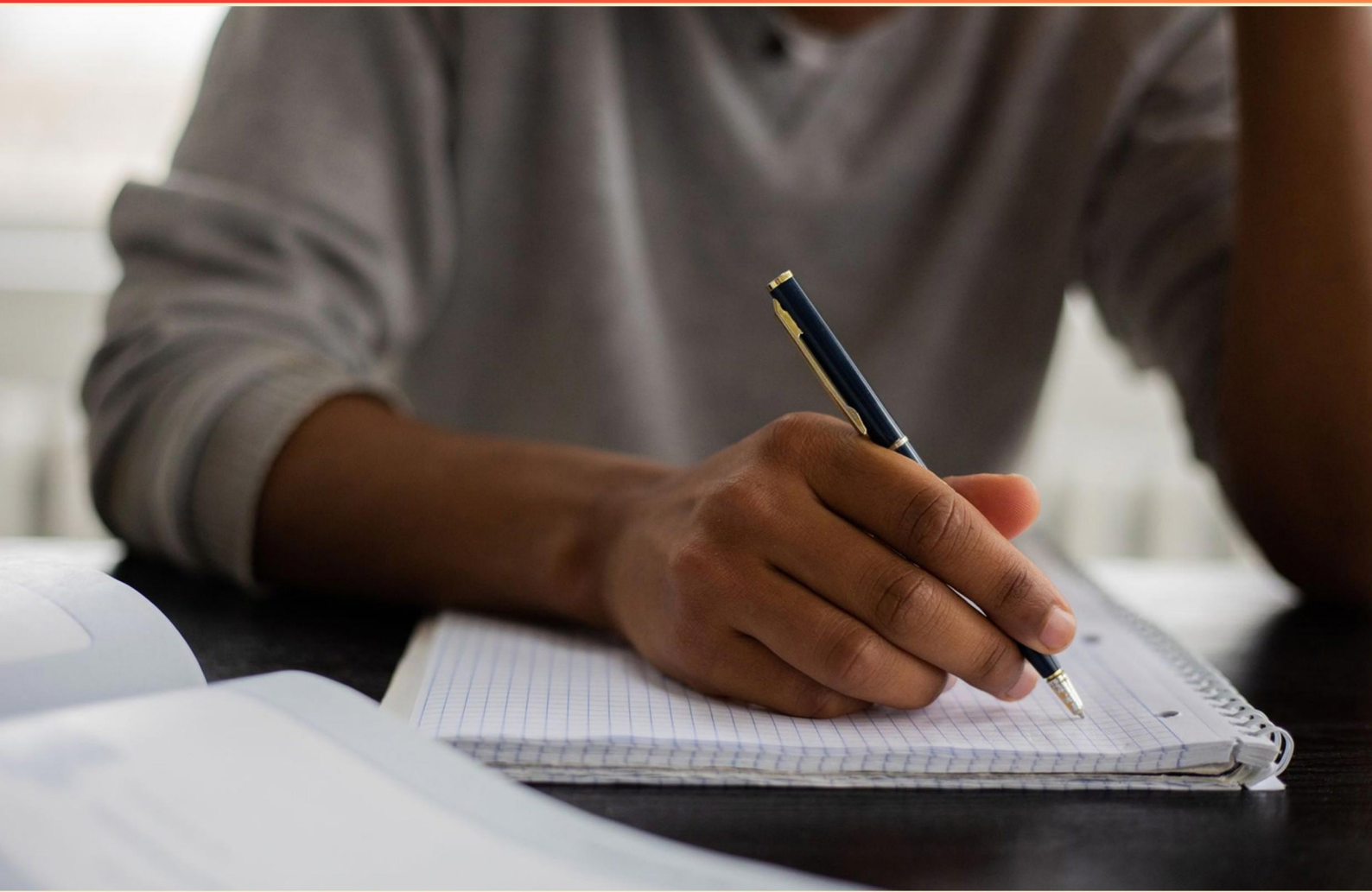

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Explanations

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1. What term refers to a tool composed of questions used to collect information from respondents?

- A. Questionnaire**
- B. Dataset

A questionnaire is a structured set of questions used to collect information from respondents. It can be delivered on paper or online and includes different formats, such as multiple-choice, rating scales, and open-ended items, to capture opinions, behaviors, or characteristics. The aim is to obtain consistent responses that can be analyzed. The responses themselves form a dataset, while the group of people who answer defines the research sample, and the analyzed results are the research findings. So, the term for a tool composed of questions used to collect information from respondents is a questionnaire.

The phrase "despite the challenges" shows they recognize obstacles but do not let them stop their support. So the best description is that they are supportive, though acknowledging obstacles. This fits because it captures both the endorsement of reform and the realism about difficulties. The other tones—opposition, lack of concern, or indifference—would contradict the explicit idea of advocating for reform.

This helps you see whether the evidence is supported, disputed, or contradicted by accepted research, and it clarifies how much confidence to place in what you're presenting. Relying on memory can lead to inaccuracies because memories fade or become distorted over time, and there's no external check to verify what you recall. Citing many irrelevant sources wastes attention and can mislead by suggesting breadth without substance. Ignoring conflicting results hides important information and prevents a fair, balanced assessment of the evidence.

Synthesis with sources means weaving evidence from multiple texts to support a debatable claim, while showing how each source contributes to the overall argument. The best choice does exactly that: it combines evidence from several sources and clearly explains how each piece backs different parts of the claim, tying them together into a coherent argument. To do this well, compare and contrast the sources, noting where they agree or conflict and why their evidence matters for your thesis. You're not just listing quotes; you're explaining how the sources relate to each other and to your argument, creating an integrated perspective. Relying on a single source limits perspective and does not demonstrate your ability to synthesize ideas. Quoting extensively without analysis shows you haven't connected the sources to your claim. Using sources only for background with no argument means there's no synthesis to begin with.

When you want to focus on a specific aspect or measure in discussion, you need a phrase that flags that particular dimension you're evaluating. For example, you might say, "We should choose the plan in terms of cost," or "The project is efficient in terms of time," which makes clear you're evaluating according to cost or time, respectively. This matches the sense of "with regard to," "with respect to," or "in relation to" because all of those introduce the topic you're considering. The other options don't convey that same targeted focus. A phrase like "in this particular situation" points to a specific instance rather than the dimension you're measuring. "Not including; apart from" is about exclusion, not about what aspect you're analyzing. And "as for" shifts to a new topic or introduces a different point, rather than specifying the aspect you're discussing. So the best choice is the one that clearly ties the discussion to a chosen aspect or metric, clarifying exactly what you're evaluating or describing.

Exclusivity is being tested here—the idea is to express that something includes only one thing and no others. The word that nails this sense is solely, which means "only" or "exclusively." Merely can mean "just" or "only" in some contexts, but it often carries a lighter or more ironic tone and isn't as strong in signaling complete exclusion. Partly means not completely; it indicates a portion rather than the whole. In excess of refers to quantity beyond a bound and has nothing to do with exclusivity. So solely is the precise choice for conveying that nothing else is involved.

Think about timing that is truly in unison. Simultaneously means at the exact same moment, and it's the most direct way to express that two events happen together. Earlier and later describe order in time, not sameness, so they don't fit. So the best choice is simultaneously.

Attribution of ideas means giving credit to the original sources and connecting what you say to what others have found. The statement that aligns with previous studies by Smith and colleagues does this clearly: it acknowledges that the approach is part of a broader scholarly conversation and points to a specific source, showing where the idea comes from and allowing readers to trace the evidence. This signals proper credit and avoids presenting ideas as entirely your own. Other options misfit because they either overstate certainty without citing sources, pretend no one else ever learned anything about the topic, or ignore or dismiss existing research. In short, they fail to place the claim within the ongoing scholarly dialogue that proper attribution requires.

10. Which word means 'nearly, almost'?

The idea is to express closeness to a threshold—nearly or almost. Virtually fits this sense best, because it is commonly used to mean “almost, nearly, for all practical purposes.” For example, saying a project is virtually complete communicates that it's almost finished, with only a small amount left. The other words don't capture that sense: yield refers to producing or giving in; emerge means to come into view or appear; primarily means mainly or chiefly. So the best choice for “nearly, almost” is virtually.
