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Explanations

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1. Why was the Millennium bomber defeated?

- A. Lack of explosives
- B. Not on my watch! CBP officer Dean.**
- C. Flight crew overwhelmed the bomber.

Preventing an attack often hinges on vigilant screening and interdiction before a threat can reach an aircraft. In the Millennium case, the would-be bomber was stopped at a border screening by a Customs and Border Protection inspector, Diana Dean, who found bomb making materials in his car. That discovery allowed authorities to arrest him before he could board or detonate anything, illustrating how frontline security can defeat a plot at the point of entry. The phrase associated with the officer—Not on my watch—captures that decisive action. The other scenarios assume the threat gets on the plane or requires military intervention after the fact, which did not occur here.

Early airline hijackings in the 1960s highlighted the need for aviation security. In 1961, a hijacking occurred in El Paso, Texas, which is why this city is the correct choice for the question. The other listed cities do not have a widely documented 1961 hijacking associated with them in standard histories, so they don't fit as well.

3. Which document is authored by the ASC as part of its duties?

This question tests understanding of which document the ASC authors as part of its duties. The Airport Security Program (ASP) is the airport's tailored security plan that must be developed and maintained to meet TSA requirements, outlining how security is implemented across the facility—covering access control, screening, credentialing, surveillance, drills, and audits. It is authored by the ASC in coordination with security stakeholders to establish the formal security framework for the airport, and it is updated as regulations or operations change. The other options serve different roles: the Emergency Response Guide is for hazmat incident response; an Aviation Security Manual is typically issued by the appropriate aviation authority and is not the primary airport security program authored by the ASC; a National Security Directive is a broad national policy document, not an airport-specific program authored by the ASC.

In aviation security training, ASP refers to the Airport Security Program, the formal plan airports develop to meet TSA security requirements and protect passengers, staff, facilities, and operations. This program outlines the security measures, access controls, surveillance, incident response, and coordination with law enforcement that airports implement on a daily basis, and it is submitted to TSA for approval as part of regulatory compliance. The other options describe different concepts or use terms not used as the standard program name in this context: Aviation Safety Plan emphasizes safety rather than security, Airport Surveillance Protocol isn't a recognized program, and Air Security Policy isn't the conventional title for the airport security framework.

Opt Out means airports can use private contractors to perform security screening instead of TSA employees, but TSA still oversees and manages the program. In this setup, a private company staffs the screeners and runs the daily screening operations, while TSA sets the training standards, conducts audits, and ensures compliance with security requirements. That combination—private staff working under TSA management and oversight—best matches the described option. The other ideas don't fit because TSA would not completely remove oversight, nor would the model involve no screening at all, or rely on TSA hiring all screeners nationwide.

6. Which activities support maintaining situational awareness?

Maintaining situational awareness comes from actively observing, interpreting, and communicating about what you see around you. Scanning the environment helps you pick up details and early indicators of potential risk, so you don't miss important cues. Staying alert keeps you from drifting into routine or complacency, ensuring you notice changes as they happen rather than letting them go unnoticed. Reporting what you observe quickly connects your perception with action, so responders can assess the situation and respond promptly. When these habits are combined, you maintain a clear, current picture of what's happening and can adapt to evolving circumstances. Ignoring anomalies erodes awareness because it means you're not noticing or acknowledging potentially important changes. Relying solely on cameras provides limited coverage and can miss context, human intent, or events outside camera angles. Waiting for supervisors to instruct delays action and can allow risk to escalate; staying proactive with scanning, staying alert, and reporting keeps you engaged and capable of timely responses.

7. What has been the general impact of surface-to-air missile attacks on aircraft?

Assessing how surface-to-air missile threats affect aircraft focuses on how often missiles succeed and how defenses reduce that risk. In broad security analyses, the overall impact on aircraft operations from SAM attacks has been considered negligible because modern flight profiles, early warning, and robust defenses (ECM, chaff/flare, maneuvering, and protective air cover) keep the likelihood of a successful hit very low in routine operations. This is why the general conclusion is that vulnerability is negligible for typical air activity. While there are heightened risks in active combat zones or restricted airspace, those contexts don't change the general assessment for ordinary operations.

8. Pan Am 103 led to which program and was it performed?

- A. Positive Bag Match mandated and performed.

After a major incident like this, the focus is on how policies get created versus how they're actually implemented. The idea of Positive Bag Match was introduced as a security measure to ensure every piece of baggage could be tied to a specific passenger before loading. This policy was mandated in some jurisdictions, but in practice the matching process was not carried out widely or consistently at that time due to logistical and technical challenges. So, the correct understanding is that Positive Bag Match was mandated but NOT performed.

9. Which of the following is a primary in-flight security measure?

- A. Secondary flight deck protection
- B. Flight crew trained in self-defense**

This question is about actions that can be taken immediately on board to handle a threat. A primary in-flight security measure is something the crew can deploy right away to directly control a situation and protect people and the aircraft. Training the flight crew in self-defense provides the crew with hands-on skills they can use during an incident, without waiting for outside resources. It enables a rapid, direct response to a threat, which is exactly what a primary measure aims to achieve. Secondary flight deck protection focuses on preventing access to the cockpit through barriers and procedures. While important, it is a preventive control that operates before or outside of active incident response, not the immediate action taken during a threat. The Federal Flight Deck Officer Program involves arming specific pilots and is not universally implemented or applicable on every flight; it reflects a policy option rather than a standard, on-the-spot response available to all crews. Passenger intervention refers to passengers getting involved, which is unpredictable and not a formal, trained response; it is supplementary rather than a primary, crew-led action. So the most direct, real-time capability for handling a threat from the moment it arises is the flight crew being trained in self-defense.

10. Canada's '9/11' and what program did it initiate internationally?

After 9/11, international aviation security moved toward harmonized standards through ICAO. One major measure Canada helped advance is Positive Bag Match, a process that requires each checked bag to be linked to the passenger who checked it. This ensures the bag is loaded onto the same flight as its traveler and reduces the risk of misrouted or lost luggage, strengthening accountability across airports and airlines worldwide. Because this is an ICAO-standard, internationally adopted approach, it fits the description of an internationally initiated program following the 9/11 attacks. The other options are either newer or national programs and do not reflect an ICAO-mandated international standard.
