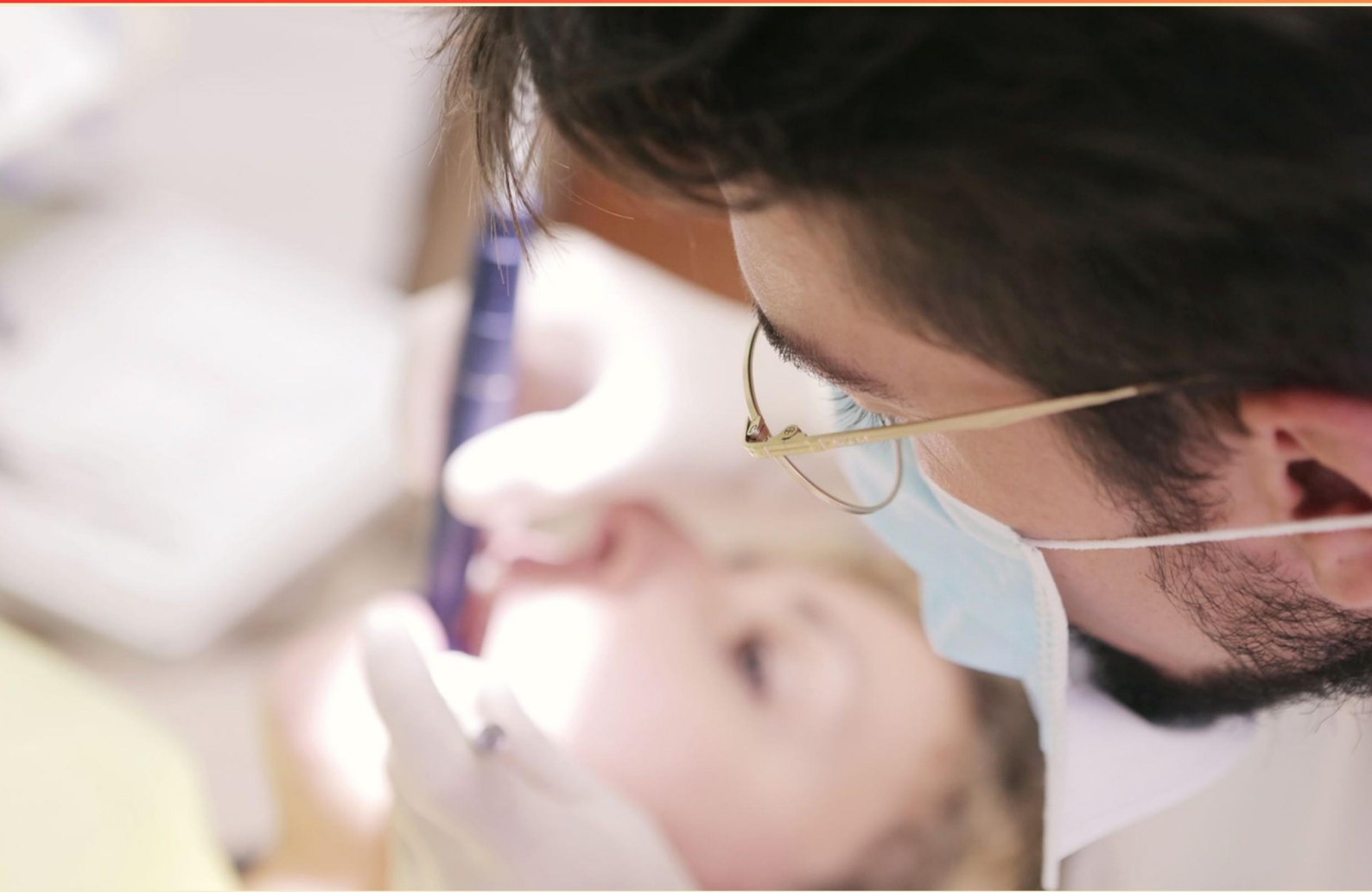

Therefore, alternatives that offer a more relentless approach to disinfection should always be used. On the other hand, practicing regular hand hygiene, using disposable instruments when possible, and avoiding the washing of gloves after each use are all consistent with the CDC's guidelines for infection control in healthcare settings.
