Each panel serves its distinct purpose, but transitions are consolidated in the Effects Panel for ease of access and application.

For example, dragging and dropping the clip directly into the timeline loads the entire clip, while copying the clip to clipboard doesn't create a subclip. Right-clicking on the timeline won't result in the creation of a subclip either, as the timeline deals with the arrangement of clips rather than defining new subtitled segments from existing footage. Hence, the method of marking in and out points and selecting "Make Subclip" appropriately captures the desired portion for future use.
