Holding the Alt key while dragging an object in Adobe Illustrator is an effective method for duplicating that object. This technique allows users to create an exact copy of the selected object while simultaneously moving it to a new location. When you drag while holding Alt, Illustrator creates a duplicate of the original object, allowing for quick and efficient layout adjustments without having to navigate through menus. This method is particularly useful for creating multiple instances of an object in a design, as it gives the user the ability to see the duplicate being created in real-time, making it easier to position it precisely. It also allows for quick duplication of complex shapes or grouped objects, maintaining the design integrity. Other methods, like using Copy and Paste or the Ctrl + D shortcut (which is often used for repeating the last transformation), do not offer the immediacy and visual feedback that the Alt-drag method provides when placing duplicates within a design.

Editing photographs typically involves tools and features found in dedicated photo editing software, and designing web pages is primarily handled through different types of software.

Lastly, the combination of Ctrl + D is typically used for repeating the last transformation applied to an object rather than directly duplicating an object. This makes the method of Ctrl + C followed by Ctrl + V the most straightforward and widely applicable technique for duplication.
