Cesarean sections are considered a major abdominal surgery, leading to both immobility and changes in blood flow, which can heighten the risk of clot formation in the legs. Implementing SCDs throughout the hospital stay helps promote venous return and reduce the likelihood of deep vein thrombosis (DVT) and pulmonary embolism (PE), particularly when combined with other preventive measures such as ambulation and medication (e.g., anticoagulants). Their use is not limited to just the pre-operative phase; instead, continuous use during the entire duration of hospitalization is vital for adequate prophylaxis against thromboembolic events. Therefore, this option emphasizes the importance of maintaining ongoing mechanical support to mitigate risks associated with both the surgical intervention and the recovery period following cesarean delivery.*
