The second option correctly uses the relationship that all teachers fall under the category of professionals, allowing for a sound conclusion about John being a professional based on his classification as a teacher. The third option shows that all sparrows can fly, which is true for birds, but it does not incorrectly assert that all sparrows are birds based solely on their ability to fly. Lastly, the fourth option states that all beetles being insects, together with the premise that no insects are mammals, leads to the valid conclusion that beetles are not

Providing historical context is valuable for understanding a work, but it does not align with the literary technique of juxtaposition itself.
