Other options do not accurately reflect the general sentiment of the time. While some regions may have experienced increased radicalism, the broader trend was toward the restoration of established powers rather than support for revolutionary changes. The idea that people revolted against local leaders does not capture the widespread acceptance of returning monarchs. Economic crises did occur, but these usually fueled a demand for specific reforms rather than a total ousting of monarchy, as many viewed the monarchy as a stabilizing force during periods of unrest.
