Lastly, while APF can have adverse interactions with glass ionomer restorations due to their sensitivity to acidity, this does not apply to porcelain, making option D the correct answer.

Typically, the process requires an initial appointment for tooth preparation and impression taking, followed by a second appointment for placement after the fabricating of the veneers in a dental lab. This is contrasted with direct composite veneers, which can often be completed in a single visit, making them more expeditious in terms of placement. Thus, the exception in this context is indeed related to the requirement of multiple appointments for porcelain veneers compared to the more immediate nature of composite veneer application.
