The aim is to reach a broad audience, using language that is accessible and engaging while still conveying relevant facts. That mix—vivid description, persuasive devices, social proof, and direct prompts to act—best captures how ad copy works. Dry, objective tone tends to distance the reader and doesn't leverage the emotional appeal ads rely on. Highly technical jargon with no persuasion misses the purpose of brochure language, which is to persuade a consumer, not just to inform. Short bullet lists, while common for organizing information, don't embody the full persuasive, image-driven style that ads typically use.

This combination—formal tone plus precise terminology with a touch of first-person narrative about the process—best matches how investigative work is communicated to readers. Slang and casual tone would undermine authority and clarity, poetry doesn't align with the factual, reporting focus, and relying on technical jargon only would make the piece inaccessible to a general audience.

Plot is explained by presenting events in the order they occur, showing how one event leads to the next.
