The Emancipation Proclamation, issued by President Abraham Lincoln in 1863, specifically aimed at freeing enslaved people in the Confederate states, but it was the broader abolitionist movement that helped create

A unitary system centralizes power in the national government, with limited autonomy for regional or local authorities. A confederate system would lean heavily towards state sovereignty, often weakening the national government's ability to enforce laws or mandate policies. The establishment of agricultural monopolies contradicts the regulatory framework designed to support farmers through programs like the Agricultural Adjustment Act, which sought to stabilize prices and support rural economies. Lastly, full privatization of banks was not part of the New Deal; rather, it focused on reforming and regulating the banking sector to prevent the failures that had contributed to the economic downturn, as seen with the formation of the FDIC to insure deposits.
