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Explanations

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1. Which term denotes placement that is relatively temporary within an organization?

- A. Mutual Support
- B. General Support
- C. Attached**
- D. Organic

Attached describes a temporary assignment of personnel or equipment to another unit for a defined period. In this arrangement, the individual remains administratively part of their home unit but operates under the host unit's tactical control for the duration of the attachment, while the home unit retains administrative control. This setup allows quick staffing changes or the infusion of specialized skills without permanent reorganization, which is why it best conveys a relatively temporary placement within an organization. By contrast, mutual support is about reciprocal aid between units, general support covers a broader ongoing allocation of resources, and organic denotes assets permanently and inherently part of a unit.

Understanding common acronyms used in air operations helps you quickly see how orders and procedures guide actions. AOD stands for Air Operations Directive, a document that provides the authority, rules, and procedures for planning and executing air operations and for coordinating across units. It sets how air assets are employed, the tasks to be performed, and how they interact with control measures and fire control procedures—precisely the framework you rely on as an ADAFCO. The other options describe organizational units or different types of documents and aren't the standard term represented by AOD in this context.

3. Which statement best describes AWACS?

AWACS, or Airborne Warning and Control System, is an airborne platform that provides comprehensive air surveillance, command and control, and communications. Its onboard radar and sensors detect and track air targets, manage the air picture, and use data links to direct other aircraft and ground units. Being airborne lets it respond quickly to crises and extend the reach of traditional land-based control systems, creating a mobile C2 node in the sky. That combination of surveillance, C2, and communications in a rapidly deployable package is what AWACS is all about. The other options describe different assets—a ground-based radar with C2, a naval surface search radar, or an airborne fighter platform—none of which capture the full AWACS role.

4. Which outputs are produced during Execution Planning and Force Execution?

During Execution Planning and Force Execution, the focus is turning the approved plan into actionable orders and resource allocations that units can carry out. The two outputs that directly support this step are the MAAP Brief and the Sortie Allotment. The MAAP Brief conveys the Master Air Attack Plan to the execution teams, laying out target priorities, assigned assets, sequencing, timing, and how the plan will coordinate with adjacent units and higher command. It functions as the primary briefing that aligns everyone's understanding and actions. Sortie Allotment translates that plan into unit-level tasking: exactly how many sorties each platform will generate, when they will fly, and which missions they will support. This creates a concrete, synchronized schedule so the force can execute the plan efficiently and adapt to changes as needed. Other outputs listed pertain to different aspects or stages—broader air tasking and control instructions, target lists, or reporting and status updates—and are not the direct execution-planning products focused on coordinating and assigning the force for execution.

The term used for the IFF/SIF transponder is Parrot. The IFF transponder automatically replies to an interrogation with a coded identification, essentially "parroting" back the response to confirm friendly or foe status. That repeating, answering behavior is why this slang—Parrot—fits the device. The other terms don't describe the transponder: Bulls eye is a plotting reference point, Geo Ref refers to geographic reference data, and Mosquito isn't the term used for the IFF/SIF transponder.

6. Which term indicates who is the owner of the Common Tactical Picture?

Ownership of the Common Tactical Picture is shown by the term that designates who is responsible for it—the CTP Owner. This label identifies the person or unit charged with maintaining the picture, approving updates, and ensuring the data feeding the CTP is accurate and current, giving clear accountability for its content. The Common Tactical Picture itself is the shared display, so naming ownership with an "owner" term is the direct way to indicate responsibility. The JFC's relationship to the CTP describes how the Joint Fires Commander interacts with the CTP, not who owns or manages it. JDNO refers to another role or context and does not denote ownership of the CTP.

7. Which term means no sensor info on a group of interest?

Clean is the label used when there is no sensor information on a group of interest. It signals that none of the sensors in the system are reporting data for that group at this moment, so you can't update its position, velocity, or other state from real-time sensor data. In practice, you'd rely on last known state or prediction for that group and plan engagements accordingly. Meld would mean combining data from multiple sensors to form a single, more accurate picture; No Factor implies the group has no influence on the decision or calculation; Trashed means sensor data was discarded due to poor quality.

8. Which term denotes a friendly missile defeated?

In engagement reporting, there is a specific label that denotes a friendly missile was defeated. That label is trashed. It communicates that the friendly missile did not complete its mission and was neutralized or wasted, so it no longer contributes to the engagement outcome. This keeps logs and after-action reviews clear about what happened to friendly assets. The other terms describe different things: a name that is a system or missile type, a crater which is a ground result of an impact, or a factorless outcome that doesn't specifically indicate a defeated friendly.

9. Which of the following are JFACC designation requirements?

Designating a JFACC relies on two essential conditions: there must be a preponderance of air assets in the theater, and there must be the ability to command and control joint air operations. The mass of air power ensures air operations are the dominant, unifying element of the campaign, while the C2 capability provides a single authority to plan, coordinate, and execute air operations across all services. If either condition is missing, airpower cannot be effectively centralized and synchronized, leading to fragmentation or underutilization. So, both requirements together make the JFACC designation appropriate.

10. AADC responsibilities include which of the following?

- A. Plans, coordinates, and manages air defense and missile operations (Develops AADP)
- B. Responsible for theater air and missile defense**

The main idea being tested is who holds the overall authority for air and missile defense within a theater. The AADC's role is to serve as the single theater-level authority responsible for theater-wide air and missile defense, coordinating and directing the defense across all services and coalition partners to protect the area of operations. That broad, unified responsibility is why this option is the best fit: the AADC is charged with the theater's defense as a whole, not just a part of it or a specific task. Plans, coordinates, and manages air defense and missile operations (develops the Air Defense Plan) describes planning activity, which is part of what the AADC does, but it stresses the development of a single plan rather than the overarching, theater-wide authority and execution responsibility. The idea here is to emphasize the full scope of command authority, which is theater-wide defense. The notion of being the principal authority for the Common Tactical Picture isn't exclusively the AADC's role. While the AADC relies on the Common Tactical Picture for situational awareness, the responsibility for maintaining that picture is shared among joint components and command elements, not the single senior authority for the theater. Leading Joint Interagency Coordination is an interagency effort, and while the AADC collaborates with interagency partners, leadership of JIAC activities generally lies with designated joint or interagency leadership, not solely with the AADC. So, the AADC being responsible for theater air and missile defense best captures the core duty of unifying and directing all air and missile defense efforts across the theater.
