A Beauty Entrepreneur Certificate and an Advanced Cosmetology Certification are not standard certifications awarded upon completion of basic cosmetology training; they may refer to specialized training or business management courses relevant to the beauty industry but do not replace the foundational requirement of a cosmetology license.
