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Explanations

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1. Which statement best reflects the writer's reaction to listing the six levels of learning?

- A. Its much for me to type**
- B. It requires extensive study
- C. It is a simple framework
- D. It is unnecessary to memorize

The writer's reaction is shown by signaling that listing all six levels feels burdensome to do. Saying "it's too much for me to type" directly conveys fatigue or frustration with the effort required to list everything. That tone fits best because it focuses on the workload of producing the list itself, not on how difficult the material is to study, whether the framework is simple, or whether memorization is necessary. The other options describe different attitudes—ease, or necessity of study/memorization—not the sense of being overwhelmed by the act of listing.

2. Which federal agency regulates all radio frequencies and radio airwaves?

Controlling and coordinating the radio spectrum so different services don't interfere is the job of a national regulator. The Federal Communications Commission manages most of the radio airwaves in the United States, issuing licenses for broadcasters, wireless networks, and many other devices, and setting rules on how frequencies are used and how much power can be transmitted. This oversight helps prevent harmful interference and keeps communications reliable for things like emergency services, television, radios, and cell networks. NASA is a space agency focused on space exploration and mission communications, not regulating the spectrum. NIST works on standards and measurements, not licensing or spectrum management. NSA handles national security and intelligence, not overseeing radio frequencies. The spectrum is a shared, limited resource that needs centralized management to keep all these communications orderly and safe.

3. Which of the following is NOT a gang name listed in the material?

This question checks your ability to recall which gang names are actually listed in your study material. In the material, Folk Nation, Bandido's, and Clickas are included as gang names to know. Memory consolidation is the process of stabilizing and integrating newly learned information so it becomes part of long-term storage. Overnight, the brain works to transfer and strengthen those memories, which is why sleep is so important for memory retention. The term that describes methods aimed at this sustained, lasting change is a long-term memory hack. So this choice fits best because it targets turning fresh experiences into durable, long-lasting memories, a process that largely occurs during sleep. Short-term memory hacks focus on keeping information briefly in memory; sensory memory hacks deal with the initial brief perceptual trace; working memory hacks aim at the active processing and manipulation of information in real-time.

5. Under the ADA, can an employer ask an applicant if they are disabled or about the nature or severity of a disability?

The permissible focus is on actual ability to perform essential job tasks, not on disability status. Under the ADA, you can't ask an applicant if they are disabled or about the nature or severity of a disability during the hiring process. Instead, you may ask whether the applicant can perform the job's essential functions, with or without reasonable accommodation. This keeps the assessment centered on job capability rather than medical condition. If a medical inquiry becomes relevant, that step should come after a conditional job offer and must be directly related to the ability to perform the job with reasonable accommodations, ensuring it's consistent with business necessity.

6. Which city had the first organized police department (1844)?

The question tests the move from informal watch systems to formal, centralized police departments in mid-1800s cities. New York City's decision to establish a organized police force in 1844 is the key point: it marks the transition to a centralized, professional department with paid officers and a clear chain of command, rather than a loose collection of constables or night watchmen. This shift is what the item is highlighting when it says the first organized department in that year comes from New York City. Think of what makes a police department "organized": a standing body of officers under a formal leadership structure, with defined ranks, standards, and procedures, operating under a centralized command. New York City's 1844 move embodied that change and set a model for other cities to follow, which is why it's identified as the first in this context. The other cities might have earlier or different forms of policing or reorganizations, but for the purpose of this item's framing—1844's 1844 date and a formalized, centralized department—New York City is the one that fits best.

Approach with caution and gather situational awareness from a safe distance. Stopping short of the address and looking for signs of a crime is the best initial step because it lets you assess potential dangers before you close the distance. You can observe for clues of forced entry, victims or people inside, weapons, or other hazards, and you can note entry points, potential cover, and escape routes. This approach helps you decide if you need backup, how to position yourself, and what communications to make, while avoiding tipping off suspects or creating hazards for bystanders. Moving in with lights and sirens, pulling directly to the door, or parking right in front of the house can heighten risk or obstruct the scene, so the prudent move is to assess from a safe distance first.

A lawful traffic stop exists to enforce traffic laws and promote roadway safety. An officer stops a driver when there is a reasonable suspicion of a traffic violation or a safety risk that needs addressing. This keeps the stop tied to a present, observable issue rather than being arbitrary, and it allows the officer to address the violation or risk immediately, which may result in penalties if warranted. The other ideas—seizing cars and issuing penalties as the main goal, investigating unrelated crimes, or collecting information for future use—do not fit because they either miss the focus on immediate safety and law enforcement of a current violation, require justification beyond a current observed issue, or treat the stop as a data-gathering exercise rather than addressing a present risk or violation.

9. Which patrol type involves patrolling with no fixed pattern to keep criminals unsure of officer location?

Unpredictability in patrol patterns is used to disrupt criminals' planning. When officers patrol with no fixed pattern, offenders can't reliably predict where or when an officer will be, which raises the risk of being spotted or caught. This uncertainty reduces the opportunity for crime and makes choosing targets less appealing. That's why this patrol approach is described as random patrol—routes and times are varied without a clear routine to keep criminals guessing. Other patrol approaches have different aims: proactive patrol involves taking initiative to address crime through planned actions; preventative patrol emphasizes a visible, steady presence to deter crime; selective patrol concentrates resources in high-crime areas or times based on data. But none are inherently built on complete unpredictability in pattern like random patrol.

10. Which department is credited with early on-the-air voice communication in 1928?

Two-way radio communication in policing marks a major shift from phone-driven or messenger-based dispatch to real-time, voice contact between the street and the station. In 1928, the Detroit Police Department pioneered on-the-air voice transmissions, making them the first to operate a mobile radio system that allowed officers to hear dispatch and report back while out on patrol. This early use of voice radio dramatically improved response times, coordination, and officer safety, setting the pattern that other large departments would follow in the years that followed. While Chicago, New York, and Los Angeles would later adopt similar systems, Detroit's 1928 implementation is the earliest documented milestone in this area.
