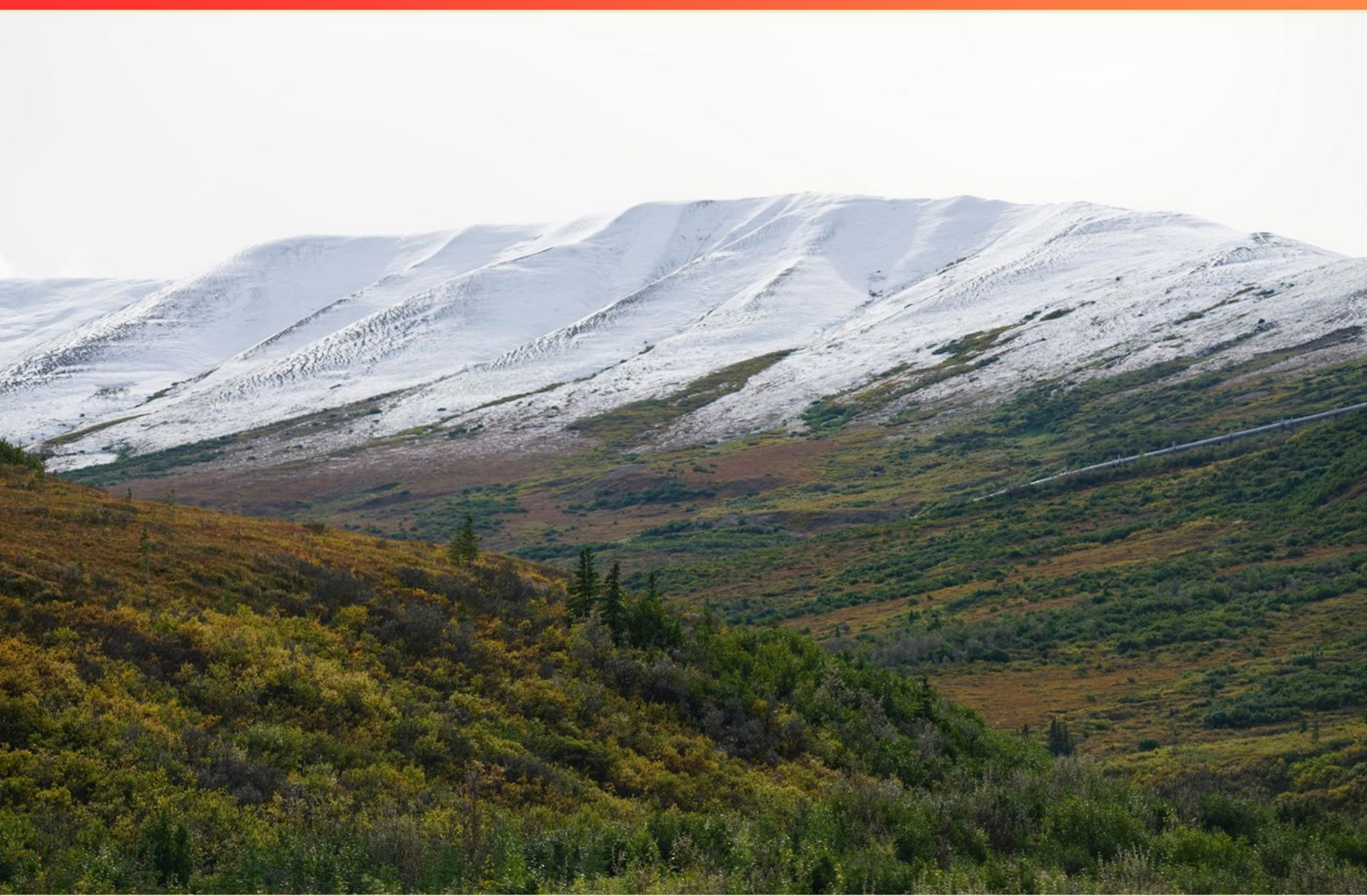

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Explanations

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1. Which two peoples are traditionally associated with the Arctic cultural region?

A. Inupiat and Siberian Yupik

B. Dena'ina and Gwich'in

Arctic Alaska is defined by communities living in the far north whose way of life hinges on sea ice, permafrost, and marine resources. The two peoples traditionally associated with this Arctic lifestyle are the Inupiat of northern Alaska and the Siberian Yupik of St. Lawrence Island and western Alaska. Their subsistence strategies, technology, and seasonal rounds reflect adaptation to ice, seals, whales, and other marine foods, shaping culture and daily life in the Arctic environment. The other groups come from different Alaska regions—Southcentral interior, other Arctic groups paired with non-Arctic groups, Southeast coastal areas, or the Aleutian region—so they don't represent the Arctic cultural region as a pair. Therefore, Inupiat and Siberian Yupik best exemplify the Arctic association.

Understanding how Alaska Native groups are categorized by where they lived and how they survived helps explain why the Inupiat belong to the Arctic region. The Inupiat occupy Alaska's far north along the Arctic coast, where sea ice and extreme cold have long shaped daily life. Their traditional subsistence centers on ice-adapted hunting—seals and whales from the ocean, caribou on land—and the use of boats like kayaks and umiaks to move across icy shores. Language connections place them with other Inuit-speaking peoples across the Arctic, underscoring the regional ties that define this area. In contrast, groups in the subarctic/Athabaskan region live more inland in boreal forests and tundra with different resources and languages; those in the Northwest Coast/Southeast region inhabit coastal areas with rainforest environments and distinct cultures like the Tlingit and Haida; and the Aleut/Unangan region covers the Aleutian Islands with a separate environmental setting and traditions. Because the Inupiat's geographic range and subsistence practices align with Arctic conditions, they are most appropriately associated with the Arctic region.

The main idea here is how leadership is shown through symbolic tools rather than plain fighting weapons. A blacksmith hammer represents a leader's role as a maker and shaper of the community—someone who forges implements, builds tools, and shapes outcomes. In many Alaska Native narratives and cultural life, crafting and tool-making are central to how a leader provisions and guides people, so the hammer stands as a powerful symbol of authority, strength, and constructive action. Traditional weapons like a bow and arrow or a spear are typical tools of hunting or combat for individuals, not as symbolic markers of leadership. A sword, while a strong weapon, is less typical in Alaska Native contexts and doesn't carry the same leadership-symbolic meaning as a hammer tied to craft and construction. That emphasis on shaping and forging makes the blacksmith hammer the best fit for representing the leader's role in this context.

ANCSA set up a two-tier corporate framework to translate land and money into real self-determination through local governance. Regional corporations hold the large land selections and the settlement funds, using them to pursue regional economic development and manage broader assets that span multiple villages. Village corporations handle village-level lands and resources, focusing on locally driven projects and sustainable use of those village assets. Shareholders—individual Alaska Native people who received stock in the corporations—own that stock and participate in governance by electing boards to run the regional and village organizations and by deciding on major actions and dividends. This arrangement gives communities a voice through stock ownership and board elections while keeping land and financial resources organized by region and by village, aligning development with local needs and priorities. The other descriptions don't fit because they misstate what the corporations do (education or health services aren't the primary functions of these entities), misstate land ownership (lands are held and managed through regional and village corporations, not in the manner described), or imply that stock is purely symbolic (stock carries governance and financial rights, including voting for boards and receiving dividends).

Anchorage is Alaska's largest urban center and serves as the state's main hub for transportation, commerce, and services, so its population sits in the hundreds of thousands. The best estimate is around 290,000 people, which matches recent figures and is the closest to the actual size. The other numbers don't fit: around 50,000 or 100,000 would be far too small for a city of this role, while around 1,000,000 is far above what the city actually contains. Knowing this helps you understand why Anchorage is a major focal point in Alaska's economy, culture, and history.

6. If companies want to drill for oil in Alaska, they must pay for what two things?

In Alaska, access to drill on public lands and the revenue the state gets from oil are handled through two primary payments. First, a company must obtain an oil lease, which grants the legal right to explore and drill on state lands. Without this lease, drilling isn't permitted. Second, once oil is produced, the company pays a tax on that oil to the state, providing ongoing government revenue. These two payments—the oil lease to gain drilling rights and the tax on produced oil to fund public needs—are the most fundamental costs tied directly to starting and operating oil extraction. Other items like environmental permits or bonds may be involved, but they are not the two core payments described here.

Exxon Valdez is the ship involved in the Prince William Sound disaster. In 1989, this tanker ran aground on Bligh Reef near Valdez, Alaska, rupturing its tanks and releasing about 11 million gallons of crude oil into the surrounding waters. The spill devastated wildlife and coastal habitats and highlighted how vulnerable Alaska's ecosystems are to large-scale oil accidents. It also spurred major policy changes and improvements in oil spill prevention and response, including the Oil Pollution Act of 1990 and tighter tanker safety standards. The other names are linked to different incidents or contexts and are not associated with this Alaska event.

Before contact with outsiders, Alaska Native cultures relied on spoken language and oral traditions to pass on knowledge, history, laws, and customs. There wasn't a native writing system used to record language or long texts. While you can find petroglyphs or symbolic art, these served purposes like decoration, storytelling, or marking territory, not a script for language. Writing was introduced later through contact with missionaries and scholars, and today many Alaska Native languages use writing systems based on Latin letters. Because there was no indigenous writing prior to arrival, the statement that none had a written language before arrival is accurate.

The spread of Christianity among Alaska Natives in the early contact period came primarily through the Russian Orthodox Church, brought by Russian explorers and fur traders in the 18th century. Missionaries established churches and schools along the coast, with notable efforts among the Aleut and later other Alaska Native groups, helping to adopt Orthodoxy as a central part of village life. Saint Herman of Alaska stands out as a celebrated early missionary who worked among the Alaska Natives near Kodiak, symbolizing the deep roots of Orthodoxy in the region. This tradition continued and grew under the Russian-American Company's influence, shaping religious practice in many communities that persists today. While other faiths appeared later in some areas, they did not have the same widespread, long-standing missionary presence among Alaska Natives as Russian Orthodoxy.

10. The epicenter of the 1964 earthquake was in Alaska.

The main idea here is what an epicenter means: it's the point on the Earth's surface directly above where an earthquake starts deep underground (the focus). For the 1964 Great Alaska Earthquake, the rupture began beneath southern Alaska, in the Prince William Sound region. Seismologists triangulated the shaking to that surface location, so the epicenter lies in Alaska. The quake did trigger powerful tsunamis that reached Hawaii and other Pacific coasts, but that doesn't change where the earthquake originated. So the statement is true.
