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Explanations

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1. A country determining its involvement in world affairs based on the outcomes or benefits it receives is described as what?

Focusing on what benefits the country in world affairs is national interest. This idea means decisions about foreign policy are judged by how they improve the country's security, economy, and global influence. For example, pursuing trade deals or strategic alliances to boost jobs and resources is acting in line with national interest. Isolationism would mean avoiding involvement in international matters, regardless of potential gains. Idealism emphasizes acting on moral purposes and universal values, sometimes prioritizing rights or humanitarian goals over direct national benefits. Cosmopolitanism extends a sense of duty to all humans and global communities, not just national interests.

2. Which British prime minister at the end of World War I aimed to make Germany pay for losses?

Holding Germany financially responsible for the war shapes Britain's postwar strategy. David Lloyd George was Britain's prime minister as World War I ended, and he pushed for terms that would make Germany pay for the costs and damage of the conflict. He believed reparations and military restrictions were necessary to secure lasting peace and deter future aggression, while also trying to protect Britain's own economy and empire. In practice, he supported the reparations framework in the Versailles settlement and pressed France to accept terms that were punitive but not ruinously destabilizing for Germany, aiming to balance punishment with the risk of sparking renewed instability. Winston Churchill was not the prime minister at the end of the war, and Neville Chamberlain and Harold Wilson led Britain in much later periods. So the leader most associated with the push to make Germany pay at that moment is David Lloyd George.

A nation, by contrast, is more about the cultural community itself and does not require its own state or defined borders. Ethnic nationalism centers on ethnicity as the basis of national belonging, which emphasizes shared ancestry, language, or heritage rather than how a state is organized. Civic nationalism focuses on shared political values and citizenship as the basis for belonging, not ethnicity.

Assimilation pushes individuals to adopt the dominant culture and often downplays or loses their original heritage, which is the opposite of recognizing and valuing diverse backgrounds. Self-determination is about a group's right to political self-rule rather than how cultures coexist and are treated in everyday society. Cultural pluralism is related in that it acknowledges coexistence of multiple cultures, but multiculturalism is the term most commonly used to describe the actively recognized and respected diversity within a society.

Supranationalism is when three or more countries pool some of their sovereignty and operate through institutions that can make binding decisions for all member states. This arrangement aims to advance shared objectives—like trade rules, security collaboration, or regulatory standards—even if that means giving up a degree of national control. The European Union is a clear example, with institutions that can adopt rules and policies that member countries must follow. Internationalism describes general cooperation among nations without creating a higher authority that can compel states to act. The United Nations is an international organization that coordinates diplomacy, aid, and rules, but it does not embody the idea of surrendering sovereignty to a single supranational body. The European Union is a real-world instance of supranationalism, not the term itself.

7. Which is a dried, cured meat snack?

Beef jerky is a dried, cured meat snack because it undergoes seasoning and curing with salt (and often spices), followed by drying or smoking to remove most moisture. The other options aren't edible meat snacks: Lego are plastic building bricks, Space Jam is a movie, and a tweet is a short message posted on Twitter.

Natural rights and the rights of citizens are central here. The Declaration of the Rights of Man and of the Citizen, produced during the French Revolution in 1789, states that people are born free and equal in rights and that certain rights belong to every person—liberty, property, security, and resistance to oppression. It also establishes civil rights for citizens, like freedom of speech and religion and due process, and it frames government as standing to protect these rights, with authority derived from the people. This combination of universal rights and specific citizen protections is what makes it the best match for the description in the question. The Magna Carta focuses on limiting the king's power and protecting the privileges of the nobility, not universal rights for all people. The Declaration of Independence, while sharing the idea of natural rights, is an American document, not French. The Constitution of 1791 outlines the structure of government and political rights rather than presenting the universal rights framework that the French document did.

Civil rights protections are the legal guarantees that prevent discrimination on the basis of religion and ensure equal access to public services. Freedom of worship is about the right to practice religion, which is helpful context but doesn't by itself ensure equal treatment in public services. Religious tolerance is a broader social attitude rather than a specific legal protection, and equal protection under the law is a foundational principle within civil rights, but the broader term that directly captures both anti-discrimination and access to public services is civil rights protections.

10. Which film features a tornado full of sharks as its premise?

The idea being tested is recognizing which film matches a wildly specific premise. A tornado that actually carries sharks and drops them into cities is the hallmark gag of Sharknado, a tongue in cheek disaster movie built around that exact scenario. The other options don't fit this premise: Space Jam centers on basketball and cartoon characters, not sharks or tornadoes; Phablet isn't a film; Google is a tech company, not a movie. So the premise points directly to Sharknado.
