Knowing the founders' professional backgrounds helps identify who was a physician. Henry Arthur Callis is the founder who pursued medicine, building a career as a physician and contributing to medical education and public health. The other listed founders were known for different paths—Vertner Woodson Tandy became a distinguished architect, and Eugene Kinckle Jones was a leader in civil rights and organizational work. This mix of careers among the founders highlights Callis's role as the physician in the group.

2. To whom is the History book dedicated?

- A. To the youths who march onward and upward toward the light.**

The main idea being tested is who a history book dedicates itself to and what that signals about its purpose. The dedication to the youths who march onward and upward toward the light signals a forward-looking, aspirational purpose: to inspire future generations to strive for progress, knowledge, and moral improvement. It shifts the focus from honoring specific internal groups (founders, current members, or student leaders) to addressing those who will carry the legacy forward. The imagery of marching toward the light conveys movement, hope, and continual advancement, which fits a history book meant to guide and motivate future generations and alumni.

3. Omega Chapter is the Chapter reserved for whom?

Omega Chapter is a designation used to honor Alpha Phi Alpha members who have passed away. In this tradition, the term Omega marks the end, and the chapter stands as a memorial for deceased brothers rather than an active group. So the correct understanding is that Omega Chapter is reserved for deceased Alpha men. Living undergraduates, honored alumni who are alive, or a specific undergraduate chapter name do not fit this designation, since Omega serves to memorialize members who have died.

Understanding who holds the officer roles in the Midwestern Region helps identify the accurate statement. Ronald D. Stovall II being the Vice President and Anthony J. Rucker as Assistant Vice President fits the typical two-tier leadership setup for the region, with a Vice President supported by an Assistant Vice President to manage programs and regional activities. The other options assign roles or names that don't align with the actual roster: a Chief Financial Officer isn't listed as a Midwestern Region officer in this context, the Executive Director and CEO title isn't the standard regional officer lineup, and Jamie R. Riley, Ph.D. is not the Vice President according to the referenced roster.

5. Gamma Psi Chapter is affiliated with which university?

Chapters of Alpha Phi Alpha are assigned to a specific college or university, so the chapter name reflects its campus affiliation. The Gamma Psi chapter is the designation used for the fraternity's presence at St. Augustine's University, a historically Black university in Raleigh, North Carolina. This connection is established in the fraternity's chapter rosters and history, which link Gamma Psi directly to St. Augustine's University. The other universities listed have their own distinct Alpha Phi Alpha chapters, but the Gamma Psi designation corresponds to St. Augustine's.

6. Who is the Kappa Omicron secretary, historian, Dean of Membership and Assistant Dean of Membership?

The idea here is recognizing someone who wears multiple leadership hats in the Kappa Omicron chapter. The secretary handles minutes and official communications, the historian preserves the chapter's records and archives, the Dean of Membership leads recruitment and membership development, and the Assistant Dean of Membership supports those membership duties. Jaylyn J. Barbee is the person identified as holding all four roles, which is why this choice fits best. The other names aren't reported as filling this complete combination of positions in this context.

The key idea here is knowing which chapter name and founding year pair with Shaw University in Alpha Phi Alpha's history. Shaw University is the Beta Rho Chapter, chartered in 1936. That exact pairing—Beta Rho and 1936—matches the chapter history for Shaw. The other options would correspond to different schools or different charter years, so they don't align with Shaw.

8. Which institution hosts the Alpha Chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha?

Alpha Phi Alpha began at Cornell University in Ithaca, New York, in 1906, with the founding members creating the first organized group on that campus. The Alpha Chapter designates that original, founding chapter, so the hosting institution is Cornell University. The other campuses listed later formed chapters after the fraternity's founding, not the Alpha Chapter itself.

9. What is the title of Chapter 3?

Chapter 3 centers on the beginnings of growth and expansion—the moment the organization starts extending its reach beyond its original group. The title *The First Steps in Expansion* fits this idea perfectly because it signals the initial move from founding to outward growth, such as establishing new chapters or broadening influence. The other titles point to different themes: an origin story would belong to an earlier part of the narrative; *Local and National Strivings* suggests ambitions or campaigns rather than actual expansion steps; *The Leaven of Self-Examination* points to internal reflection or reform, not the early outward growth.

The idea being tested is who earned the title of “Mother of Alpha Phi Alpha” and what that title signifies. Annie C. Singleton is known by that name because she hosted the early organizing meetings in her home, providing food and steady encouragement as the Brothers worked on building the fraternity. That hospitality and moral support were crucial in sustaining the group during its formation, making her a symbolic matriarch of Alpha Phi Alpha’s beginnings. The other individuals are associated with different kinds of contributions, but they did not embody the nurturing, home-base support that defines the Mother of Alpha Phi Alpha.
