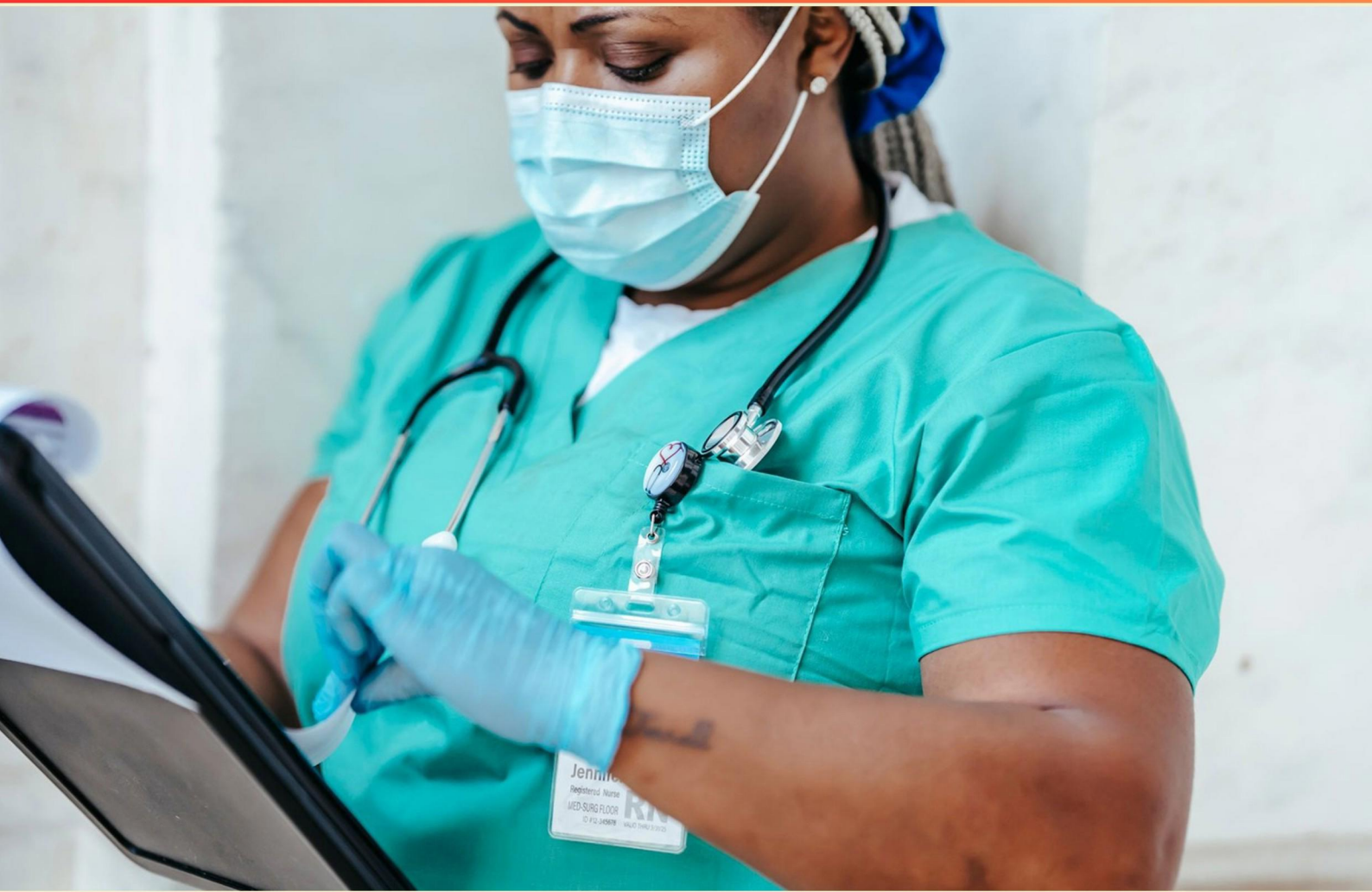

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Explanations

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1. In smoothing conflict resolution, which approach involves compromising by temporarily deferring the issue?

- A. Downplaying to avoid conflict
- B. Direct confrontation
- C. Compromising by temporarily deferring the issue**

In smoothing, the focus is on preserving relationships and reducing tension by softening differences and avoiding open conflict. The approach that fits this goal best is compromising by temporarily deferring the issue: you make a small concession or postpone tackling the substantive problem right away to keep things peaceful in the moment, with the plan to revisit the discussion later when emotions have cooled. This keeps harmony intact while still allowing progress to occur in the future, which is the essence of smoothing. Direct confrontation would disrupt harmony, as it involves addressing the issue head-on and asserting one's position. Escalation to management takes the conflict out of the immediate relationship and into a higher authority, which shifts the dynamic away from smoothing. Downplaying to avoid conflict is related to reducing tension but doesn't explicitly capture the deliberate postponement of the issue to maintain harmony, which the deferral approach emphasizes.

2. In Weber test with conductive hearing loss, sound lateralizes to which ear?

The Weber test relies on comparing bone-conducted sound in both ears. When there is unilateral conductive hearing loss, the ear with the middle-ear problem has reduced air-conduction sensitivity, while bone conduction still stimulates the cochlea on that side. The brain then perceives the tuning fork as louder in the abnormal ear, so the sound localizes to the ear with the conductive loss. If the loss were sensorineural in one ear, the damaged inner ear would dampen the bone-conducted signal there, and the tone would be heard louder in the normal ear. Thus, in conductive hearing loss, the tone lateralizes to the abnormal ear.

3. ACTH primarily stimulates hormone production in which gland?

ACTH, or adrenocorticotropic hormone, acts on the adrenal cortex to stimulate the production and release of glucocorticoids, especially cortisol (with some effect on mineralocorticoids). This is part of the hypothalamic-pituitary-adrenal axis that helps regulate stress responses, metabolism, and immune function. The thyroid is controlled by TSH, the pancreas by insulin and glucagon, and the pituitary gland is the source of ACTH—not its target. So the adrenal cortex is the gland primarily stimulated by ACTH.

4. Which statement about NPH insulin is true?

NPH insulin is cloudy because it is prepared as a suspension with protamine, making it an intermediate-acting insulin. The cloudy appearance comes from the suspended particles and you typically roll or gently invert the vial to resuspend before dosing. This suspension-based, intermediate action contrasts with clear, rapid-acting insulins that are solutions. While NPH does provide longer-lasting coverage and has a peak several hours after injection (unlike long-acting analogs that aim for no pronounced peak), it is not guaranteed to last exactly 24 hours in every patient and it is not clear. Therefore, the true statement is that it is cloudy. The other options—being clear, lasting a full 24 hours, or having no peak—do not fit NPH's characteristics.

5. Which symptom is commonly associated with gallbladder disease?

Recognizing a biliary colic pattern: gallbladder problems commonly present with pain in the epigastric or right upper quadrant area after fatty meals. The meal stimulates the gallbladder to contract, and if a gallstone intermittently blocks the cystic duct, that contraction leads to episodic pain that can last minutes to hours. Abdominal distention can accompany these episodes, and the pain is often intermittent as stones move. This clustering of postprandial epigastric/RUQ pain with possible distention is the hallmark that points to gallbladder disease. The other patterns don't fit this issue: left lower quadrant pain after meals isn't typical of gallbladder problems; chest pain radiating to the left shoulder suggests a cardiac origin; headaches with visual changes indicate a neurologic/vascular issue.

6. Which activity is included in the organizational role of nursing?

In the organizational role, the nurse acts as a manager of care delivery. This involves coordinating the team and resources to provide safe, efficient care, which centers on prioritizing patient needs, delegating tasks appropriate to team members, and supervising performance to ensure standards are met. This is the core of how care is organized and executed on a unit. While other activities relate to different nursing roles, they don't capture the management function as directly. Managing health informatics focuses on data and information systems; education about health promotion is more about teaching patients or communities; and self-management in health promotion and disease prevention centers on empowering individuals to care for themselves. Therefore, prioritizing, delegating, and supervising best exemplifies the organizational leadership aspect of nursing.

7. Which metric measures the availability of appointment times for patients in ambulatory care?

Access to care hinges on how easily patients can book a timely appointment. The metric availability of appointment times directly captures this by describing the proportion of open appointment slots within a defined window (for example, same-day or next-week slots) in the clinic's schedule. A high availability indicates many slots are open for scheduling, supporting timely visits; a low availability shows bottlenecks that make it harder for patients to get an appointment when they need one. Other metrics touch different parts of the process. Telephone wait time measures how long a patient waits to reach someone by phone, not the actual ease of finding an open appointment. Wait time can refer to the time a patient waits in the clinic to be seen, which is about the visit experience rather than scheduling capacity. Cancellation rate tracks how often bookings are canceled, which can reduce effective access but doesn't itself quantify the availability of open slots.

8. Which insulin lasts 5-8 hours?

Insulin duration varies by type, and this question asks which one lasts about five to eight hours. Regular insulin is the short-acting form that begins working in about 30 to 60 minutes, peaks around 2 to 4 hours, and typically lasts 5 to 8 hours. That timing matches the window described. Other options have different durations: rapid-acting insulins peak sooner and last about 3 to 5 hours; NPH is longer-acting, roughly 12 to 16 hours or more; glargine is a long-acting insulin lasting about 24 hours. So regular insulin best fits the 5–8 hour duration.

In budgeting for ambulatory care, the aim is to allocate resources so performance targets are met and teams are encouraged to improve. Benchmarks set targets for costs, efficiency, access, and quality; when budgets are built around these targets and achievement is rewarded, staff stay focused on delivering value while controlling expenses. This approach fosters accountability and sustainable operations, ensuring patient care isn't sacrificed for short-term savings. In contrast, chasing profits at any cost can compromise care, cutting staff harms safety and access, and rigidly standardizing every department's budget ignores differences in demand and service needs, reducing the ability to respond to changing conditions.

10. Which statement best describes ALS (amyotrophic lateral sclerosis)?

- A. Degenerative disease of upper and lower motor neurons; may require ventilatory support.**

ALS is a degenerative disease of motor neurons in both the brain and spinal cord, affecting upper motor neurons and lower motor neurons. This dual loss leads to a mix of spastic weakness from upper motor neuron involvement and muscle atrophy with fasciculations from lower motor neuron loss. The disease progresses and eventually weakens the respiratory muscles, so ventilatory support may become necessary. The other descriptions refer to different conditions: an autoimmune demyelinating disease of peripheral nerves describes Guillain-Barré syndrome; a movement disorder from loss of dopamine-producing brain cells describes Parkinson disease; and a congenital brain tumor is a birth-present tumor. Therefore, the statement that ALS involves degeneration of both upper and lower motor neurons and may require ventilatory support best characterizes it.
