Bacteremia refers to bacteria entering the bloodstream, sepsis is a systemic inflammatory response to infection that can lead to organ failure, and pneumothorax involves air in the pleural space, which is a separate condition from fluid collection. Thus, empyema specifically describes the infection-related buildup of fluid in the chest associated with pneumonia.
