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Explanations

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1. In a surgical setting, which instrument is best suited for delicate tissue dissection?

- A. Operating scissors
- B. Metzenbaum scissors**
- C. Mayo scissors
- D. Lister scissors

Delicate tissue dissection calls for an instrument that allows precise control while minimizing tissue trauma. Metzenbaum scissors are designed exactly for this purpose. Their long, slender blades and light weight let you separate tissue planes and perform blunt dissection without crushing or tearing delicate structures. The curved version also helps you follow tissue contours and work in confined spaces with a gentle touch. Other options are less suited for this task. Operating scissors are general-purpose and heavier, making them less ideal for fine, precise work. Mayo scissors are built for tougher tissue and sutures, with thicker blades that can damage delicate tissue. Lister scissors are sharper than Metzenbaum but aren't optimized for the subtle, blunt dissection that delicate tissues require.

2. Which hormone surge triggers ovulation?

- A. Estrogen
- B. Luteinizing hormone**

The key event is a surge of luteinizing hormone from the anterior pituitary. As the maturing follicle secretes increasing amounts of estrogen, this rising estrogen creates a positive feedback on the hypothalamic–pituitary axis, producing a sharp spike in LH release. That LH surge acts on the dominant follicle to cause rupture and release the oocyte—the moment of ovulation. The oocyte completes meiosis I to become a secondary oocyte and is released with surrounding cells. After ovulation, LH also promotes the transformation of the ruptured follicle into the corpus luteum, which begins producing progesterone to prepare the reproductive tract for potential pregnancy. Estrogen's rise helps prepare the cycle and supports the LH surge, but the actual trigger for ovulation is the LH surge. FSH supports follicle growth earlier but does not directly trigger ovulation.

3. A vial contains 2,000,000 units. To make a solution containing 200,000 units per milliliter, how many milliliters of diluent are needed?

- A. 2 mL
- B. 4 mL
- C. 10 mL**
- D. 20 mL

The main idea here is that concentration relates to how much active units are present per milliliter, so to find the required volume you divide the total units by the desired concentration. You have 2,000,000 units and want 200,000 units per milliliter. $2,000,000 \div 200,000 = 10$. This means you need a total of 10 milliliters of solution to hold all the units at that concentration. The diluent would be added to bring the solution up to that total volume. In other words, the amount of diluent is whatever is needed to reach 10 mL total.

4. If a horse is given 825 mL of a 10% guaifenesin solution, how many grams of guaifenesin are administered?

- A. 0.825 g
- B. 8.25 g
- C. 82.5 g**
- D. 825 g

A 10% solution means 10 grams of guaifenesin in every 100 milliliters of solution. Convert that to a per-milliliter basis: $10 \text{ g} / 100 \text{ mL} = 0.1 \text{ g per mL}$. Multiply by the volume given: $0.1 \text{ g/mL} \times 825 \text{ mL} = 82.5 \text{ g}$. So the horse receives 82.5 grams of guaifenesin. Common pitfalls include thinking 10% is 10 g per liter (which would give 8.25 g for 0.825 L) or misplacing the decimal, which would yield 0.825 g or 0.825 g per mL. The correct approach uses 10 g per 100 mL, leading to 82.5 g.

5. Which species has continuously erupting incisor teeth?

Rabbits have incisors that grow continuously throughout life. This is due to their hypselodont dentition, where the incisor teeth keep renewing and require ongoing gnawing to wear them down to a functional length. This adaptation supports their herbivorous diet and the abrasive materials they chew. In practice, overgrowth of rabbit incisors can lead to malocclusion and difficulty eating, which is a common dental concern for this species. The other animals have incisors that reach a mature length and then stop growing, so they do not continuously erupt.

6. Abdominal distention caused by fluid accumulation is commonly known as:

Abdominal distention from fluid buildup in the abdominal cavity is ascites. This happens when fluid collects in the peritoneal space, making the abdomen appear swollen and barrel-shaped. In exam scenarios, you'd recognize ascites by signs like a fluid wave or shifting dullness on physical exam, and it's usually confirmed with imaging such as ultrasound. Many veterinary cases arise from liver disease with hypoalbuminemia, portal hypertension, heart failure, cancer, or severe inflammation, all of which allow fluid to leak into the peritoneal space. This is different from bloat, which is gas distension of the stomach; colic, which is abdominal pain; and hepatomegaly, which is an enlarged liver rather than fluid in the abdomen.

7. Which of the following is used primarily to vent waste gasses?

The key idea is protecting people from exposure to waste anesthetic gases. A scavenger is connected to the breathing circuit to collect and remove any waste gases, venting them outside the clinical area so staff aren't exposed to anesthetics. The other devices have different roles: a flush valve temporarily pushes fresh gas into the circuit (useful for rapid circuit clearing or induction, but it can release gas into the room if not controlled), a vaporizer converts liquid anesthetic into a vapor added to the carrier gas, and a flow meter simply indicates or regulates the rate of gas flow without venting waste gases.

8. Acute hypercapnic respiratory failure is associated with which condition?

- A. Pneumonia
- B. Pulmonary thromboembolism
- C. Pulmonary edema
- D. Asthma**

Acute hypercapnic respiratory failure occurs when ventilation fails to remove the CO₂ produced by metabolism, leading to elevated PaCO₂ and acidemia. This type of failure arises when there is substantial ventilatory limitation—such as severe airway obstruction or fatigue of the respiratory muscles—so the lungs can't expel CO₂ effectively. In an acute severe asthma attack, marked bronchospasm creates high airway resistance and air trapping, making it hard to ventilate adequately. If the work of breathing becomes excessive and the respiratory muscles tire, CO₂ can accumulate, producing hypercapnic respiratory failure. This is why asthma is the condition associated with this pattern, especially during a life-threatening exacerbation. Pneumonia, pulmonary embolism, and pulmonary edema more classically cause hypoxemic respiratory failure due to V/Q mismatch or edema-related gas exchange disruption; hypercapnia is not the defining feature of those scenarios, though it can occur if ventilation becomes severely compromised late in the course.

9. In sheep, the incisors are located on which aspect?

- A. caudal aspect of the mandible
- B. rostral aspect of the maxilla

In sheep, incisors are on the front surface of the lower jaw. In ruminants, the upper jaw lacks incisors entirely and has a dental pad instead, so the incisors sit only on the rostral aspect of the mandible (the forward, lower jaw surface). The caudal aspect is the back of the jaw and would not host incisors, and the upper jaw does not have incisors, so options implying incisors on the maxilla are incorrect.

10. Which antimicrobial could induce seizures in an epileptic animal?

- A. Tetracyclines
- B. Sulfonamides
- C. Fluoroquinolones
- D. Penicillins

Fluoroquinolones can cross into the brain and, at therapeutic or higher levels, disrupt inhibitory signaling by antagonizing GABA-A receptors. This lowers the seizure threshold, making seizures more likely in animals with a history of epilepsy or other CNS issues. The mechanism—reducing GABAergic inhibition in the CNS—explains why this class is the most likely to trigger seizures in an epileptic patient. Other antimicrobials don't have this consistent CNS-stimulatory effect at usual doses, so the seizure risk isn't as prominent in those cases.
