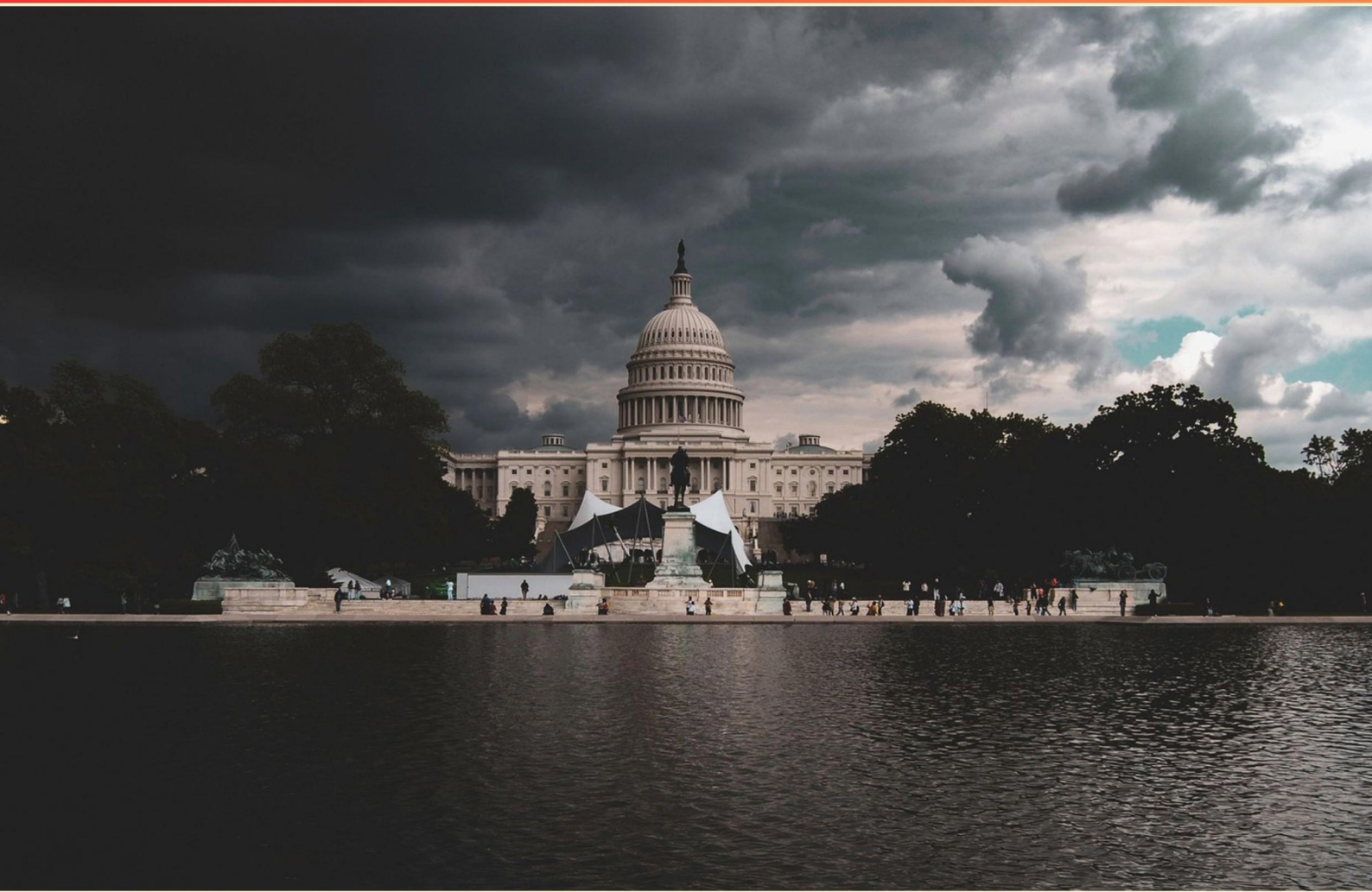

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Explanations

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1. How many U.S. Senators are there?

- A. 50
- B. 100**
- C. 435
- D. 6

Two senators represent each state, and there are 50 states. So, 2 times 50 equals 100, giving 100 U.S. Senators in total. This reflects how the Senate provides equal representation for every state, unlike the House of Representatives where seats are based on population. If you're surprised by the numbers in the other options, one option equals the number of states, not senators; another is the size of the House, not the Senate; and the last doesn't correspond to any standard federal body size. The Senate's total is fixed at 100.

2. What are two Cabinet-level positions?

Cabinet-level positions are the heads of major executive departments who sit in on the President's regular meetings and advise on policy. The Attorney General leads the Department of Justice, and the Secretary of State leads the Department of State. Both are clearly Cabinet-level roles. The Chief Justice isn't part of the President's Cabinet, so including him isn't cabinet-level. The Secretary of Defense is also a Cabinet-level position, but the pair that clearly consists of two well-known civilian department heads in this list is the Attorney General and the Secretary of State.

The judiciary's job is to interpret and apply laws, explain what they mean, resolve disputes that come before the courts, and check that laws and government actions follow the Constitution through judicial review. Courts interpret statutes and treaties when necessary, decide cases between individuals, between states, and between branches of government, and determine whether a law or action conflicts with constitutional rights or provisions. Enforcing laws is the job of the executive branch, and drafting laws is the job of the legislative branch, so those options describe other branches. The broad activity of reviewing, interpreting, resolving disputes, and ensuring constitutional compliance best captures what the judicial branch does.

The branch that interprets laws and resolves disputes is the judicial branch. In our system, the legislative branch writes laws, the executive enforces them, and the judiciary interprets those laws and settles disagreements that arise under them. Courts determine what a statute means in a given case, decide outcomes in civil and criminal matters, and can review laws or government actions to ensure they align with the Constitution. Administrative functions exist within the executive as agencies that implement laws, but they don't interpret laws or resolve disputes in the same way.

5. What is required to override a presidential veto?

Override of a presidential veto hinges on Congress needing broad, cross-chamber support. When the President vetoes a bill, Congress can still enact it if both chambers vote to pass it again with a two-thirds majority. If each chamber reaches that two-thirds threshold, the bill becomes law despite the President's objections. This high bar ensures that the veto override only occurs with substantial consensus across both houses, not just a simple majority. A simple majority in both houses isn't enough because the process is designed to require broad agreement to overturn a President's veto. A national referendum isn't part of how federal law is made, and a three-fifths vote in the Senate alone wouldn't satisfy the requirement, since both chambers must vote it through by two-thirds. This mechanism reflects the balance between the legislative and executive branches.

The date by which individuals must submit their federal income tax return is April 15. This is the deadline for filing the annual tax return with the IRS (Form 1040). If April 15 falls on a weekend or holiday, the filing deadline moves to the next business day. You can request an extension to file later, but any tax owed is still due by the original deadline to avoid penalties and interest. The other dates aren't the standard deadline for personal tax filing, which is why April 15 is the best answer.

The main function of the executive branch is to enforce laws. The President, along with federal agencies, carries out and enforces the laws that Congress passes, directing programs, national security actions, and regulatory compliance. This means agencies like the IRS, FBI, and various departments implement statutes, investigate violations, and ensure rules are followed. Laws are created by Congress, so enforcement belongs to the executive, while interpretation of laws is up to the judicial branch, and regulating commerce is primarily a legislative power vested in Congress (though the executive enforces the regulations that agencies issue within that framework).

8. Which amendment extended the right to vote to women?

The fundamental idea here is expanding who can vote. The amendment that extended the right to vote to women states that the right to vote cannot be denied or abridged on account of sex. This codified into the Constitution what decades of suffrage activism fought for: women's right to participate in elections nationwide. Ratified in 1920, it marked a decisive shift in democratic inclusion and civil rights. The other amendments cover different topics: one established prohibition of alcohol, another set a two-term limit for the presidency, and yet another barred poll taxes in federal elections. None of these change who may vote based on gender, so they don't fit the question about extending voting rights to women.

9. Which principle asserts that the government's power derives from the consent of the governed?

Popular sovereignty is the idea that government power comes from the consent of the governed. In a political system, the people authorize authority through their participation—voting, running for office, and accepting or withdrawing support for leaders and laws. This consent gives legitimacy to the government, and when people demand change, they can express it through elections or other peaceful means. In the United States, this principle is echoed in “We the People” and in the practice of choosing representatives and periodically renewing consent through elections. This concept is the best fit because it identifies where governmental authority originates: from the people. The other principles describe how government operates once power exists. Separation of powers explains how authority is divided among branches to prevent tyranny; federalism describes the division of power between national and state governments; and the rule of law means everyone, including those in power, is bound by law.

10. How many U.S. Senators are there?

Two senators are assigned to each state, and there are fifty states. From that, the total number of senators comes by combining those two facts: two per state across fifty states. This setup reflects the Senate's design to give equal representation to states regardless of population. For context, the number 435 is the size of the House of Representatives, which is based on population rather than equal state representation. The number six refers to the typical number of justices on the Supreme Court.
