For instance, conducting foreign affairs is primarily the responsibility of the executive branch, led by the President, although Congress does have some roles, such as ratifying treaties and regulating foreign commerce. Additionally, while Congress shares some powers with the President, such as in foreign affairs and budgetary considerations, the power to regulate interstate commerce is firmly established as a congressional power. Lastly, while Congress does have implied powers that expand its reach beyond those explicitly listed in the
