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Explanations

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1. Which amendment established alcohol prohibition in the United States?

This question is testing your knowledge of which constitutional change established national Prohibition. The Eighteenth Amendment made it illegal to manufacture, sell, or transportation intoxicating liquors anywhere in the United States, creating the Prohibition era. It was ratified in 1919 and took effect soon after, marking the legal start of nationwide alcohol prohibition. Prohibition lasted until the Twenty-First Amendment in 1933, which repealed the Eighteenth and is the only amendment ever to repeal another. The Ku Klux Klan was a violent white supremacist group that formed during this era, not the process of rebuilding. The Great Migration refers to African Americans moving to northern cities in the early 20th century. Annexation means adding territory to a country, not the postwar reorganization and rebuilding of the United States.

This differs from World War II, which ended in 1945 and involved a global Allied effort against the Axis powers. It also differs from the Gulf War, which began in response to Iraq's invasion of Kuwait in 1990. And it's distinct from the Vietnam War, a prolonged conflict in Southeast Asia beginning in the 1950s-1960s with different causes and dynamics, not a UN-led defense against an invasion of Korea.

In history, the main idea being tested is how an author makes an interpretive claim about the past and shows how the gathered evidence fits into a larger pattern or context. This approach goes beyond simply listing facts; it explains how the pieces of evidence connect to bigger processes, such as economic changes, political struggles, or social transformations. The other terms describe different aspects: bias refers to a prejudice that can color interpretation; credibility concerns how trustworthy a source is; evidence are the materials used to support an argument. So the best fit for an interpretation that places evidence within a larger context is the thesis.

It encompasses defense, intelligence, border controls, emergency preparedness, and diplomatic efforts all aimed at maintaining sovereignty and safety. That direct focus on safeguarding the nation from harm is why this phrase fits the description best. Environmentalism centers on protecting the environment and natural resources, not national safety from threats. NAFTA is a trade agreement designed to promote economic exchange among the U.S., Canada, and Mexico. Global communication refers to sharing information across borders, which influences international relations but does not itself define protection from attack.

It grew out of the Great Migration, when many African Americans moved to northern cities, and helped lay the groundwork for later civil rights advances, while leaving a lasting impact on arts and culture nationwide. The other options refer to different phenomena: the Great Depression was an economic crisis of the 1930s; the Great Migration describes the movement of Black Americans northward earlier in the century; and the New Deal were 1930s government programs. The term that best captures this 1920s cultural flourishing is the Harlem Renaissance.
