Robert Frost and Emily Bronte were not Puritan poets, and their writing styles did not focus heavily on religious themes. Sylvia Plath, although a talented poet, was associated with the confessional poetry movement of the 20th century, which was focused on more personal and emotional experiences. Therefore, none of the other options fit the context or style of the quote as well as Anne Bradstreet.

6. "That it will never come again, is what makes life so sweet" is a line from a poem likely written by whom?

Emily Dickinson is the correct answer as this line is taken from her poem "Remembrance". The other options are incorrect as A)Henry David Thoreau was primarily a naturalist and philosopher, rather than a poet. B)Robert Frost is a famous American poet but this line is not from any of his works. C)Walt Whitman was a famous poet, but this line does not match his style of writing.

7. "Once upon a midnight dreary" is the beginning of which famous poem?

- A. "Annabel Lee"
- B. "To Helen"
- C. "The Raven"**
- D. "The Bells"

"Once upon a midnight dreary" is the opening line of "The Raven" by Edgar Allan Poe. This famous poem begins with a sense of darkness and melancholy, setting the eerie tone for the rest of the poem. This line is not present in the other options, making them incorrect. "Annabel Lee" begins with "It was many and many a year ago," "To Helen" begins with "Helen, thy beauty is to me," and "The Bells" begins with "Hear the sledges with the bells." The correct answer to this question is A. Edgar Allan Poe. Poe is well-known for writing horror stories, which includes The Pit and the Pendulum. This makes them incorrect choices for this question.
