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## **Explanations**

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**1. The term wyrd refers to which concept?**

Wyrd is the idea of fate or destiny that governs human life in Anglo-Saxon culture. In Old English literature like *Beowulf*, wyrd acts as an unseen force that orders the course of events—great deeds, shifting fortunes, and the inevitability of outcomes. People may act with courage and skill, but they live within wyrd’s patterns, where outcomes often feel predetermined. This concept helps explain why even the mighty face losses or disaster, highlighting the tension between valor and the limits fate imposes. Beot, Wergild, and Blood feud refer to a vow or boast, compensation for a death, and cycles of revenge, respectively, not to fate itself.

After the Romans pulled out of Britain, the big shift came when Germanic groups—the Angles, Saxons, and Jutes—began moving in and setting up settlements. By the mid-5th century, roughly around 450 AD, these groups had established a noticeable Anglo-Saxon presence and began forming early kingdoms that would shape what becomes England. This date is the standard marker historians use for the beginning of Anglo-Saxon England, reflecting the point at which Germanic influence became dominant on the island. The other dates don’t fit the pattern: 1066 marks the Norman Conquest, not the arrival of the Anglo-Saxons; 55 BC is before Roman contact; and 400 AD is a bit too early for the major waves and consolidation to have taken hold.

Self-Reliance and nonconformity spring from a belief in trusting your own inner voice and resisting pressure to follow the crowd. Ralph Waldo Emerson, a central figure in Transcendentalism, articulates this stance most clearly in his essay *Self-Reliance*, where he argues that individuals should rely on their own intuition and moral sense rather than conform to external rules or popular opinion. This emphasis on inner authority and personal independence became a defining thread in 19th-century American thought and literature. While Thoreau championed living by conscience in practice through civil disobedience, and Whitman and Hawthorne explored related themes in different ways, the association with Self-Reliance as a named idea points to Emerson.

The phrase “awful responsibility of time” communicates that sense most directly: it pairs time’s relentless progression with a strong moral obligation, highlighting how the inevitability of future outcomes amplifies the ethical burden. The other options describe related ideas—consequences over time, accountability, or historical causality—but they don’t convey the same intense sense of inevitability and moral weight that time’s passage imposes.

In literature, foreshadowing is a technique where hints or clues are planted early on to suggest what will happen later in the story. It creates anticipation and prepares the reader for upcoming events without giving them away, often building suspense as you notice the threads tying to a future development. When a question asks for the term that means a hint of future events, this is the precise device being described, because its purpose is to signal what is to come. Juxtaposition, by contrast, places two elements side by side to highlight contrasts. Paradox presents a statement that seems self-contradictory yet reveals a truth. Diction refers to the author's word choice and style. So foreshadowing is the term that most directly captures the idea of hinting at what will occur later.

Kleos, by contrast, means glory or fame earned through heroic deeds, not the homeward journey. Pietas conveys a sense of dutiful piety and loyalty to gods, country, and family, focusing on obligation rather than the act of returning home. Arete denotes excellence or virtue, the quality of living wisely and well. None of these capture the specific idea of homecoming or longing for home as nostos does.

Comitatus is the bond of loyalty between a lord and his warriors in early Germanic and Anglo-Saxon society. This mutual obligation helps explain actions and loyalties in *Beowulf* and similar epic texts, where battles and decisions hinge on maintaining trust within the warrior group. It differs from kinship, which is about blood ties; from courtliness, which is about manners at court; and from Christian ethics, which centers on Christian moral principles. In essence, comitatus centers on the pledged loyalty of warriors to their leader and the duties that flow from that bond, i.e., warrior loyalty.

Hermeneutic describes the interpretive framework readers apply to analyze a text. It refers to hermeneutics—the study and method of interpretation—encompassing how language, context, and prior assumptions shape meaning. When you analyze literature with a hermeneutic approach, you're considering what the text communicates, how its language and structure convey meaning, and how your own perspective interacts with it to produce understanding. This stands apart from archetype, which points to universal symbolic patterns; irony, a figure of speech; and diction, which is about word choice. So the term that best fits the idea of the interpretive framework is hermeneutic.

Shakespeare's career sits in the Elizabethan era, the period when English drama flourished under Queen Elizabeth I and the English Renaissance. Some of his later work reaches into the Jacobean era after 1603, but the era most closely associated with his career and the bulk of his output is the Elizabethan era. The Romantic, Victorian, and Modernist eras come later in history, with very different cultural and literary priorities, so they don't fit Shakespeare's lifetime and the milieu in which his early career developed.

**10. Which term describes the assumption that human nature is ultimately selfish, rooted in Diogenes' philosophy?**

Cynicism fits because it centers on the belief that people are driven by self-interest and that social norms often mask selfish motives. Diogenes of Sinope, a key figure in ancient Greek philosophy, is considered a founder of Cynicism. He challenged conventional wealth, status, and etiquette, arguing that virtue comes from living in accordance with nature and being self-sufficient. This focus on human self-interest and skepticism toward appearances is why the term correctly describes the view attributed to Diogenes. The other terms don't capture this idea: populist relates to appealing to common people in politics, demagogue to a leader who manipulates emotions for power, and nihilism concerns the rejection of meaning or value, not the assumption about human nature in Diogenes' thought.
