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Explanations

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1. Interpreters serve primarily as a bridge between which groups?

Interpreting exists to connect people who use different languages or communication modes. In ASL contexts, interpreters bridge Deaf individuals who use American Sign Language with hearing individuals who rely on spoken English, enabling real-time conversations, access to information, and participation for everyone involved. They strive to convey meaning, intent, and nuanced cues like facial expressions and tone, so both sides understand accurately. This bridging happens across many settings—education, healthcare, events, workplaces—so the focus isn't limited to one relationship. That broader role is why Deaf and hearing individuals are the best answer.

Name signs are a culturally meaningful way to identify someone within the Deaf community, and they're usually created or offered by Deaf signers who know you well. Being given a name sign is an honor because it marks acceptance and belonging. Asking for a name sign too early can come across as pushy or presumptive, since it implies you expect the sign rather than earning the relationship and mutual trust. The respectful approach is to wait for an invitation or a natural moment when someone offers to give you a name sign. If you're curious, you can express appreciation when it's offered and ask politely only after you've established a rapport.

Because of that, even with interpreters, many Deaf concertgoers still feel they can't completely appreciate the music. Interpreters are a valuable and increasingly common accommodation, yet they don't automatically close every gap in concert accessibility. Options that claim complete closure, rare use, or no accessibility don't fit the reality that access is improving but not absolute.

Now, smartphones with texting, instant messaging, and video calls—and services that support sign language over video—offer faster, more flexible options across networks. Pagers have given way to smartphones for quick communication, so TTY use has declined overall. Some people may still use TTY in specific contexts, but it's less common than before.

So the signs for Teacher and Student incorporate that “person” ending, making the meaning clearly about a person who performs the action.

Sign language remains a primary way many Deaf people communicate, even when assistive technology is in use. Some individuals may use multiple modes depending on the situation, but the ongoing value and use of sign language explain why the statement is true.

Animal signs often use a visual cue tied to a well-known behavior. For pig, the most recognizable trait is mud-wallowing, so the sign is built to evoke that idea—an action that people instantly associate with pigs. That makes the gesture intuitive and easy to remember, showing why this explanation fits best. The other options describe things pigs do, but they don't provide the same clear, distinctive cue that defines the sign.
