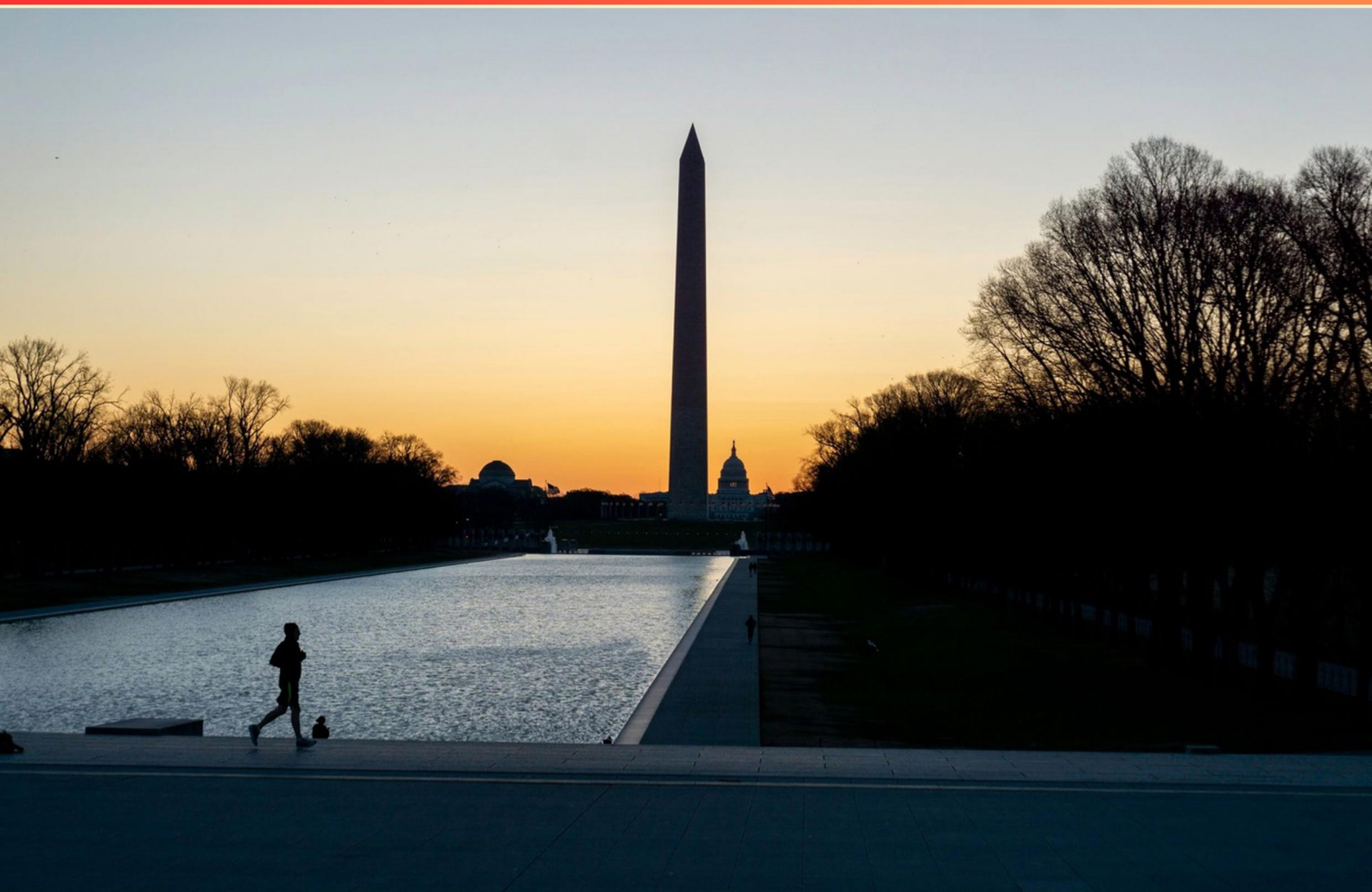

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Explanations

The effectiveness of American military interventions is more aligned with a more traditional perspective of foreign policy that emphasizes strength and resolve rather than diplomacy. Lastly, while the collapse of democratic states in Eastern Europe is a significant historical event, revisionist theories focus more on Gorbachev's initiatives than the internal struggles within Eastern European nations.

Additionally, while forming new alliances with smaller nations could be part of broader foreign policy, the focus during Nixon's era was more heavily weighted on managing the direct relationship between the superpowers themselves, rather than expanding alliances in isolation.
