The cultivation of corn took a long time to reach North America due to the migration of agricultural practices from Central and South America. The Enlightenment involved a shift towards reason and science, and Deism emerged as a philosophical approach to religion that emphasizes reason and morality rather than doctrinal authority. The Reconquista was completed in 1492 with the conquest of Granada, the last Muslim stronghold in Spain. Ferdinand and Isabella aimed not only to unite Spain under Christian rule but also to ensure religious uniformity. This included the expulsion of Muslims and Jews who did not convert to Christianity, culminating in the Alhambra Decree of 1492 that ordered the expulsion of Jews from Spain. The other options do not accurately capture the primary objective during this period. Establishing trade routes did occur as a result of the Spanish exploration that followed, but it was not the primary focus of the Reconquista itself. Expansion into Africa was not a goal during the Reconquista; rather, it was part of Spain's later colonial ambitions. This concept reflects the broader struggle for autonomy and dignity against the oppressive system of chattel slavery. While some enslaved individuals did engage in cooperation or communication among themselves, the term "cooperative labor" does not fully capture the essence of resistance as it implies a degree of compliance or acceptance of their circumstances. Similarly, "word of mouth communication" might have been a method of sharing information and fostering solidarity among slaves, but it does not encapsulate active resistance. Lastly, "public protests" refers more to organized expressions of dissent that occurred in contexts where people were not subjected to the same levels of oppression, making it less applicable to the experiences of enslaved Africans who often operated within a clandestine existence due to the nature of their servitude. Thus, African resistance succinctly encapsulates the varied and complex forms of opposition that enslaved people engaged in, recognizing their agency amid the brutal realities of slavery.

The variability in estimates is also due to the challenges in measuring populations that existed without written records, making this range the most widely accepted in historical discussions. Estimates below this range, such as less than 1 million or around 5 million, do not encompass the substantial evidence of established communities and populations. Similarly, estimates exceeding 10 million or reaching over 15 million may overestimate the size of pre-Columbian societies, considering the ecological and social constraints of the time. The chosen estimate acknowledges both the complexity of Indigenous societies and the realities faced by researchers when trying to ascertain their population size.

Increased regulations on trade would typically restrict rather than promote economic expansion, which does not align with the experiences of this period.
