The historical record illustrates that there were treaties and discussions, such as the Treaty of the Pyrenees in 1659 and subsequent negotiations, that sought to create clearer boundaries despite ongoing competition. In contrast to this choice, the other answers fail to fully capture the nuanced relationship. The notion that they fought over all territories oversimplifies the situation, as their pursuits often led to negotiations rather than outright conflict. Establishing a joint administration is inaccurate as both empires operated independently and maintained distinct colonial ambitions. Lastly, the idea that they ignored each other's activities
