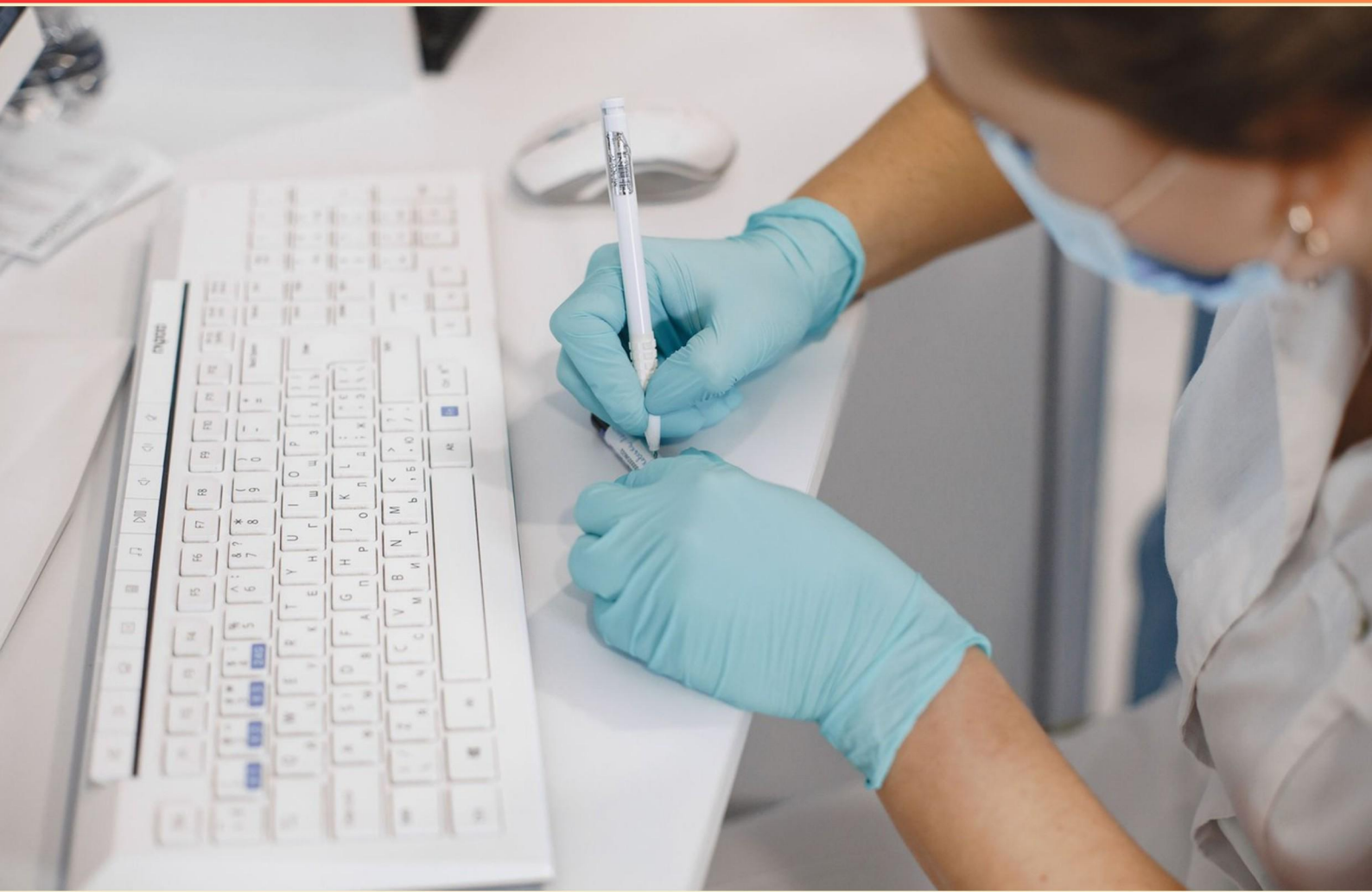

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Explanations

When a provider leaves their job, claims-based insurance typically becomes inactive. The emphasis on meaningful use was designed to enhance patient engagement, improve care coordination, and ensure the privacy and security of patient information. This not only aids in improving the healthcare system but also aligns with broader goals of health reform.
