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1. What writing material did ancient Egyptians use for record-keeping?

Papyrus was the writing material used by ancient Egyptians for keeping records. Made from the papyrus plant that grew along the Nile, thin strips were pressed together to form sheets that could be rolled into scrolls. Scribes wrote on these sheets with reed pens dipped in ink, creating administrative documents, tax records, letters, and religious texts. Papyrus was lightweight, relatively easy to produce in large quantities, and simple to store and transport, so it became the standard surface for daily record-keeping in Egypt. While other surfaces like clay tablets or stone tablets were used in different regions or contexts, papyrus suited Egypt's bureaucratic needs best. Parchment appeared later and was used in various cultures, but in ancient Egypt papyrus was the primary medium for records.

A legacy is what endures from someone or something after they're gone or after a period ends. It's the lasting impact or leftovers that shape future generations—things like buildings, artifacts, laws, ideas, or traditions. In ancient contexts, legacies show up as monumental architecture, influential philosophies, or enduring cultural practices that others continue to study or imitate. It isn't just a city, a modern invention, or a single government rule; it's the lasting thing left behind that influences later societies. That makes the statement "something left behind" the best fit.

Surplus food fuels urban growth because it lets a community sustain more people than just those needed to farm for daily meals. Those specializations create economic activity and social organization that cities rely on, along with the need for shared infrastructure like granaries, markets, and governance. A stable food supply also supports storage for tough times and the accumulation of wealth, which in turn attracts people from the countryside to urban centers. While war, religion, and isolation can influence cities, they don't by themselves create dense, permanent settlements the way a reliable food surplus does.

In these newly connected lands, Greek language, art, science, and political ideas fused with local traditions, giving rise to a cosmopolitan world known as the Hellenistic period. Cities like Alexandria became hubs of learning and culture, and Koine Greek spread as a common language across the eastern Mediterranean and Near East, facilitating exchange and innovation. The other figures are tied to different contexts: Cyrus the Great founded the earlier Persian Empire, not the Greek-dominated spread that defines the Hellenistic era; Pericles was a statesman of classical Athens before this period; Julius Caesar was a Roman leader from a later era, well after the Hellenistic world had formed.

Geography also creates different challenges—mountains and deserts can isolate groups, while coastlines and navigable rivers connect communities. These geographic factors shape diets, technologies, social organization, and political power, guiding the path a civilization takes. While geography can pose hurdles or facilitate growth, it mostly sets the stage for development through the resources and connections it provides. The other ideas imply geography alone limits growth, causes wars, or destroys cities, which oversimplify the role geography plays in shaping civilizations.

This is why job specialization is the best answer: surplus food directly enables people to pursue activities beyond farming. The other ideas don't fit as the primary outcome: surplus doesn't inherently cause population decline; while dense settlements can bring disease, that isn't the immediate consequence of having surplus; and surplus tends to promote exchange rather than eliminate trade.

Sparta's society was built around military capacity. From a young age, Spartan boys entered the agoge, a rigorous, state-run training system that forged endurance, discipline, and combat skill. This constant preparation produced a highly effective infantry force built for the phalanx, a formation that relied on tight teamwork and rigorous drill. The whole social and political structure reinforced this aim: laws, education, and daily life were organized to sustain soldiers and war readiness, often at the expense of luxury or artistic pursuits. The economy supported fighting capability through a stable citizen base and controlled helot labor, all focused on maintaining a powerful military state. Even women contributed by ensuring strong, healthy sons and stable households to back the war machine. In short, Sparta's distinctive emphasis on warrior readiness and conquest is what sets it apart from other Greek city-states that leaned more toward trade, navigation, or religious reforms.

Spartan citizens were effectively full-time soldiers, and every aspect of daily life reinforced discipline and readiness for battle. This warrior ethos, more than any other feature of their culture, earned Sparta its reputation. In contrast, Athens is known for its philosophy, arts, and democratic institutions; the military existed, but the culture did not center on lifelong, rigorous military training. The Nile Valley (ancient Egypt) and Sumer (ancient Mesopotamia) produced powerful armies and great achievements in governance, writing, and architecture, but they are not chiefly celebrated for a society-wide emphasis on disciplined warrior training in the same way Sparta is.

The main idea is how technology that prepares the land can dramatically speed up farming. The plow turns over and breaks up the soil, creating furrows that make it easier to plant seeds in neat, even rows. This turns a long, labor-intensive task into a faster, more scalable process, letting farmers cover more ground and plant more seeds with less effort per unit area. A hoe is useful for lighter tilling and weeding, especially on smaller patches, but it's manual and slower for large fields. A sickle is designed for harvesting crops, not for preparing land for planting. A shovel digs and moves soil, but it doesn't efficiently create the broad, even beds needed for planting across vast areas. So, the tool that best enables efficient planting across larger fields is the plow.
