SAMPLE

1. Which curb bit configuration is prohibited?

- A. Curb bit without a curb strap
- B. Curb bit with a curb strap
- C. Snaffle bit
- D. Hackamore

A curb bit relies on a curb strap to counteract leverage and keep the bit properly positioned. The strap sits under the jaw and ties the shanks together so pressure from rein aids doesn't push the bit too hard against the horse's chin and bars. Without that curb strap, the curb bit can exert excessive, uncontrolled pressure, which is not allowed. So the curb bit configuration without a curb strap is prohibited. The other options aren't curb-bit configurations: a snaffle bit isn't a curb bit, and a hackamore is bitless, so they fall outside this category.

2. Who enforces youth eligibility rules during a show?

- A. Show management
- B. Exhibitors

Judges enforce youth eligibility rules because applying the class rules in the arena includes verifying that each rider meets the age requirements for youth divisions. They check eligibility (using required documentation if needed) and can disqualify or escalate concerns to show management to keep the competition fair. Show management handles entry processing and show operations, timekeepers manage timing, and exhibitors are the competitors who must follow the rules but do not enforce eligibility in the ring.

3. In Showmanship, which aspect is primarily judged?

- A. Pattern correctness only.
- B. Grooming and presentation.
- C. The horse's temperament during warm-up.
- D. Presentation, grooming, and the horse's response to the handler, along with pattern execution.

Showmanship is judged on how well the exhibitor presents both themselves and the horse, how the horse responds to cues from the handler, and how accurately and smoothly the pattern is performed. The best option reflects all three elements: neat grooming and turnout (presentation), the horse's manners and responsiveness to the handler, and the precise execution of the pattern. Together, these show the handler's control and the horse's training, which is what judges assess in Showmanship. Focusing only on pattern misses the important grooming and overall presentation; focusing only on grooming and presentation misses how well the horse responds and how the pattern is executed; and considering temperament during warm-up doesn't address the full performance judged in the class.

4. Which of the following is not one of the six core classes for introductory shows?

- A. Barrel Racing**

The concept here is identifying which events are designated as core classes for introductory AQHA shows. These core classes focus on foundational skills—how a horse and rider present themselves, respond to cues, and handle common riding tasks in a show ring. Barrel Racing is a speed event that emphasizes quickness and obstacle pattern riding, not the steady, controlled tasks that the core intro classes are meant to assess. The intro core set includes classes like Showmanship, Trail, and Hunter Under Saddle because they evaluate fundamental horse handling, responsiveness, and showmanship in a way that aligns with introductory competition. Since Barrel Racing isn't part of that core group, it's not one of the six core introductory classes, which is why it's the correct choice.

5. Where is the AQHA international headquarters?

- A. Austin, Texas
- B. Amarillo, Potter County, Texas**

Amarillo, in Potter County, Texas, is where the AQHA international headquarters is located. This is the official base for AQHA's executive offices and main operations, which is why this option is correct. The other Texas cities listed—Austin, Dallas, and Laredo—do not host the AQHA headquarters.

6. International affiliates participate in which region?

- A. 9
- B. 11**
- C. 12
- D. 10

The concept being tested is how AQHA regions are assigned to different groups for qualifiers and coordination. International affiliates are placed in the region designated specifically for international affiliates, separate from the domestic regions. This makes the proper choice the region set aside for international groups, since the other regions cover particular domestic areas and do not include international affiliates.

7. Who has the authority to render a decision on a protest that could affect results?

- A. The appropriate judge or committee per Rulebook**
- B. The head steward
- C. The horse owner
- D. The audience

Authority to render a decision on a protest that could affect results lies with the person or group the Rulebook designates to handle protests—typically the appropriate judge or a protest committee. This ensures the ruling comes from those with judging authority and a clear understanding of scoring, penalties, and eligibility, providing fairness and consistency. The head steward manages show operations rather than making final protest decisions, and the horse owner or audience does not have authority to decide protests.

8. In western classes, which bit is not permitted for horses under 5 years?

- A. Snaffle
- B. Hackamore
- C. Pelham**
- D. Spade

Young horses in western classes are restricted to bits that don't use leverage. A Pelham is a curb-style bit with shanks that multiplies pressure through leverage, so it's not allowed for horses under five. In contrast, a snaffle provides direct pressure with no leverage, which is allowed, and a hackamore (bitless) is used in contexts that don't involve a mouthpiece with leverage. Spade bits are a highly refined curb used on more mature horses, outside the typical options for a young horse. The key idea is that leverage-driven bits like the Pelham are prohibited for horses under five, which is why this option is the correct one.

9. The processing fee is excluded for certain jurisdictions; which statement is true?

- A. It is charged for all shows
- B. It is excluded for certain jurisdictions**
- C. It applies to riders only
- D. It is optional for show management

Some processing fees are not charged in every jurisdiction. Because there are jurisdictions where the fee is excluded, that statement is true. The fee isn't automatically charged at all shows, since exemptions exist; it isn't limited to riders only, since it's a show-wide administrative charge; and it isn't optional for show management when a jurisdiction requires applying the fee.

10. What is the role of patterns in evaluating training level?

- A. Patterns test only speed.
- B. Patterns test training, balance, responsiveness, and handler control.**
- C. Patterns test color recognition.
- D. Patterns test trainer's fashion.

Patterns evaluate training level by requiring the horse to respond precisely and consistently to the rider's cues through a planned sequence of movements. This setup tests multiple aspects at once: how well the horse accepts and follows the bit and seat, its balance and cadence through circles and figures, the smoothness and accuracy of transitions, and the rider's ability to control the horse through the pattern. A well-trained horse demonstrates steady rhythm, correct leads, clean transitions, and confident responses to aids, showing true training maturity rather than just speed, color, or appearance. The other options miss the point because patterns aren't about color recognition or fashion, and speed alone doesn't reveal how well the horse is trained or how effectively the handler can guide it.
