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Explanations

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1. Which statement is true about Torrontés in terms of aromatics?

A. It is a white grape variety known for high aromatics.

B. It is a red grape variety.

The key idea here is that Torrontés is prized for its aromatic character. This white grape from Argentina is known for an intensely perfumed bouquet, driven by its terpene-rich profile, which gives floral scents like orange blossom, jasmine, and roses, often with fruity notes of peach or pear. That strong aroma is a defining quality and helps set Torrontés apart from many other white varieties. Since it is a white grape, it isn't a red variety, and its hallmark isn't tied to being grown only in Patagonia—though it is produced there as well as in other regions. It also isn't inherently a late-harvest grape; its high aromatics come from the grape's natural composition and typical harvest timing that preserves that perfume without relying on late-harvest sweetness. So the statement that best fits is that Torrontés is a white grape variety known for high aromatics.

2. Which province is part of the North Wine Zone?

In Argentina, the North Wine Zone consists of the northern, high altitude wine regions in the Andes foothills, where the climate is dry, sunny, and characterized by large day night temperature swings. Catamarca lies in the Calchaquí Valleys in the northwestern part of the country, at high elevations, with that same hot sun and cool nights that define this zone. That combination of location and climate makes Catamarca a representative part of the North Wine Zone, which is why it's the correct choice.

3. In Río Negro, vineyards flow through valleys located in the basin of which two rivers?

Vineyards in Río Negro are located in valleys that lie within two main river basins: the Colorado and the Negro. The Alto Valle del Río Negro is the standout wine belt in Patagonia, where irrigation from the Río Negro feeds fertile floodplains with well-drained soils, creating ideal conditions for grapevines in an arid climate. A second significant wine corridor in the same region runs along the basin of the Colorado River, providing another set of favorable soils and microclimate. Together, these basins define where the Río Negro valleys form, shaping the region's viticulture. The other river basins mentioned map to different parts of Argentina and Patagonia, not the Río Negro wine valleys. Paraná and Uruguay are farther north and east; Limay and Neuquén are separate Patagonian basins; Santa Cruz and Deseado belong to the southern Patagonia area.

Tucumán's high-altitude, sunny-but-cool climate suits the aromatic white grape Torrontés, which has become the defining variety for the region. Its floral perfume, bright citrus lift, and crisp acidity respond well to those conditions, making Torrontés the predominant grape grown there. While Chardonnay and Pinot Grigio are found elsewhere in Argentina, and Riesling is less typical of this part of the country, Torrontés best captures Tucumán's wine profile.

5. Which grape variety wasn't introduced to Argentina until 1993?

The idea being tested is when different grape varieties appeared in Argentina, showing how the wine scene expanded over time. Viognier, a white Rhône variety known for its aromatic intensity and stone fruit flavors, was introduced to Argentina around 1993. That late introduction makes it the newer arrival among the options. Malbec has a much longer history in Argentina, dating back to the 19th century and becoming the country's signature red. Chardonnay and Sauvignon Blanc were already established whites as the modern Argentine wine industry grew, well before the early 1990s. So the 1993 introduction date fits Viognier as the variety that wasn't introduced until that year.

6. Which of the following is the most planted province in the Cuyo Wine Zone?

The question tests knowledge of which province has the largest vineyard footprint within the Cuyo Wine Zone. Mendoza stands out because it accounts for the vast majority of Argentina's vineyard area in that zone. Its favorable combination of climate, large land area, and an extensive irrigation system from the Andes supports extensive grape growing, especially Malbec, which is closely associated with the region. San Juan and La Rioja have productive wineries but far fewer hectares planted than Mendoza, and Buenos Aires is not part of the Cuyo zone. So Mendoza is the most planted province in the Cuyo Wine Zone.

7. Which province in the North Wine Zone is a notable part of Argentina's northern wine region?

The main idea here is recognizing where the North Wine Zone sits in Argentina and what grape or style defines that northern region. The North Wine Zone is the northernmost wine area, characterized by very high-altitude vineyards where wines, especially aromatic whites, develop bright acidity and distinctive profiles, with Torrontés being a signature grape of the region. Salta stands out as the hallmark province of this zone, particularly in the Cafayate area, where Torrontés shines and defines the northern wine scene. Its altitude, arid climate, and terroir give Torrontés its characteristic perfumed aroma and crisp finish, making Salta the best-tuned representative of Argentina's northern wine region. Mendoza is in the Cuyo zone and is famed for Malbec, Córdoba has only limited production, and La Rioja, while northern, is not as emblematic of the North Wine Zone's distinctive identity as Salta.

Understanding where each province lies helps you place them into Argentina's wine zones. The North Wine Zone comprises the northernmost provinces with dry, high-altitude vineyards, and Salta, Jujuy, and Tucumán fit that northern climate and geography. Mendoza, however, is in the Cuyo region in the central-west, known for a different climate and irrigation-based viticulture. Because of this geographical and climatic difference, Mendoza is not part of the North Wine Zone.

The maritime, cool climate favors varieties that retain high acidity and develop nuanced aromatics. Pinot Noir excels in cooler areas, giving elegant, lighter red wines with good freshness. White varieties like Chardonnay and Sauvignon Blanc are classic matches for cool nights and sea influence, preserving bright acidity and crisp profiles. Malbec and Merlot are widely grown across Argentina and adapt well to these cooler coastal sites, contributing solid red options that still show finesse rather than overt warmth. So, this combination mirrors what is most commonly produced in that zone, rather than sets that lean toward heat-loving or less typical varieties for Patagonia's climate.

10. Which of the following is a predominant grape variety in the North Wine Zone?

Malbec is the most planted red grape in the North Wine Zone, reflecting its suitability to the high altitude, sun drenched conditions of that area. The cool nights at altitude help Malbec ripen with good color and structure, making it the grape that most defines red wines from this zone. While Torrontés is the signature white variety of the North, Malbec stands out as the predominant red, which is why it's the best choice among the options. The other varieties—Merlot, Chardonnay, and Pinot Noir—are cultivated there too but do not define the region as clearly as Malbec.
