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Explanations

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1. Which of the following is a symptom of hyperglycemia?

Hyperglycemia, or elevated blood glucose levels, is the primary symptom that indicates a problem with the body's ability to produce or respond to insulin. Checking for witness confirmation, while valuable in investigations, does not directly address the legal scope within which officers can operate when searching for evidence. Thus, considering consent and the extent of the warrant is foundational in ensuring that all evidence obtained is legally permissible.
